### HOOD RIVER.

Someone passing himself as a representative for Babbager, photographer, was in Hood River one day last week. Several Hood Riverites are wise but poorer thereby. The impostor sold 50-cent coupons for photographs, claiming that his employer was at the depot with a special car ready to open up a gallery in town, and that by presenting the coupon and an additional 50 cents the holder of the same could obtain a dozen cabinet photographs and an enlarged picture. The scheme was a "grand introductory affair," and only a limited number of coupons were to be sold. Several people paid 50 cents for a coupon, but failed afterward to find the photographer.—Hood River Glacier.

Over half the crop is now in the sack. Farmers are holding for 50 cents net and but few sales have been made.—Eagle.

J. H. Jackson, who has just returned from Agency Plains tells us that as far as eye can reach cabins may be seen, at least a hundred having been put up recently. From Timothy Brownhill's cabin, which he had fenced in and built a cabin on, 50 may be counted. Mr. Jackson has also fenced in and built on his land. ## FAIR SHAKE UP.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 28.—It is understood that there is to be a shake-up in the Missouri World's Fair Commission. On his recent visit to St. Louis Governor Dockery expressed quite emphatically his dissatisfaction over the work done by the commission, and since then it is reported he has been considering the advisability of change among the appointees.

The state commission has at its disposal a large appropriation, \$1,000,000. Apparently little has been done about the use of this sum. The exposition officials have sought to learn the plans of Missouri because of the approaching allotment of state locations. The commission has given out nothing as yet which will show definitely what it proposes to do. The elaborate offices of the commission at the Administration building have been closed for three months. Since the announcement that the fair would not open until 1904 the commission has ceased, apparently, to do anything.

## MYSTERIOUS MURDER

BOSCOBEL, Wis., Aug. 28.—Tobias Eckenberger, aged 50, a Scandinavian, met death at Blue River from a wound in the head. He laid nine hours before being discovered. He had been dragged from the center of the street to a pile of wood and weeds. He had been drinking until a late hour, and was boisterous and had an altercation with Charles McMillen and Sherman Streeter, Boscobel painters.

Witnesses say they heard a blow struck and saw Eckenberger fall. A warrant was issued by Justice of Peace Fred Adkins, on complaint of John Froter and McMillen and Streeter were arrested by Constable Saylor, charged with the killing of Eckenberger. A post mortem examination was started, and testimony of two witnesses heard when a continuance was taken.

## ANOTHER RAILROAD

A New Company Has Been Organized in Ohio.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 28.—A new company to be known as the Cincinnati, Indianapolis and Western Railroad Company, is to be the result of the action taken here today by the stockholders of the Cincinnati, Hamilton and Indianapolis in ratifying the proposition to consolidate with the Indiana, Decatur and Western, which was arranged by the directors of the two roads a short time since. The deal is considered one of the most important made in railroad circles in Indiana in a long time.

The mileage of the combined interests will be 342, extending from Hamilton, O., to Springfield, Ill., with the river division extending to Olney, Ill. Added interest is given the merger by the report apparently from a reliable source, that the new company intends to acquire control of the Cincinnati, Richmond and Munice, now building, and which will form the shortest line between Cincinnati and Chicago.

The ballroom is a Louise Seize apartment done in white and gold and designed by Stanford White, who was the architect for William C. Whitney's New York City residence.
