

STRONG PROTEST

Against Oil Tanks in Albina.

GREAT INDIGNATION

A Committee Is Appointed to Interview the Council.

Residents of Albina took decisive steps against the locating of the tanks of the Standard Oil Company in their midst at an over-crowded meeting last evening.

The meeting was held in the hall on the corner of Williams avenue and Hancock street, and nearly every resident and taxpayer of the vicinity was in attendance.

The meeting was called to order by M. J. McMahon, who afterwards made permanent chairman. Mr. McMahon spoke briefly on the objects of the meeting, mainly, that of protesting against the locating of the company's oil tanks in that section of the city.

A motion was made to appoint a committee of five for the purpose of addressing the City Council this afternoon on the subject, the following being the appointees by the chair: M. J. McMahon, Thomas Connell, Robert Swain, J. H. McMillen, E. E. Merges and J. W. Booth.

The following resolution was then made and carried:

"We, the citizens, taxpayers and residents of Holladay's, McMillen's and Irving's additions, and of Albina, comprising the northeastern part of the City of Portland, do hereby protest against the proposed location of the Standard Oil Company's plant on the Spencer tract, or elsewhere in the Ninth or Tenth wards of this city, and be it hereby

"Resolved, That we consider the proposed oil tanks dangerous to the residents of this community, detrimental to our realty values and a menace to our homes; and be it further

"Resolved, That the Common Council of the City of Portland be requested to prohibit the location of said oil tanks in either the Ninth or Tenth wards of this city, but if a relocation of the oil tanks of the Standard Oil Company be deemed necessary, that the Standard Oil Company be required to seek a suitable location outside of the city limits."

A number of short addresses were then made by Thomas Connell and J. W. Booth. Councilman Fiegel, of the Eleventh ward, was called upon to make an address. He said that he thought that the tanks should be located in the vicinity.

Councilmen Sharkey and Albee both came in for short talks and said that they thought that the tanks should be located entirely outside of the city limits.

OUTLOOK IS GOOD

Mayor and Deputy City Attorney

ON CITY FINANCES

All Tax Cases, Are Now to Be Vigorously Prosecuted by Authorities.

Deputy City Attorney Fitzgerald paid Mayor Williams a visit this morning and the two engaged in an animated conversation over the probability of several attorneys now on trial before Judge Hogue for trying to evade the payment of an income tax, winning their cases. Mr. Fitzgerald said that they had filed demurrers and were asking for time to file briefs, etc., but he would not do so in convicting them under the law.

Mayor Williams said: "If they paid their taxes I would be rather inclined to remit the penalties, but agree with you that if a few of them were fined it might prove a good lesson to them and would probably induce the others to come forward and settle without trouble to you."

Fitzgerald—"If I issue a dozen warrants, as things are now, twelve men will rush to the treasurer's office and pay up. These men all know that they owe this money, but hold off. If they think they are going to be arrested though, they come forward. Now, if they are arrested and not punished, the issuance of a warrant will have little effect. You know that we have but a handful of policemen and we can not make tax collectors out of them. Why, it would take half the force to scour the city for these hundreds of delinquents. Besides City Attorney McNary and myself have about all we can do handling the urgent matters."

The Mayor—"I think that any person brought into court ought to be made to pay whatever penalty the municipal judge may impose. It is all humbug for them to say that they have not had due notice that the tax is due. All this quibbling will avail them nothing. The press have been hammering at them for weeks, and they have talked it over between themselves."

Fitzgerald—"Another question they raise is that they are lawyers."

That is a general law applying to that. This is a general law applying to all persons. It is a uniform tax."

Fitzgerald—"Well, I suppose I am getting myself heartily disliked by my brother lawyers, but I am going to do my duty as I see it. Any man who comes into court and fights the case will have to fight it and fight it hard, as I am satisfied that the law is clearly on the city's side."

Mayor Williams heartily concurred with the deputy city attorney, and continuing, said:

"We are getting along fine now with our finances and there is no reason why we should not continue. We have already taken in over \$50,000 for this quarter, which is very gratifying to me. We need the money. The fire department is crippled for a supply of horses, hose and other equipments, and there is an everlasting clamor for more streets."

INDRAVELLI REACHES PORT

Brought 26 Passengers and a Big Cargo of Merchandise.

The Oriental liner Indravelli arrived in the harbor this morning from China and Japan about 11 o'clock, but it was high noon before she got alongside the Alaska dock, where her cargo will be discharged.

It has been over three months ago since the Indravelli steamed from Portland for Yokohama and Hong Kong. The voyage both ways was free from any exciting events. She left Hong Kong for Portland on Aug. 4. The only passengers she brought were four Chinamen and 22 Japanese, two of the latter being women.

Her cargo consisted of 1,961 tons of goods, divided as follows: Tea, 7,561 cases; gunnies, 1,152 bales; pine apples, 1,152 cases; kapok, 805 bales; pepper, 215 bags; nutmegs, 100 cases; tapioca, 850 bags; curries, etc., 1,910 cases; sundries, 80 bags; clay, 400 tons; matting, 4,120 rolls; hemp, 68 bales; coffee, 24 bags; opium, 8 cases; cloths, 10 cases; rugs, 11 bales; peanuts, 31 bags.

CAUGHT IN A SLIDE

FORTS REDUCED.

Army Headquarters and Signal Station Are Taken.

PORT TUMBULL, Conn., Sept. 2.—The battleships Kearsage, Alabama, Indiana and Massachusetts attacked Fort Wright at sunrise this morning. The Indians and Kearsage were put out of action by Fort Wright. The big ships concentrated their fire on Fort Wright reducing it. The army headquarters and signal station on Fisher's Hill were constructively destroyed, after which the ships in single columns passed eastward to Fisher Island. The bombardment was so heavy that many windows in New London were shattered.

AROUND THE COURT HOUSE

Doings in and About the Temple of Justice.

Action has not been taken on the bids for repairing the Albina Ferry. J. B. Tillison was this morning awarded the contract for building the wagon bridge over the Sandy near Troutdale, his bid being the lowest submitted.

Mrs. Andrew Philmakee was examined on complaint of J. W. Eckes for insanity this morning. The court found her perfectly sane and dismissed the complaint. Eckes, who swore to the affidavit charging her with being insane, seems to have been actuated by some underhanded motive. The matter has been referred to the district attorney's office. He will probably be prosecuted for perjury.

The inventory of the estate of G. E. Withington, deceased, has been filed. It shows property to the value of \$7,240. The property consists of stock in the First National bank and life insurance policies.

Christine Enger of San Francisco has filed a petition in the county court asking that she be adjudged sole heir of the estate of Henry Wilson, deceased, and that S. W. Simmons, the administrator, be required to file his final account. The estate is valued at \$12,000.

The Troy Laundry Company has commenced a suit to enjoin W. F. Williams, a former employee, from interfering with their business and taking the laundry work of their customers to the Oregon Laundry.

Wilhelmine Behrens, executrix of the will of Christian Behrens, deceased, has filed her final account and asks to be discharged.

Articles of incorporation of the Portland Tannery have been filed by Chas. J. Schnabel, Thos. Buttenmiller and A. F. Smith. The capital stock of the company is \$10,000. The principal office is fixed at Portland.

Chas. H. Wilcox was yesterday appointed guardian, ad litem, of Maggie R. Bryant, a minor.

The appointment of L. C. Weir as Deputy Sheriff was filed in the County Clerk's office this morning.

Miss M. A. Henson returned from her vacation and resumed her duties in the County Recorder's office today.
