

VARIOUS OPINIONS

On the Fair Site Selection.

MANY DISAPPOINTED

But All Agree to Get in and Work for the Success of the Enterprise.

As an expression of opinion in regard to the wisdom of the fair site selection Mr. Dan McAllister, who first took up the fair project nearly five years ago, said: "I am not pleased at all with the selection, but as long as it has been made everybody should put their shoulder to the wheel and push it along. The men that made the choice have no motive except the welfare of Portland and the public generally should hold up their hands. I am with them first, last and all the time."

J. M. MOORE, Secretary of the Board of Trade, did not like the location at all. "I have been in favor of Hawthorne Park, with the City Park a close second," said the gentleman, "but as the selection has been made we will have to make the best of it. I think more money would have been taken in at Hawthorne and from a pecuniary point of view would have been preferable; from a scenic point City Park would have been an admirable site."

C. H. McRAACH, Secretary of the Manufacturers' Association, said: "My first choice was City Park and Willamette Heights second. The question of a location, however, was practically settled long ago, when the recommendation of Henry E. Doach. He called the attention of the directors to it and recommended it as the most available place to hold a great fair. I think the Heights are all right and the natural scenery and conditions can be improved and made exceedingly beautiful."

W. N. GATENS, Assistant District Attorney W. N. Gatens: "I don't like it at all. It ought to have been located at Hawthorne Park. There is no better place in the county and I am very much disappointed at the action of the committee."

B. B. RICH: "The location suits me to a dot. It is all right and the executive committee made a very wise choice."

JOHN H. LAUE, of the Laue-Davis Drug Company: "My

real choice was City Park, but as long as the committee has seen fit to select Willamette Heights we should acquiesce and help the fair along to the best of our ability."

H. H. NEWBALL: "Now that the site for the Lewis and Clark Centennial has been selected by the committee," said H. H. Newball, of the East Side Bank, and a prominent mover in the East Side Improvement Association, "I don't think that it will be the proper thing for residents of the East Side to make much of a kick."

"Before the fair site was selected I was most heartily in favor of Hawthorne Park as the site, but now that the selection of Willamette Heights has been made I am of the opinion that it is the best place."

"Of course I have not changed my views in relation to the fact that the Hawthorne tract would be an ideal site. I really think that with the same amount of money that will have to be expended in making the Guild's Lake site fit for the holding of the exposition, Hawthorne Park would be a place of perpetual beauty."

W. C. T. U. OF MULTNOMAH

Hold Annual Convention--Colonel Sobieski's Last Lecture.

In the Clark M. E. church yesterday was held one of the largest and most successful conventions of the Multnomah County W. C. T. U. ever held in this city.

The reports of officers and superintendents showed increase and activity along all the lines of work, particularly in the evangelistic and organizing departments.

Much practical, soul-stirring work was done in all the unions in the evangelistic department, which is the keystone of the whole structure of the W. C. T. U.

There are eight unions in active operation in the county comprising a membership of 120. Three of these have been organized since last convention, and the way paved for the organization of at least two more in the very near future.

Ten different speakers have ploughed the ground pretty thoroughly and sown excellent seed.

Colonel John Sobieski made one of his characteristic speeches, full of hope and enthusiasm, followed by Mrs. Ada Wallace Unruh, Rev. Kerr and Rev. Young, who spoke in the same strain. The following officers were unanimously elected: Miss Frances E. Gotshall, president; Mrs. L. H. F. Addison, vice-president; Mrs. J. M. Donaldson, corresponding secretary; Mrs. Pomeroy, treasurer. The president and secretaries have served two years.

The resolutions were timely and practical, looking toward civic righteousness. Colonel Sobieski will speak at the Sunnyside Methodist church Sunday morning, at the Y. M. C. A. in the afternoon and at the First Baptist church in the evening, Monday evening at Sellwood.

cross, the medicine man searched at his base for healing herbs, whose potency was said to be greatest when grown there.

But it fell: Perhaps some human foot trod upon it, and the ruins of the Bridge of the Gods that form the rocky barrier of the cascades.

Now we stop at St. Martin's, a resort situated delightfully near some hot springs. Here again we encounter an Indian legend. This is of two brothers, twins, the jealousy of the less fortunate one of the skill of the other in war and chase causing him to slay his brother as he bent, unguarded, at a spring to drink.

The spring into which the warrior fell immediately bubbled up a fountain of sparkling healing waters, while the voice of the god Coyote spoke, condemning the springs to always wander, and that the springs from which he drank should always be polluted and bitter. This accounts for all the pleasant and unpleasant springs in the country.

Passing Shell Rock and Wind River Mountains, we are told that the former

mountain is sometimes called Sliding Mountain, owing to its propensity to send quantities of gravel and dirt sliding down into the river. This it has been doing for time immemorial, yet it always seems to have an undiminished stock on hand.

MEMALOOSE ISLAND

Presently we pass Memaloose Island, standing high in the middle of the river. Formerly it was kept by the Indians for the burial of their dead, which they brought across the river in canoes and placed in rough little huts erected for that purpose. With their dead was left utensils they had used through life. It is useless to say the relic hunter has left little save bones and rough boards to tell the story. On this island also lies one pioneer man, "Vic" Trevitt. He was a pioneer, guide, a good fellow, and a warm friend of the Indians. It was his earnest wish that he be buried here with his red friends. Opposite the island is an old battlefield—maybe so selected as to be near the burying ground. At all events, when the land was first tilled, immense quantities of arrowheads were found there.

Just below Mosier's landing are some low piles of stone, called Coyote's Wall, and they stand for another Indian story. These stones were piled there, so the legend goes, by the god Coyote in an attempt to conceal some deed he had committed of which he was ashamed. But for some mysterious reason the wall fell as fast as he built it up, and thus his deed became revealed.

Above The Dalles, this mighty river that has spread so broad and deep before

us all the way contracts, and forces its way through a defile so deep and narrow that it has a local reputation of "going on edge."

Going back by boat it is a delight to forget all history and watch the mountain ranges sweep from the river's edge in broken outline, till their purple summits pierce the sky. Some mountains are mantled in dark firs, some bristle with crags, and here and there a cozy ranch nestles against their rugged sides.

CONCEITS OF THE LANDSCAPE

Yonder a bit of filmy whiteness trails along the range. It may be a vagrant bit of mist, or a venturesome cloud, or it may be the vanishing goddess of Indian lore.

Presently the violet hues that have bathed the nearer mountains begin to deepen into purple. As distant ranges darken to mere outline, while deep shadows fall along the water. As the boat glides on, Mount St. Helens and Mount Hood appear amid their dark surroundings, all aglow with the rosy hues of sunset. Then the rosy glow steals down over purple mountain, fir clad hill and rippling stream, and as we approach the mouth of the Willamette in this glorious blaze of crimson and gold, that also hues sky and river, the sun sinks out of molar sky into a molten stream.

Over darkling waters, past the hushed hills, the boat glides on to the water-mirrored lights of bridge and shore, and to her dock.
