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COOS BAY MOVEMENT

Preliminary Steps for Town Site Action

MAY COMMENCE SEPTEMBER 15

Railroad Men Gossip About the Proposed Routes Southeast.

Railroad and business circles are again agog concerning the Coos Bay Transcontinental project, from movements of the land men, supposed to be immediate forerunners of some definite action. The only thing real, however, was the arrival of Chas. E. Page, of Colorado Springs, who reached Portland last evening, and has been to day closeted with Portland men, and who is awaiting other arrivals including representatives of the Tacoma interests said to be concerned.

Mr. Page was seen this morning at the Chamber of Commerce, and asked what there was of public information, and said there was little definite to be given out. As to himself he admitted that he was to be connected with the land department of the Great Central. He also said that it was his understanding that a definite move was to be made within a short time, and he said that the town to be in Coos, for which the name of Bangor seems to have been selected, was being got into shape, but that he was not yet advised of particulars. He said, however, that he had been informed that the plans for the town would be ready about September 15. Mr. Page was aware to any discussion of the line as proposed, but carried the impression that it was a move of definite and fixed purpose, and that the new transcontinental line, which means so much to Portland, one way or another, was a thing to be counted upon.

From other sources, it was ascertained that there are two general routes under consideration from Coos Bay southeast, depending on the strategic point that may be decided on, as to the Southern Pacific system, and the passage of the Cascades. Three points of such crossing are Drain, Roseburg and Grants Pass. "Drain has for consideration a nearer point to Portland," said one of those discussing it, "but there are the physical difficulties to be encountered about the headwaters of the Willamette, and the Cascades, which are there quite rugged. About the same is to be said as to Roseburg." As to Grants Pass, he said: "It is more in direct line Southeast than any other route, and the pass to the lake region beyond, which would be right in the route, perhaps by Lakeview, would be comparatively easy." To which still another added:

"There are stage routes through almost the entire region on the Grants Pass-Lake Country route, at least for 20 miles, which would greatly lessen construction work through the region." It was further pointed out that beyond such stage lines would come in the Owyhee Valley of Southern Idaho extending into Northern Nevada, southwest of the Duck Valley Indian reserve, from which on to Salt Lake, it would be an easy route over the short divide above the Humboldt, or reach Salt Lake in about 250 miles from the Owyhee. This would make the total line from Salt Lake to Coos, under, rather than over, 800 miles.

There was some talk, also, about the direct interests of Portland, but no one seemed to see just where a new entry-point for the Coast was going to benefit this city.

FOUND HIS VALUABLE DOG.

Dr. Chas. E. Wall, of Salt Lake City, ended a dog chase in Portland Saturday evening, under peculiar circumstances. Dr. Wall is connected with the Clarke railway building concern that is mentioned in connection with the Great Central, or Coos Bay railroad scheme. His concern has contracts under the Columbia River and Northern and Dr. Wall, who was on the ground in the Klickitat country, had his dog with him, a very valuable animal of the spaniel breed. Some one stole the dog and in spite of every effort of the owner, no trace of him could be had. Dr. Wall gave up in despair and returned to Salt Lake. Then he concluded that the dog was in Portland, and he posted on here, arriving last Friday, and before another 24 hours he had the dog, which was found in a North Portland haunt of railroad laborers. The doctor was so happy at getting the animal, even at the end of his long chase, that he made no effort to find or to punish the thief. He was as pleased as a boy, on the way to the Southern Pacific, Saturday. The dog, who is coal black, of beautiful build and style, carrying his master's hand-grip in his mouth and showing by his wagging tail that he was as glad as his master.

"Two thousand miles on a dog hunt is a good bit," said the doctor at the train. "but that fellow is worth it."

PUBLIC LIBRARY NOTES.

The public library has been presented by Mr. Anthony Noltner with files of the Oregon Dispatch and the Oregon Standard, going back to 1858.

The new plan of the public library, for five-cent loans of popular books, extra copies, has proved a great success. Rabbi Wise has notified the public library of the intention of the Jewish people of Portland to contribute funds for the purchase of Hebrew literature. The children's room in the public library is again, with the opening of fall, becoming well patronized. A feature is interest and attendance of Chinese children, and many of them are being put upon the children's lists.
