

THE FIRE RELIEF

Money Coming in Right Along.

DRAMAS TOMORROW

Theater Performances, Athletic Exhibition and Concert Benefits.

The executive committee of the fire relief general committee met this morning at the rooms of the Merchants' Protective Association. Those present were Messrs. Hill, Devers, Rowe, Flegel, Fleischner, Sabin and Mrs. Dr. Cressey.

Mr. Sabin reported that a committee of prominent men from Lents called on him and gave him a detailed list of those in need. The committee went over this list carefully and approved it.

A letter was read from J. R. O'Donnell, Mayor of Elma, thanking the Portland people for their assistance and stating that no more is necessary at present.

Mr. Sabin also reported that he had sent out Valentine Brown to Washougl and La. Canas and C. W. Embury to the Lewis River country to investigate conditions there.

The committee wishes to announce that if anyone has any supplies, a wagon will be sent for them if the name and address is left at Ames & Harris' warehouse, or telephone Main 377.

GENEROUS PEOPLE.
Portland may well be called the most generous city in the West, by the way cash subscriptions and supplies are coming in for the relief of the fire sufferers. About \$500 was collected in the churches yesterday, and \$25.25 was netted in the musical benefit, making a total of \$525.25 contributed to date for this relief work.

Some of the benefits to be given for the fire sufferers, and which should be well remembered, are the performances at the Marquam and Baker Theaters tomorrow afternoon, the athletic exhibition at the Exposition building Friday evening and the concert and entertainment at Woodmen's hall tomorrow evening.

STATEMENT OF COMMITTEE.
The following statement has been issued by those having charge of the relief work:

To the Public:
The Fire Relief Committee, appointed Friday at the City Hall, met and organized Saturday morning and desires now through its officers to advise the people of the city of its plans.

First—Mr. R. L. Sabin, No. 1 Front street, Portland, Oregon, is secretary and treasurer of the committee. All correspondence relating to fire sufferers should be sent to him.

Second—Ames & Harris' warehouse, No. 12 Second street, has been selected as a central depot for the reception and distribution of all goods.

Churches, lodges and individuals having supplies for the sufferers, are requested to send them as early as possible to this central station.

Third—All persons who have already sent assistance to any of the needy districts are requested to report to Mr. Sabin in order that a complete record may be secured.

Fourth—All committees of relief in the burned districts are requested to communicate with the secretary of this committee, stating the needs in their localities in order that the work of relief may be simplified. Such local committees making application for assistance are urged to state specifically what is required in each line of supplies and in what amount.

Fifth—The public is requested to send in no more clothing except such as has already been gathered, until further announcement is made.

Sixth—The committee is now sending agents to the principal scenes of distress, and it is expected that the committee will be able in a few days to give more definite information as to needs.

The performance at the Baker will commence with "Nancy & Co." after which the "Lottery of Love" will be given. The performances will commence at 1:30 and will conclude at 5:30, representing four hours of continuous pleasure for those who are lucky enough to procure seats.

Messrs. Neill, Hellig and Baker are to be congratulated for carrying out these performances and the participants are to be highly commended for their unselfishness and large-heartedness in offering to perform a hard day's work for the benefit of the fire sufferers.

CONCERT AT WOODMEN'S HALL.
Another benefit which ought to net a good round sum is the concert and entertainment to be given tomorrow evening by the Milwaukee Band at Woodmen's Hall. The program will consist of musical selections, color dancing, legedmain, cake walks, quartets, etc. Miss Eva Scott and John Wetzel are to be commended for the untiring energy they are displaying to make this affair a grand success.

ATHLETICS—EXPOSITION BUILDING.
Something that will interest all who care anything for clean athletics will be the exhibition at the Exposition Building next Friday evening. The program for this exhibition has not as yet been announced, but it is known that Robert Fitzsimmons will box two rounds each with Tom Tracey, Alonzo Cook and his sparring partner. Tracey and Denny will also give a boxing exhibition of six rounds. Besides these there will be other numbers from members of the Multnomah and Portland Athletic Clubs. F. Alonzo Cook, "The Human Megaphone," will do the announcing. Every local amateur or professional athlete is invited to present his name at Tracey & Denny's for service at this exhibition.

LEAGUE IN SESSION
Will Elect Vice-President and Fourteen Delegates.

The executive committee of the Republican League of Oregon is now in session in the Hamilton building. The purpose of the meeting is to elect a vice-president, 14 delegates to the National Convention of Republican League to be held in Chicago October 2 and 3.

AGAINST THE NEGRO.

Prominent Railroad Men Here.

HOPKICKERS RETURN

Thirty-Four Cars of Livestock From Fair Came in Last Night.

F. J. Erfert, Assistant General Freight Agent of the Wisconsin Central Railway Company, of Milwaukee, arrived last morning on the 10:10 train. Mr. Erfert will remain about six or eight weeks looking over this country, and intends taking a lot of Portland advertising matter with him on his return East. He said to a Journal reporter this morning that the Northwest country presents grand opportunities for home seekers and while here he shall endeavor to study the advantages thoroughly, so as to be able to assist in advertising Oregon. Mr. Erfert and wife while here will remain at the Portland.

THOMPSON SPEAKS.
F. W. Thompson, General Western Agent of the Rock Island system, is in the city and is stopping at the Portland. Mr. Thompson was here in 1883 and stated to a Journal reporter that if it were not for two or three landmarks he would not recognize the city at all. He is greatly pleased with Portland, the amount of business done by the railroad in this city, particularly that of his line, which is under the supervision in this city of J. B. Graham, a most able railroad man.

In the course of conversation he said: "Yes, our office in this city has increased its business wonderfully, and can compare very favorably with that of other eastern roads having an office in Portland. We intend strengthening our Portland branch and do our share in advertising this country. I don't think there is a more wonderful or better country than Oregon, and would not be a bit surprised to see this state stride forward to amazing proportions in a very short time, both in wealth and population."

HOPKICKERS RETURNING.
Three carloads of hop-pickers from Brooks—about 450 in all—came in this morning from the hop fields. They report that all others are getting ready to go home and all hop-pickers will be back in a short time.

STOCK RETURNING.
Thirty-four cars of live stock came in from Salem last night, having been exhibited at the State Fair. The Southern Pacific Company have sent on another engine so that stock may be forwarded more promptly. Probably more live stock is coming up tonight.

ANNUAL INSPECTION.
The Southern Pacific annual inspection has started under the direction of J. H. Wallace, engineer of maintenance of way. The inspection board consists of Mr. Wallace and several division superintendents. They intend going as far as Dunsmuir.

SIoux CITY ELKS.
Making Preparations to Receive the President.

SIoux CITY, Ia., Sept. 22.—A big street parade marked the opening today of the Elks' street carnival, which will continue during the week. Shows are located on the principal business streets, and the city is gay with hunting and banners. For more than a month the work of preparation has been in progress. The streets are lined with booths decorated with the Elks' colors. Every day during the week there will be excursions into the city, bringing thousands of visitors. President Roosevelt will be here Friday and it will be the big day of the carnival. Other days have been designated as Sioux Falls and Tri-State Day, Traveling Men's Day and Children's Day.

OVER THE WIRES.
Marie Larsen was killed by a Coast Line passenger train at Stanwood, Wash., Friday. He leaves a wife and nine children.

The safe in the Meridian, Idaho, post office was blown up by burglars early Friday morning, between \$200 and \$300 being secured.

A report from Kingston, St. Vincent, H. W. I., says that there was another eruption of Mt. Soufriere early yesterday morning, but no loss of life.

The district fair and carnival at Baker City is a disappointment to the committee, the citizens and the visitors. The exhibits are meager and the attendance very light.

A correspondent of the London Chronicle cables from Vienna that neither Russia nor Austria will support the appeal of the United States in behalf of the Jews of Roumania.

In a fight with a posse, near Omaha, yesterday, Peter Olsen, who shot and killed his sweetheart in that city, September 8, received wounds from the effects of which he died.

Behind the bars at the Walla Walla penitentiary are 120 convicts who are serving sentences of ten years or over. Four are life men, and one is serving a sentence of 40 years.

A new ordinance in Helsingfors, Finland, provides that officials are placed beyond judicial prosecution without the consent of the survivors, and the officials are removable by the Senate.

Flour mill men of Minneapolis, have made a demand for an eight-hour day in the mills in that section, and unless their demand is complied with by September 29 there will be a general strike.

Meetings are to be held throughout Germany to protest against the high prices of wheat now prevailing in that country, and ask that authority be given Deputies to interpellate the government regarding the boycott on foreign meats.

A Paris dispatch says that the Duchess of Rochefoucauld, daughter of United States Senator John M. Mitchell, underwent an operation for appendicitis Saturday. The operation was successful and her convalescence today is entirely satisfactory.

Gus Kate, night marshal of Goldfield, Colo., was shot and killed by burglars in Stowe's drug store at an early hour yesterday morning. Kate saw two men enter the rear of the store and followed them in. They opened fire on him, shooting him through the heart.

Harry Strong, who was shot through the neck by Captain Miles W. Romney, the proprietor of the Ophir saloon, at Salt Lake, last Sunday afternoon, died at Holy Cross Hospital early yesterday morning. Strong was the adopted son of Dr. E. Treat Payne, of New York.

Moses T. Hale, ex-City Treasurer of Colorado Springs, charged with embezzlement of \$10,000 of city funds, withdrew his plea of not guilty and pleaded guilty in the District Court. Judge Seeds suspended sentence, saying that it appeared that the shortage, which was incurred through the defendant's generosity to friends, had been settled by his brother, Willard Hale.

YOUNG IS ARRESTED

Derby Man Identified as Suspected Murderer.

HIS FATHER CABLES

Will Assist Son If He Gives Himself Up "Like a Man."

DERBY, Conn., Sept. 22.—The man arrested here who gave the name of Edwards and claimed as his residence Portland, Oregon, has been identified as William Hooper Young, wanted for the murder of Mrs. Pulitzer.

ADVICE OF FATHER.
NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—Attorney Hart, who has been engaged by John W. Young, father of the accused murderer of Mrs. Pulitzer, received a cable today with a request to give it to the newspapers and to William Hooper Young: "I hear you are suspected of a heinous crime and being sought for. I advise you to surrender to the officers and face the charge like a man. No one knowing you believes you to be guilty, and you owe it to yourself, your family and the religion you forsook, to prove your innocence. If you take this course, I will stand by you."

CLAIMED PORTLAND HOME.
DERBY, Conn., Sept. 22.—The man being held on suspicion of being the murderer of Mrs. Pulitzer in New York last week, told the police this morning that his name was Burt Edwards. He claims to have a daughter, Mrs. Jennie, the wife of Henry Caruthers, living at 820, Sixth street, Portland, Oregon. He says that he left Portland four years ago and has been tramping ever since, through New England. He claims that he has been working at intervals in different towns throughout the country. When asked by the authorities he positively refused to fill a photo. The description of the man tallies with that of the murderer of Mrs. Pulitzer, W. H. Young. The New York police have wired instructions to the authorities here to hold the suspect until the arrival of detectives who will be sent to identify the man.

[Diligent inquiry has been made at the number mentioned, but no such person is known there.]

OFFICERS GO TO DERBY.
NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—On receipt of information that a man had been captured on suspicion of being the murderer of Mrs. Pulitzer, detectives were immediately sent to Derby, Conn., to decide whether or not the suspect, giving the name of Burt Edwards, and held there, is the man wanted for the murder of Mrs. Pulitzer.

FORESTRY ASSOCIATION.

The Waverly, Wash., beet sugar factory has commenced operations. About 125 persons are employed.

Amelia McLean, the wild girl of the Walla Walla River, has been located in Walla Walla, where she has been quietly staying for a day or two after leaving the country districts. She says she ran away on account of ill treatment, and that she will not go back.
