DOINGS IN OREGON CITY

Clackamas County Items and Matters at the Big Falls.

(Journal Special Service.)
OREGON CITY, Sept. 22.—At the adjourned meeting of the Council which was held last evening to consider the franchise asked for by the Oregon Water Power & Railway Company, the former franchise was withdrawn and a new one substituted. The Council went into committee of the whole to consider the terms of the franchise.

By the new franchise the company asked for a right of way on Third street from the S. P. Company's right of way to the river and to be allowed to unload and load freight on this street. It also agreed to run freight trains consisting of not more than three cars only twice a day between the hours of 7 a. m. and 7 p. m. After these hours they asked to be allowed to run as many and as long trains as needed. Section 10 provided for the payment for the first five years of a license of \$400.00 a year, the next five years \$300.00 a year, and for the next 15 years \$200.00 a year. Section 11 reduced the time formerly asked for a period of 25 to 35 years. This franchise, if granted, will not affect the one now in force other than to regulate the running of freight cars on Main street.

Much objection was offered on several of the sections and two at least were not passed upon. The matter of setting a stated tax on the running of the cars for so long a time ahead was a point on which most of the Councilmen objected, they thinking it unfair and unwise to burden future Councils at this date. Section 11 pertained to section 10 so both were passed over to be acted upon later. Strong objection was made against the unloading of cars on Third street, but this was compromised by allowing the loading and unloading to be done on the half west of Main street.

Mr. Morris, of the company, was present and explained any and all points arising. One point explained was that the farmers of the Springwater country wanted to trade in this city so would ship their goods over his new road now building from Springwater into Portland. This new road will connect with the main line not further south than Milwaukie. He also said that he intended to put up a freight depot to cost about \$5,000 at the corner of Third and Main streets. After all the sections had been disposed of the committee decided itself and will report at the next regular meeting of the Council.

This is the night for the big concert which is to be given by the Macabees for the benefit of the fire sufferers of Clackamas County. Seidman has the opportunity been offered the people of Oregon City to witness such an array of talent as will appear in the armory this evening. Senator Geo. C. Brownell will make the first big speech of the season. Miss Ditchburn, of Portland, who is known all over Oregon as an eloquent speaker, has promised to recite and the Macabees quartet will do its best tonight. But these are only a few who will assist in the program, which has been arranged as follows:

It concerns Oregon of the past, particularly of the time when Lewis and Clark were in the country and after this until this territory was well settled toward statehood.

EUGENE.

EUGENE, Sept. 22.—At a meeting of the Golden Slipper Mining Company, operating in the Bohemia district, held in this city, the following officers were elected: President, W. W. Oglesby, of Junction City; vice-president, W. Shannon Conner, of Portland; secretary-treasurer, M. O. Warner, of Eugene. The company owns some valuable properties on which extensive development work is now being done.

Frank R. Jones, employed in the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company's sawmill at Springfield, met with a severe accident this morning. He was thrown against one of the big saws, his left foot coming in contact with the edge of the saw with the result that the greater part of the foot was torn off. He was brought to the Eugene hospital where the wound was dressed.

Many hundreds of people are now coming into Eugene from outside points to attend the street fair which begins Wednesday. The hotel accommodations are already taxed to house the crowds, and when the fair opens, many private families will have to take roomers and boarders. Great arrangements are now being made for the opening of the fair. All the tents have been erected and the enclosure fence has been finished. Queen Marie I has appointed her attendants as follows: Maids of honor, Misses Wanda Logan, Helene Robinson, Eva Allen and Marvel Kauffman. Flower girls, Vera Kauffman and Lucille Abrams; Pages, Gladys Wilkins and Lenore Haines. Atorney Chas. A. Hardy has been appointed Prime Minister to the Queen.

The Hotel Smeede, formerly the Hotel Eugene, was formally reopened to the public yesterday by W. M. Renshaw. A new addition three stories high and 50 feet in dimensions has been erected and new furnishings throughout have been installed.

The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Guy Lester died here today.

PENDLETON.

PENDLETON, Sept. 22.—Lee Smith, wanted in Union County for theft, is in the county jail awaiting the arrival of an officer to take him back to the scene of his crime. It is alleged he stole a horse and saddle at La Grande last November.

Frank Earnhart and Matt Shackelford became engaged in an altercation on Main street, when the former drew a revolver and Shackelford beat a hasty retreat. Earnhart was arrested and taken before Justice Fitzgerald, who fined him \$17 for carrying concealed weapon.

For the first week of the Pendleton public schools are making an excellent showing. The increase in attendance has been small since the first day, but each day has seen a few added to all the classes. The attendance at the academy shows a marked increase, and President Forbes expects a successful year. About 20 students are taking the German, and a Greek class has been added.

Many new dwellings are being erected in various portions of the city, and Mrs. Lina Sturgis has under consideration the construction of a \$10,000 home on Water street.

VANCOUVER NEWS NOTES

What They Are Talking of In the City Across the Columbia.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 22.—Nearly \$200 in cash and over \$500 in merchandise has been subscribed by the citizens of Vancouver to the relief fund for the fire sufferers of Clark County. About \$200 has been collected among the officers at the Barracks which will go to aid the old soldiers and discharged enlisted men, who suffered losses by the recent fire. The County Commissioners assumed the payment of bills amounting to \$600, for supplies purchased by the relief committee. State Senator E. M. Rands visited Congressman James asking for a donation of 100,000 pounds of grass seed for the devastated districts. He received a reply that the request had been put before the Secretary of Agriculture.

FOR THE FIRE SUFFERERS.
Tomorrow night the big benefit entertainment for the fire sufferers will be given by the Artisans at the Auditorium. It is the first benefit to be given in Vancouver for this laudable purpose, and will accordingly be liberally patronized by the people of this city. Demand for tickets has been quite lively, and the sales reported today give substantial evidence of the interest taken in the charity performance. There is every reason to believe that the receipts from the entertainment will aggregate about three hundred dollars. An excellent program has been arranged, and it will be a rare treat at a most reasonable price of admission.

The large crops, tremendous through and local traffic have made it necessary for the O. & N. C. to borrow 600 freight cars from the Union Pacific in order to promptly handle the farm products of Eastern Oregon and Washington.

With the exception of the cleaning up of a few yards, the picking of this year's hop crop has been completed near Salem and the crop has been saved without the loss of a bale of hops by reason of bad weather. A few sales have been made at 22½ cents, but most of the growers are holding.

The recent abolition of the old Umatilla Indian reservation in Eastern Oregon and the discontinuance of the office of Indian agent, is in line with the general policy of Indian Commissioner Jones, who believes at the proper time, in throwing the Indian upon his own resources.

William Beasley, Republican, has tendered his resignation as constable of Astoria precinct. He was elected in June over William Kelly. Mr. Beasley has taken up a claim in Washington and loses his residence here.

The new barracks buildings at Fort Columbia will be turned over to the Government about October 1, and a short time afterward annual target practice will be held there.

The cold storages are taking most of the fish caught now and the two canneries which are running are receiving only enough to justify operations every other day.

A lodge of Red Men, with 35 charter members, was instituted at Skamokawa Saturday night. About 150 members of other lower river lodges were present to assist in conferring the degrees.

W. G. Atwood, chief engineer and topographer of the Alaska Central Railway Company, has arrived from the North, and in a report made to the local representatives of the company states that a feasible route has been found from the Tanana River to the summit of the Alaskan range.

Mr. A. U. Bowersox, of the Red Crown Mill, returned yesterday from Des Moines, Ia., where he attended the Supreme Lodge of Odd Fellows.

Webster Wright left today for Canyonville, where he has accepted a position as teacher in the public school.

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GRANTS PASS.

GRANTS PASS, Sept. 22.—The first meeting of the semi-centennial conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, was held here yesterday. There was an examination of graduates at the church, conducted by Bishop Cranston, and a public meeting and lecture by Bishop S. Gamble of Kansas. Business meetings will be held each afternoon, and public meetings each evening throughout the week. There are a large crowd of visiting delegates and ministers from all parts of the state and country in the city attending the conference.

A new steamer has arrived from Portland and been put in service on lower Rogue River. The new steamer is the property of the Rogue River Packing & Navigation Company, and will be operated by them. It will be used mainly to transport fish, produce, and ore from the property of the company to Gold Beach, where it will be transferred to ocean vessels. The Rogue River Packing & Navigation Company, under the management of Captain E. E. Burns, operate the Mule quartz mine, on the lower Rogue, near the mouth of the Illinois. This mine was purchased as a prospect and has been developed and equipped by the Rogue River Company.

There are over 25 residences and business buildings being erected in Grants Pass at this time, in spite of the depression and delays that have been caused by the fire. Material is higher and more difficult to get, and carpenters are more scarce than they have ever been before, but notwithstanding this, Grants Pass is enjoying the greatest building activity in its history.

Consul H. E. Miller was in Grants Pass yesterday looking after his business interests and meeting old friends and acquaintances. Mr. Miller says he has never seen Southern Oregon look so prosperous and he regrets to leave it. He and Mrs. Miller will depart in a few weeks for the Orient, where Mr. Miller will once again take up his consular duties.

The trial of Cal Griffin for the shooting and killing of Edwin Johnson, was begun today in the Josephine Circuit Court, though but little was done further than the selection of a jury.

Returning hunters report that there are an abundance of deer in the Southern Oregon mountains this season. Very few have any trouble in bagging the five allowed by law. The strict vigil of wardens and the rigid enforcement of the game laws is largely accountable for this favorable condition of things.

OREGON BRIEFS.

A postoffice has been established at Greenback, Josephine County, Or., with Carey W. Thompson as postmaster.

Employees of the Willamette Pulp & Paper Co., at Oregon City, donated \$38 to the relief of the fire sufferers.

In the last Friday of the well-known by the state penitentiary water was pumped through a 4½-inch pipe at the rate of 72,000 gallons an hour.

With practically all the wheat crop of the Willamette Valley in the stack, it is apparent the crop will be not less than 20 per cent short of last year.

Lee Houser, 9 years old, while attempting to board a moving train at McMinnville Monday, fell on the rails, the wheels passing over his right leg.

Fred M. Perkins, son of W. T. Perkins, of Salem, has successfully admitted all the examinations for his admission to the naval academy at Annapolis.

The farmhouse owned by James Hays, two miles southeast of Corvallis, was burned with much of the contents Saturday. The loss is about \$2000; insurance on the building, \$1000.

Secretary of State Dunbar has assigned seats to as many members of the Legislature as have requested them, and has proceeded upon the usual rule of "first come, first served."

Jack Jones fell about 25 feet at the Portland General Electric station at Oregon City Monday afternoon, and was badly bruised and crushed. He was taken to his home on a stretcher.

For 1901 Oregon's total gross postal receipts from Presidential offices was \$404,340, and for 1902 it reached \$462,194. Washington's receipts have advanced from \$908,512 to \$1,235,235; and Idaho's receipts from \$112,719 to \$135,672.

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ALBANY.

ALBANY, Sept. 22.—All the hops in the yards in this vicinity have been picked. The season has been an ideal one for picking, and not for many years has the crop been so large, or the quality so fine. It is estimated that the crop in the Willamette Valley will yield between 80,000 and 90,000 bales this season.

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NEWS OF THE STATE CAPITAL

Matters of Interest of and to Salem and Marion County.

SALEM, Sept. 22.—State Treasurer Charles S. Moore yesterday received \$2570.36 for Douglas County, the balance due on account of the state tax levy for 1901, from that county.

Prof. J. H. Ackerman, Superintendent of Public Instruction, has deposited \$400 with the State Treasurer, to be placed in the examiner's fund. This money was collected in fees from successful applicants for state diplomas and certificates. W. T. Perkins, chief clerk in the state treasury, yesterday received a telegram from his son, Fred M. Perkins, now at Annapolis Naval Academy, stating that he had successfully passed the examination for admission to the academy. The young man was graduated from the Salem public schools last spring.

Salem is to have a new band. Prof. W. E. McElroy, at present director of the Fourth Regiment Band of Eugene, has been selected to take charge of and organize a band in this city. A committee is today interviewing the business men to secure support for a band of 25 pieces, and they are meeting with excellent success.

The Marion County Board of Equalization is in session at the Court House. About the only complaint received by the board yesterday was one from one of the companies interested in the water ditch and franchise, which was this year assessed at \$50,000. The companies interested object to being taxed, holding that it is an illegal assessment.

ROSEBURG.

Mrs. A. W. Coon has returned from Portland, to which place she went some time ago for medical treatment. She is greatly improved.

Barker & Childs have sold their farm at Dixonville to parties from Dakota. The price paid was \$10,000.

Mrs. Lora Bush, formerly of Roseburg, was recently married in Portland to a Mr. Rhiner. This lady's married experience is a remarkable one. She was born at Dixonville in this county, her parents still residing on the old homestead. "She was first married to a man named Shaufler, who was killed in a railroad accident, his lower limbs being severed.
