Senatorial Commission
to Investigate Charges.

THE CROWN LANDS

Hawaiians Believe American Min-
ister Caused the Overthrow—
Ask Compensation.

(Journal Special Service.)
HONOLULU, Sept. 27.—The Board of Health has granted permission to the Republican central committee to speak to the lepers regarding illegal habitation. Mackay has the cable-house at Waikiki completed.
The Senatorial Commission is to visit the leper colony personally and investigate the charges.
The Kawaihae crown lands questions came up before the commission and Prince Kuhio stated that the sentiment of the Hawaiians was that compensation should be made to the Queen for the crown lands and revenues taken away.
MITCHELL QUESTIONS.
Senator Mitchell asked who the natives thought was responsible for the overthrow and was answered that the Hawaiians believed that American Minister Stevens, by calling ashore the marines from the Boston was responsible. There would have been no overthrow if there had been no American troops. Burton asked if the United States should make further compensation to the Queen and would it make a better feeling. The Prince said yes. Capt. Brown, Attorney-General under the monarchy, said that the landing of the marines was not the cause of the overthrow, but they had prevented bloodshed. He said that nine-tenths of the people of Hawaii and foreign islands favored some compensation to the Queen.

ASKED PROTECTION.
HILO, Sept. 27.—Coffee men appeared before the commission and asked for protection against the cheap labor of Guatemala and South America, also 8 cents per pound duty or bounty.

The fierer of the shot must have watched Walling retire for the night before attempting the murderous work.

ADDITIONAL RELICS

Captain Edwards' Museum Re-
ceives Strengthening.

The museum of Captain Edwards, the vessel inspector, is rapidly growing larger. Many curious articles are being added to it from time to time. The latest additions are three white rabbit skins from Alaska, also reindeer moss and nan and bird spears from the same place. These were presented to Captain Edwards by Captain P. M. Crim, of the steamer North King.

One of the latest additions is an axe from the steamer Annie Faxon, which blew up on the Snake River, August 14, 1893. In this accident eight people were killed and eight wounded. The axe laid on the bottom of the river for over two years, when it was picked up by a member of the crew of the steamer Lewiston with a boat hook.

Another curiosity is the Euplectella Speciosa from Manila. It is also called the queen of the glass-sponges. It is a graceful, cornucopia, formed of delicate lace of a square, measured texture. Every angle is softened and rounded in effect by the weaving and interweaving of other filaments.

Mrs. Julia Simpson-Brisco Dead.

Mrs. Julia Simpson-Brisco died this morning at her residence, 408 East Ankeny street, of dropsy caused by heart trouble. She was 54 years of age and leaves four children: Eugene Simpson, of Whatcom; Claud Simpson, a newspaper man of this city; U. S. Brisco and Miss Ethel Brisco, of Whatcom. What Mrs. Brisco was the wife of Sam I. Simpson, Oregon's famous poet, and is a sister of Dr. T. C. Humphrey, of this city. The funeral will be held tomorrow, the place of interment being Mt. Zion cemetery.

IS READY TO DIE

Death Watch Has Been Placed to
Insure His Safety.

A. L. Belding, the condemned murderer, faces his fate as if it were an everyday occurrence with him. He partook of a hearty breakfast this morning and to all appearances enjoyed a restful sleep last night. So far he has made no requests of the officers.

He is confined in the murderer's cell with another prisoner to whom he freely converses on trivial matters. He maintains the same stolidity of expression he did yesterday afternoon when the court sentenced him to be hanged on Friday, October 31, 1902. He seems to realize fully the enormity of the crime he committed and takes his sentence as if he were paying a debt he owed. His perfect composure and self-control makes him an enigma to those who come in contact with him.

UNDER DEATH WATCH.

Sheriff Storey has placed a death watch over the condemned man who cautiously watch every movement and sees that he holds no communication with visitors and curiosity seekers.

At the conclusion of the sentence Messrs. Murphy & Watts, who defended him, asked and were granted until October 15 to prepare a bill of exceptions for an appeal to the Supreme Court.

THE KING ESTATE.

N. A. and E. A. King and Richard W. Montague filed articles of incorporation of the King estate in the County Clerk's office yesterday. The objects of the incorporation is to manage the estate of the late A. M. King. The capital stock of the incorporation is \$200,000.

The executors of the will filed their final account with the County Clerk yesterday. The account shows \$24,849 receipts and \$24,534 disbursements, including taxes and a note of \$11,560.
The devisees under the will are: Fanny G. King, Mantilla A. Jeffery, Lucy A. Lundsen, N. A. King and Edward A. King.

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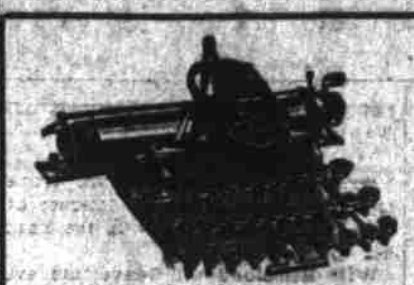
