Kostal Pitches Great Game But Was Retired—Pennant Situation.

If one were to take a hop, skip and jump down the automobile path of history and wind up at a period of the country's infancy, when the big mountain with an alias was a mere ant hill, and the Sound of Puget a polywog puddle, they would not be able to locate a time when the bonds of peace and tranquillity between Soundites and their Southern brothers were united with veritable anchor chains of strength as at present. The cause for the joyous affiliation is the walloping the Vigneux gave to the big sluggers from Butte yesterday in an argument they had in the ball garden. For once Seattle people are sincerely pleased over the success of a Portland venture. Where heretofore the lads with the striped socks were called names by them, which by rigid interpretation would be closely allied to shell fish, they are now elevated to heights of their glory which would make them National pennant-winners in this world and angels in the next. Under the circumstances it is possible that the natives of the Klondike outfitting station will say some real nice things about the Oreganians. Some of them may even go so far as to scatter traditions and customs to the winds, and in a spirit of kindness insinuate that the ships are no longer hoisted over the elevations at the mouth of the Columbia with derricks, and may in time be snaked over the bar with a block and tackle.

GAVE SEATTLE A BOOST.
At any rate the Portland ball team gave Seattle a substantial boost in her spirit for the championship race by holding down McCloskey's men. Butte and Seattle are nose and nose in the race and on the home stretch. If the visitors can be dumped for a number of the games of the series, and the team at the top of the column can make good in its own pasture, the clubs from Montana will wend their way homeward shy the emblem of victory.

The Buttes came to Portland under the delusion that defeating Portland would be like getting money from home. After the game they went away back and set down to meditate over how it happened. Kane was the first man to try his luck. He made a couple of fierce swings but the stick met nothing but Indian summer atmosphere. In the last hit he touched up for a little grounder to Deisel and went out for too great anxiety to reach the second sack.

THE SECOND HALF.

In the second half Muller went to bat and sent a grounder to third, where it was fumbled by McIntyre. Van Buren and Weed made the identical hits and McIntyre, to show he was not playing any favorites, made two more errors. Anderson grabbed the slab and with three men on the sacks made a hit to center which let in Muller and Van Buren. Stoval hit to short stop and was out at first, which play let in Weed. Vigneux wound up things by sending a foul to third.

SECOND—McIntyre hit to Deisel and died on first. McCloskey was given a pass and was ditched at second on a hit by Zeafroos. Anderson was a little sluggish in delivering the ball to first and the batter was safe. McHale made a short bunt which was chased down by Vigneux and sent to the initial sack in time to do business. Second half—Murdock and Kostal fanned. Helset hit for first and Muller died on a short hit.

THIRD—Knox knocked a hot liner over the head of the pitcher. It was stopped by Deisel and sent to first, to which the runner tried to beat the ball by a mighty slide. Salisbury made a foul bunt which found a resting place in Vigneux's hands. Kane made a base by a hit to center. Marshall sent a grounder to the far left but the speedy fielding of Muller gave him only one base. Weed flied to Anderson. Portland—Van Buren sent a grounder to first which beat him to the bag. Weed hit a pop to the pitcher and was swatted at first. Anderson sent his little roller to McIntyre, who after three straight errors scooped it up and got it to first in time.

FOURTH—McIntyre hit to center and wandered on to third on a hit by McCloskey and an error. Zeafroos died on first. McHale flied and McIntyre died trying to get to the plate on the play. Knox was passed. Salisbury died on first with the bases pointed. Portland—Stoval hit for first. Vigneux sacrificed. Murdock out on first. Kostal flied to right field.

MULLER WAS SLIPPERY.
FIFTH—Kane base on balls. Marshall flied. Ward to Miller. McIntyre hit to second and caught Kane. Portland—Kostal sent a grounder through the hands of McIntyre. Muller hit a grounder along the first-base line, which was picked up by McCloskey, who stood near the line to touch the runner, but Muller passed him like a flash and made first. Van Buren went out on a bunt and Weed and Anderson flied.

SIXTH—McCloskey flied to Van Buren. Zeafroos sent a grounder to the left field. McHale sent a bullet-like drive which

caught Kostal in the boom and put him out of business. While fanning Kostal sent the ball to first and made a pretty double in getting Zeafroos before he could return from the lead to second. Portland—Stoval flied to center. Vigneux reached first on an error and stole second. Murdock got a pass. Deisel died on first and Engle, who took the place of Kostal, flied.

SEVENTH—Knox flied. Salisbury fanned. Kane flied. Portland—Anderson and Van Buren flied and Weed died at first.

EIGHTH—Marshall died first. Ward hit a grounder and died at second on a hit by McIntyre. McCloskey passed and Zeafroos flied. Portland—Anderson and Stoval died on first. Vigneux got a pass and reached second on a hit by Murdock and came home on a two-bagger by Deisel. Engle flied to left field.

NINTH—McHale Knox and Shills—who batted for Salisbury—all made base hits. Kane went to bat with the bases all occupied and no one out. He made a hit to Deisel and McHale came in on an error. Marshall flied. Ward flied to Murdock and the game ended after an exciting finish.

THREE-EYE MEETING.

ROCKFORD, Ill., Oct. 1.—The Rockford team won the pennant this year in the Indiana-Illinois-Iowa Baseball League, and as a penalty for their good luck the directors of the local club are today winning and dining their fellow-magnates of the league. The occasion is the annual fall meeting to wind up the affairs of the season. The summer has been one of record-breaking success for the league, both as regards sport and finances. The playing of the several clubs has compared well with that of the bigger leagues, while the gate receipts have been uniformly good. Before adjourning the league owners will elect officers for the year, but it is not probable that anything definite will be done in the way of arranging the circuit for next season until a meeting to be held at a later date.

CHEERFUL OUTLOOK FOR TIGERS.
PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 1.—Princeton begins its football season here this afternoon with a game against the Swarthmore College eleven. Captain Davis believes he has a winning team this year and is anxious to see the showing the men make against the visitors. For nearly a month the Princeton players have been training faithfully and appear to be in splendid condition. The season's schedule provides for ten games. Neither Pennsylvania nor Harvard is included in the list, but Yale, Cornell and Columbia will be tackled late in the season.

THE WHEAT EXPORT
Shipments From Columbia River for the Month of September.

For the month of September just closed the wheat exports from Portland amounted to 638,578 bushels; barley, 23,000 bushels; flour, 10,754 barrels, and oats, 122,000 bushels. The ships clearing, their destination and cargo, follow:

ADVANCE IN MEATS

Eastern Packed, Up By the Trust.

PORTLAND MARKETS

White Bean Excitement --- Other Front Street Market Features.

Meats were the only market lines changing prices materially today. Armour marked up hams and bacon right through the list. Western breakfast bacon went to 17¢, from recent standing quotation of 16¢17¢. Eastern packed hams are up 1¢. Eastern breakfast bacon up 1¢.

The California white beans market is excited over the Eastern situation. The Eastern states are buying in large quantities and the market bids fair to soar. Prices are being made on the Eastern catch of mackerel, both foreign and domestic. The figure is not yet made but is sure to be as high as formerly, and that has been at an advance of from 10 to 25 per cent over the usual.

FRUITS AND VEGETABLES.

Receipts of fruits and vegetables ruled light, and prices were strong. Only apples are coming freely now. Oregon quinces are about ready to come in, and the crop is expected to be fine. Thimble-moon cranberries are being received and selling at \$4.50 per half barrel, holding the starting price of a few days ago for Oregon. Eastern berries are now holding off, apparently for a good price when the home berries are gone.

BULLS AND BEARS.

The hop market, so far as there is any, is a squabble between the bulls and the bears, the former representing the growers. The arrivals looked for today are 400 bales, which having been reported sold at better than 22 cents, caused something of a flurry. The bears, who maintain that there is no price above 20 cents, claimed that the transaction was on a mortgaged lot, that represented a cost of 21¢ or 22 cents per pound, and that if they had been sold at 22 cents, as claimed, or better, there was only a small commission in it anyhow. One dealer claimed that of this lot some had been sold at 21 cents, so at a loss. Recent sales of Oregon primes reach 1000 bales, believed to have brought 21 and 22 cents. The open quotations remain at 20 to 22 cents.

WHEAT MARKET.

Wheat has ruled off a trifle under recent heavy receipts, standing 62¢ Walla Walla, Blue Stem 64 to 64½¢. Flour is pouring in, and threatens to completely swamp the dealers. The price is liable to be cut heavier than has been done yet within a day or two. The butter scare is regarded as over, and no further rise likely for a time at least.

Armour & Co. have decided to take on butter, eggs, cheese and in fact a full line of products, except vegetables. They carry these lines in all their houses in the United States, except Portland, and will take the lines on permanently.
