BRIEF FETITION FOR PARDON. Governor T. T. Geer is in receipt of a petition for the pardon of two men servog life sentences from Malheur County-John Bailey and William Bailey. The petition is brief and to the point

"We, the undersigned citizens of Malheur County, State of Oregon, most respectfully ask that you grant pardons to John Balley and William Bailey, sentenced from Malheur County to life imprisonment in the Oregon penitentiary for murder in the second degree.
