Sousa's Band, which will be heard here this afternoon and evening, will finish its tour in New York the middle of December and will then leave on a three months' trip through Europe.

The Portland Railway Company is experiencing a great deal of trouble in securing stone blocks in such quantities as to keep up with their track improvements on Washington street.

Harrington Camp, Spanish-American War Veterans, proceeded to Oregon City last night and initiated 22 new applicants. No doubt a new camp will shortly be organized in that city.

The old sidewalk around the police station is being torn up and replaced by a cement walk. This is the first time in many years that any improvements of this kind have been made in that locality.

Gas pipes are being laid along Seventh street, between Couch and Giffen, also on Davis street, to enable the gas company to furnish gas to the many people in the neighborhood who have asked for it.

The Portland Directory for 1902 is out and the delivery of it to the many subscribers is going on as rapidly as possible. It is a new directory and it is expected that it will obtain same by calling at the office 622-523 Marquam building.

Many inquiries have been made in regard to the reason for covering the lawn on the north side of the Custom-House with ground. Custom-House officials state that it is the intention to raise the ground to a level with the curb and by next spring new grass will grow there.

Quite a number of property owners on Seventh street between Taylor and Morrison streets are putting down stone crosswalks in place of wood. The street is now being paved with asphalt and the property owners are keeping pace with the march of improvements.

Constable Adkins has placed under arrest Attorney A. B. Ferrer, charged with assault with a deadly weapon, in taking five shots at a man named Zeno Lucas. He was released on his own recognizance. The case will be heard before Justice Reid on Monday.

The contractors to Marshall Bros. and Smith & Howard for the construction of cement walks on Fifth and Sixth streets cover quite a distance. In all nearly three miles of walks will be laid. It is expected that the improvements will be completed before the holidays.

The jury in the case of the George P. Rowell Advertising Company against Ellis G. Hughes et al., who were partners doing business under the name of the Pacific Immigration Board, for \$170 alleged to be due on an advertising contract, found for the defendants late yesterday.

August Kratz, who was arrested for keeping his saloon open after hours, did not show up in the Municipal Court yesterday for trial and forfeited his bail of \$5. Judge Hogue will give his decision in the case of the Quille when the attorneys submit some authorities to show just what constitutes a saloon.

The directors of the Portland Rose Society met in the office of F. W. Holman yesterday and decided to bring to the attention of the public the need of autumn gardening in preparation for next year's roses. It is the desire of the society to increase the interest in rose growing so that the city will be known as the "Rose City" by the time of the Lewis and Clark Fair.

Another old wooden building is to be torn down and replaced with a brick one. The lessee of the lot on Fourth street, just north of Alder, has decided to tear down the old structure and erect in its stead a one-story brick building. It will have 60 feet frontage on Fourth street and the work will be commenced as soon as possible.

The Mazamas are preparing for an outing at Macleay Park Saturday afternoon. Those who participated in the Mount Hood outing last year and the Mount Adams trip this year, whether members of the society or not, will be most welcome. Refreshments will be served, but each one is requested to bring a small lunch for the general spread. A fanatical parade will be formed at dark and take up the trail which leads to the City Park.

LIVE ON THE WATER

Large Number of Scows Fringe the River Bank.

GOOD PEOPLE AND INDIFFERENT

Estimated That 100 Families Live in These Floating Houses.

If all the people living in scows on the Willamette River were residing in a town by themselves, they would make a very respectable looking little city. On both sides of the river, extending from one end of Portland to the other, these boat-houses are dotted here and there, and some of them are grouped close together.

It is conservatively estimated that fully 100 families, with five members to each, are living in scows. In addition to these a great many housewives have their abiding places on the water, as well as a class of people who are known as "river pirates." This latter element live by pilfering at night, and the shunned by all the neighboring residents. In this little world the lines of social distinction are drawn as closely as on land. The "pirates" are constantly carrying on their vocation of petty thievery, and have given police officers no end of trouble. Upon returning from their midnight escapades, they suspect they are being watched, they rapidly shift their small scows to some new location where they are comparatively safe from molestation. Many sacks of flour mysteriously disappear during each year from the docks, and the owners are forced to put the matter down in their ledgers to their loss and the "pirates' gain."

GOOD CITIZENS.

On the other hand some very respectable and refined people are inhabitants of the river colony. The principal object they have in view by residing in scows is to save exorbitant rents, fuel and water bills. A sufficient quantity of drift wood is caught to supply them, and many springs of fine water are found on either bank of the river. Many of the houses are nicely furnished, and the small rooms look cozy and inviting. In front of some of them are large pots of earth in which vines have grown up and fallen in clusters above the doors and window lattices. A few of these little habitations are painted in bright colors and form a striking contrast to the weather-beaten floaters in the vicinity.

The ease with which they can be moved to new locations is another of the strong reasons that some people choose to live on the water. The proprietor is usually a workman. If his employment is in South Portland he shifts his house to that part of the city. If in North Portland he moves down river, or to any other location where he will be handy to his work.

When night comes and the hour for retirement has arrived, the gang plank is removed, the house safely anchored, and the family is by itself in peace and quietness, and the members are gently rocked to sleep on the softly rolling waves of the placid Willamette.
