WEATHER FORECAST.

A disturbance of moderate energy is central over western Colorado. It has caused rain in Utah, Colorado, Kansas and Nebraska. Elsewhere west of the Mississippi River fair weather prevails, with seasonable temperatures.

The weather is foggy along the north California coast, and light frosts occurred this morning at Spokane and Boise.

The indications are for partly cloudy weather in western Oregon and western Washington Sunday, with probably showers in the Sound country. Showers are also indicated for southern Idaho.

Have Paid All Expenses and Leave a Balance on Hand.

The first chapter of Portland free swimming baths has just ended by a report of the treasurer of the institution on the first season's business. Following is the report:

Edward Holman, Esq., President Portland Free Swimming Baths, Portland, Or.—Dear Sir: I now enclose statement of receipts and expenditures in connection with the Portland Free Swimming Baths to this date. The total collections from all sources amount to \$5541.27, and the total expenditure to \$3239.32, leaving the handsome sum of \$2301.95 at the credit of the baths, to be carried forward to next season.

IS SELF-SUPPORTING.

Notwithstanding the fears of many that such an institution could not be self-supporting, it is a great pleasure to note that the collections at the baths have practically liquidated the cost of managing the baths for the present season.

The cost of construction, insurance and providing bathing suits, towels, curtains and other appurtenances, almost equals the amount of the subscriptions.

I regret that there are still a few subscriptions outstanding, but another effort will be made to collect the same and these will augment the present credit by a sum of about \$200.

I was gratified with the ready manner in which almost all of the subscribers paid for their subscriptions, and am much indebted to Mr. Robert Ends for collecting the subscriptions for me in the business part of the city.

ANOTHER KICK

Prominent Citizen Objects to Tearing Up Third Street.

"I wonder when the Third street car tracks will be replaced and the street be placed in regular condition," said a well-known citizen today. "This street, which is one of the principal ones in the city, has been in a torn-up condition now for weeks. It has hurt business considerably."

"I recognize the fact that new tracks must be put down on this street, but I object to having the whole street torn up at one time. Why could not the railway company tear up one block at a time, fix it up and then take the others in the same way? In this manner the whole street would not be blocked to travel and would present a much better condition. At the present time there are two ditches in the middle of the street, with a lot of gravel on one side and tracks on the other, making the street almost totally impassable by vehicles. I think this should be remedied at once."

"The city authorities should take this matter up and request the City and Suburban Railway Company to have their work done so that it should not inconvenience the public so much."
