The past week has seen the Portland Academy lads rapidly rounding into condition for their coming games. They were disappointed in not being able to secure a game last Saturday, but expect to have one every week from now on. Next Saturday they will probably go to Chemawa and play the strong Indian eam. The Saturday following they will play the Hill Military Academy team the first of a series of two best out of three games. Saturday, November 1, they will go to Albany to play the Albany College, After that comes the second game with Hill Military, and the game with the High school on November 15

In the meantime games will be played during the week with the Medical and Dental College teams. This schedule makes it evident that the boys are not afraid of work, and that they are willing to meet all teams that are thought to be anywhere near the academy team's class, They have their work cut out, and no one who has seen them practice doubts that they will give a good account of themselves. The squad has been greatly strengthened of late by the addition several new players who give promise of making the team stronger.

FOOTBALL. Whitman College Tootball team will arrive in the city Friday morning and rest one day before their contest with Multnomah on Saturday. Both teams are very fast in play and are confident of winning. Whitman defeated Forest Grove in two short halves by a score of 28 to 0. This proves they are playing very fast ball. The Multnomah team have not lined up once this season and will likely be weak on defensive work.

The various baseball leagues throughout the country have finished the work of the year, with the exception of the California league. The season has been larger than for several years. Some of the clubs have been neck and neck through the entire summer.

AMERICAN LEAGUE. In the American League Philadelphia is at the head of the percentage column, having won 83 out of 136 games. St. Lbuis is a close second, having taken 78 out of 136 games. Baltimore is the tailender, having made a losing of 88 out of 138 games. NATIONAL LEAGUE.

The close of the 29th season of the National League left Pittsburg in the lead by great odds. They carried away the pennant without an effort. At the opening of the season they had their team in the best of form and practically won the battle before the other teams were suff-ciently organized to ay good ball. They made a remarkable record, taking 108 games out of 139. This is winning nearly on the basis of three out of every four \$1800 -Corner lot and 7-room house, East Ninth and Lingames played.
