THE ORIENTAL AND HIS RUGS.

A recent writer on Oriental rugs says that there is no arbitrary test by which an inexperienced person can tell a genuine rug from a bogus one. Knots and strands mean nothing except in connection with other important elements. Shades and spots are imitated. Washing the rug to discover if it has been painted over with brush and water color frequently leads only to the discovery of a bad spot in an otherwise fine rug. The Oriental dyer does his work according to his own sweet will. Between the puffs of a cigarette and the gossip of his friends, he dips his material in the dye tub. Only the expert knowledge of the old rug buyer can be depended on. These buyers go to the great fairs on the edge of the desert, where once a year the men of the East gather to haggle together. BRIDGE COLLAPSED

An Accident in Walla Walla
Causes Much Damage.

(Journal Special Service.)

WALLA WALLA, Oct. 20.—Buried with 50 tons of pressed brick and lumber the bridge on Main street crossing Mill Creek, went down yesterday afternoon, carrying with it a small house, which was unoccupied at the time. A brick building is being erected at the upper end of the bridge, and the material had been placed on the bridge for convenience, no one considering the immense weight involved. The bridge was made of huge timbers, no steel being used, and the pressure of the brick in the center proved too much, and the bridge collapsed. A large water main was broken and the street was flooded until the gate could be closed by the water department. A basement was flooded and the embankments at the bridge seriously injured. A crew of men was secured and the damage is being rapidly repaired.

ties in a conscientious manner; because they have confidence in him; and, more important than all else, an attempt to deprive him of his rightful prerogatives would cause the act to rebound upon the actors in such a manner as to injure them politically.

IT WOULD BE ONLY PARTISANSHIP.

"Such steps as are proposed, according to reports more or less unreliable, would be warranted by no consideration that is vital to the interests of the state. They would be actuated purely by intense partisanship and would be so interpreted by the people of Oregon.

"What care they who is this or that among the state's employees, so long as proper selections be made? And, desiring only that proper men be selected, and having elected George Chamberlain as Governor, they would condemn any attempt to inject ultra-partisanship into the conduct of detail affairs connected with the state government.

LET THEM TRY IT.

"I say, let them try it. Let them make an exhibition of such narrow partisanship, and they will injure their own party and bring upon their heads the just censure they will not relish.

"What excuse have they to offer? What reason for desiring to overturn the arrangement the people themselves made last June by voting in majority to make George Chamberlain Governor?

"Now I know nothing of what Mr. Chamberlain thinks of all this, for I have not talked with him, nor in any manner discussed these phases of the political situation with him. Yet I believe that he is not worrying, and, too, that he is not going to fail to make effective every pledge made in the last campaign.

PAY NO ATTENTION TO BLUFFING.

"There is a lot of bluffing nowadays by those who think to create the impression that they will do things at Salem that they will not be able to do and that they know that they will not be able to do. The probability is that George Chamberlain will go down there to the state capital and conduct the office much as other governors do, in so far as concerns question of his authority and the scope of his powers. And if there should be an attempt to deprive him of what the majority of Oregonians intended he should have, in official authority, there will be no good political health in the future for those who apply such narrow partisanship to the discharge of their duties."

THE AMERICANIST

First Meeting Ever Held in the
United States.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—The 13th session of the International Congress of Americanists began today at the American Museum of Natural History under the presidency of Morris K. Jesup. Curious as it may seem, this is the first meeting of the Congress to be held in the United States, the previous sessions having been held in the capitals of the Old World with the exception of one meeting held in the City of Mexico.

The society was founded by the Duke de Loubat and a coterie of Frenchmen who were particularly interested in the pre-Columbian history of the two Americas and in the theories regarding the peopling of the New World. The Congress has for its specific object the bringing together of students of the early history of America for the discussion of ethnological and archaeological subjects as they relate to the native races of the Western World. The subjects to be discussed more particularly by the present session are: "The Native Races of America; Their Origin, Distribution, History, Physical Characteristics, Languages, Inventions and Customs," and "The History of the Early Contact Between America and the Old World."

JACK THE RIPPER

To Be Tried for Many
Murders.

WIFE STANDS BY HIM

Believes in Husband's Innocence
and Remains Steadfast—
Works in a Mill.

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Oct. 20.—After many delays the case of Wilbur S. Sherwell, who is accused of murders of the "Jack the Ripper" type, was called for trial today. Sherwell has been in jail nearly a year. He was arrested November 15 last, charged with choking to death Lena Renner and Georgia Bailey, whose dead bodies a few nights before had been found in ditches along roads leading into the city. At the time of his arrest Sherwell was a member of the city police force. The accused was unable to give bail and has been in jail ever since. The grand jury that convened shortly after the bodies of the two women were found indicted Sherwell for their murder and also the murder of Mrs. Mary Anne Storck. The body of Mrs. Storck was found in almost the identical spot where the body of Mrs. Bailey was found. Apparently she had been choked to death. In addition to these three crimes the murder of Fannie Butler, but the grand jury did not indict him for this crime. The body of the Butler woman was found in an alley a year ago last May. From all appearance she had been choked to death in the same manner as had the three other victims. It was ascertained that Sherwell had been talking to the Butler woman on the night she disappeared. Since his arrest the prisoner has steadily refused to talk about his case beyond asserting his innocence. His wife has

stood by him all through his trouble, working in a mill to support herself and her two children. Able counsel for the defense has been retained by the mother and sisters of Sherwell, who live at Monroeville, O., and who are said to be wealthy. The trial promises to be one of the most notable in the criminal annals of the state.

TO ORGANIZE BOARD

Lower Albina Residents Try to Es-
tablish New Organization.

Another Board of Trade will soon be organized in Albina.

Many improvements are needed in that section of the city and the residents have come to the conclusion that they can only be obtained by united action.

A number of prospective members of the new organization were in attendance at the meeting of the Central Albina Board Friday evening. They were looking for pointers as to the manner of running such an organization and they got them.

STEEL HULL FERRY.

One of the principal needs of Albina is a steel-hull ferry boat to take the place of the present vessel when undergoing repairs. The need of such a boat was strongly shown when the ferry W. S. Mason was taken out of the water and put on the ways for repairs. The little stager Republic was put on the ferry route but was able only to handle the foot passengers and a limited number of them at that.

Another condition the Albina section suffers from is the large number of her streets that are in such an unpassable state. Many of the streets in this section of the city have never been improved and in the winter they resemble miniature lakes.

The promoters of the new organization expect to call the preliminary meeting of the Board in a few days.

To Dedicate School.

An appropriate program has been arranged for the dedication of the newly-completed Willaburg School tomorrow. The exercises will be in charge of County Superintendent Robinson, who will deliver the dedication address. A number of other school officials will also be present and help in the work. The new Willaburg School is situated on the top of a hill overlooking Sellwood. It was constructed at a cost of about \$3000.
