RIVALS DISCUSS

The Oregon Short Line's
Oriental Route.

SUFFICIENT FUNDS

To Carry Out Harriman's Plans—
A Plain Statement
of Facts.

Since it has been definitely decided that the Oregon Short Line will build and operate on the Pacific coast at least one line of Oriental steamers and a coasting service as traffic will demand, local railroad circles are all in a hurry.

The Oregon Short Line has funds now in sight sufficient to put the road in condition to handle the traffic incidental to such service as that contemplated, and no efforts will be spared to make the Oregon route to the coast as serviceable in every way as is that of the northern railroad at the present time. It is admitted that the rolling stock and the property itself will need a great deal of money and effort to make it capable of fulfilling its destiny as an integral part of a through trunk line with oriental connections. Present resources of the company are not expected to provide for the purchase or building of steamers, terminals and equipment for the service.

OFFICIAL OF RIVAL ROAD TALKS.
With regard to the motives underlying the latest venture of Mr. Harriman, an official of a rival road says:

"It became necessary that the Harriman lines of the Northwest should assume a position similar to that of the Canadian Pacific and the roads of the Northern Securities. A study of conditions in the transcontinental field within the last year or so the Union Pacific and connections have lost ground, as compared with the three lines operating on the Pacific. The Canadian Pacific undoubtedly led the way in this regard, and only just now the Great Northern is making a real effort to establish itself as an Asiatic utility."

HILL'S REPRESENTATIVE.
"Mr. Hill has had a representative in China for some months now, but the Canadian Pacific has 1-1 officials in China, Japan and Siberia for years. Mr. White, a vice president, is but lately returned from a two years' sojourn in the last named country, and the Canadian Pacific has gone a long way to pre-empting the Siberian trade as a consequence."

"On this side of the line the northern roads have assumed the lead, with a vengeance. China took 80 per cent of the manufactured cotton goods of America last year, and the Great Northern and Northern Pacific carried the great bulk of this trade to the Pacific coast. In other lines the same thing is true in a lesser degree. Seattle and Tacoma have displaced Portland and San Francisco as the outlets of our traffic to the Orient. Therefore, Mr. Harriman was forced into this measure."

"It is a matter of competition between the Harriman and the northern interests. The real basis of the competition lies in the fact that the Pacific coast will undoubtedly be the center of the world's commerce in the next decade."

GEORGIA LEGISLATURE.

ATLANTA, Oct. 22.—Many questions of great importance are to be considered and acted upon at the annual session of the Georgia Legislature, which began today. Foremost among the matters to receive attention is the convict question. The present system of farming out the convicts to mine owners and others, which has of late years been severely criticized, expires in April, 1903. Several substitute plans have been suggested, but as the present system is a source of considerable profit to the state there is a strong public sentiment in favor of its continuance. The child labor problem, the establishment of a Circuit Court of Appeals and new banking laws are other matters that will receive attention at the present session.
