SMITH IS GUILTY

Will Have to Hang for the Murder of His Wife.

It took the jury just two hours yesterday afternoon to agree that George Smith was guilty of murdering his white wife in cold blood and that he must pay the penalty by sacrificing his life on the scaffold.

The trial was completed yesterday afternoon. Judge George's charge to the jury was very complete, going over the case very impartially and instructing the jurors in the premises. The jury retired at 2:30 and remained out until 4:25, when it came into Court with a verdict of guilty in the first degree. While the jury was out the prisoner occupied his

time conversing with his mother and sister, who have been at his side during the progress of the trial. He received the verdict very calmly, evidently expecting that he would be found guilty.

Charles A. Petrain, who defended the prisoner by order of the Court, made the usual motions for time in which to file a bill of exceptions. The time of the execution will be fixed later by Judge George, but must be within 30 days from the date on which sentence is pronounced.

IS DEAD AT LAST

Mrs. Dennis Lingered for Ten Months.

A STRANGE CRIME

Fashionable Washington Dress-maker Was Beaten to Death With Piano Stool.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—After lingering for ten months, hovering between life and death, Mrs. Ada G. Dennis, the victim of a mysterious assault last December, died at 4 o'clock this morning as a result of these injuries. Deceased was a noted fashionable dressmaker and the assault is believed to have been the result of an effort to obtain revenge.

In the same room with the unconscious woman, when she was found, there were diamonds and jewelry to the amount of \$1500, undisturbed. She had been beaten about the head with a piano stool and left lying on the floor. Although the best detectives of America and Europe have been working on the case for months and much money has been spent, no clue to the culprit has ever been obtained. The woman was not able to give evidence because, although she lingered for nearly a year, she never regained full consciousness.

A GREAT MYSTERY.

This case is one of the greatest mysteries in police annals of the Western Continent. There were others near when the crime was committed, but none either saw or heard anything to indicate foul play until the body of the senseless woman was found. There was not even any way of determining how long she had been there before help arrived.

Everything known to medical science was tried to restore her to a free use of her mental faculties in the hope she would be able to aid the law in its search for the criminal. Although her life was prolonged for a much greater period than was at first even thought to be possible, she died this morning without being able to throw any light on the strange crime of which she was the victim.

INDRAVELLA SAFE.

The Indravella has arrived safely in Hong Kong last Friday morning after an uneventful journey. The local office was somewhat anxious about the ship having reached its destination, as no advices have been received from the captain from any of the Japanese ports.

POPLAR BRANCH

Will Complete Cargo at Tacoma and Then Goes to Naples.

The big steamship Poplar Branch sailed this morning for Tacoma where she will complete her wheat cargo. She has on board 2840 tons and draws about 19 feet of water. At the Sound City she will take \$100 tons, making a total of 7000.

From there she will sail for Naples, Italy, and Captain Anderson expects to be about 65 days en route, as she will cover about 13,000 miles. Her route of passage will be as follows: From Tacoma to Corneil, Chili, where she will coal; will pass through Magellan Straits and will touch at Montevideo; from there to Cape Verde Islands, and on to Naples.

NEW TRAINS.

Advices received here state that the Chicago & Northwestern Railway has opened the Verdigré-Boneste line for traffic to Bristow, Neb., 41 miles from Verdigré, with train leaving Verdigré at 2:50 p. m. daily except Sunday, via Niobrara, Verdigré, Monowi and Lynch, arriving at Bristow 4:40 p. m., and, returning, leaving Bristow at 2:15 a. m., except Sunday, arriving at Verdigré 4:05 a. m.

The west bound train connects with "the Colorado Special," leaving Chicago at 6:30 p. m., the train from Bristow with train No. 8, arriving at Chicago at 6:45 a. m.

MORE APPLES FOR ORIENT.

Another large shipment of apples for the Orient is being shipped via the Indravella. The various points where they are consigned will cover the coasts of China and Japan. Eight hundred boxes constitute this shipment. Last month the same consignee shipped 300 boxes of apples.

All apples that are being shipped come from the Hood River country.

HOLIDAY SERVICES

Concluding Jewish Festivals—The Various Synagogues.

"Sherrah, Azereth" or concluding festival commences this evening and lasts till tomorrow evening. This is the concluding Jewish holiday of the season, not including "Simchath Torah," which commences tomorrow evening and lasts till Friday evening. The latter is in commemoration of concluding the reading of the Pentateuch in the cycle, and the commencing of same for the following year.

Services for "Shemini Azereth" will be held at the Temple Beth Israel this evening at 8 o'clock and tomorrow morning at 10; at the Congregations Neveh Zedek, Talmud Torah, and Ohave Shalom, services will be held this evening at 7 o'clock and tomorrow morning at 8:30. "Simchath Torah" services will be held only in the latter two congregations tomorrow evening at 7:30 and Friday morning at 8.

NEW WALL MAP ISSUED.

The Department of the Interior has recently issued a wall map of the United States which has been prepared under the direction of the Commissioner of the General Land Office. In addition to usual map features on this map are shown the several acquisitions of territory upon this continent by the United States, by clearly defined boundaries, as determined by the latest investigations, all military, naval, Indian, forest and timber reservations, private land claims, and the location of all United States Land Offices and offices of the United States Surveyor General.

Along its lower border are small maps of Cuba, Porto Rico, Pine Island, the Hawaiian group, Guam, the Philippines, and the Tutuila group of the Samoan Islands. The map is about 557 feet in size, mounted on muslin and attached to rollers.

OVER TO GRAND JURY.

William Harris and Henry Havamond, the two men charged with the larceny of two pairs of pants from the Salem Woolen Mills Store, were yesterday bound over to the Grand Jury and the bail fixed at \$500. Harris is the well known ball player who held down the third bag for the Portland team this season. He was a good man and had opportunity to reach the top of his profession.
