WEATHER FORECAST.

Good rains have fallen in California as far south as Los Angeles, and rain has also occurred in northern and eastern Oregon. Eastern Washington and Idaho. It is much cooler in Washington, Idaho, British Columbia, Western Montana and Wyoming, and correspondingly warmer in Western Oregon and in the upper Mississippi Valley.

A storm of slight energy, moving very slowly inland, is central off the mouth of the Columbia River, and "storm southeast" warnings are displayed at Astoria and North Head.

The indications are for showers in this district Friday.

As a result of the large amount of advertising being done by the transcontinental roads, and the various Boards of Trade, many home-seekers are bound this way, a number of whom are arriving daily.

A new wall map of the world has been issued lately by the Chicago & Northwestern, which is one of the most beautiful works of art in the way of a map ever published. It is printed in the form of an oval and is quite original.

The local street car companies have at last taken the advice of Dr. Biersdorf, the health commissioner, in procuring the necessary plants for fumigation. The necessity that exists in having the cars fumigated daily is quite evident.

The first consignment of 20,000 booklets on "The Dances," have been received by the O. R. & N. Co., and will be shipped shortly to their Immigration Bureau in Chicago, where they will be distributed in all Eastern and Middle States.

There has been quite an influx of new silver dollars of the coinage of 1891 in circulation. This is due to the fact that quite a few of these dollars were stored away in the sub-treasury, but are now being circulated because of the active demand for silver.

Many of the shade trees on Fifth and Sixth streets between Glisan and Stark are being removed on account of putting down cement sidewalks. About 30 were removed from Fifth street yesterday. It is necessary to take them down, as the growing roots would heave the cement and ultimately destroy the walks.

The present term of court has been a busy one and a large number of cases have been disposed of, including four murder trials. The jury cases have all been tried and the jury was discharged yesterday. For the remainder of the term only motions and court cases will be heard.

A telegram received by General Agent Joman, of the Southern Pacific, from San Francisco, states that 25,000 pamphlets on "Ashland" have gone to the binder, and will be forwarded shortly to Chicago for distribution. The total number of these pamphlets ordered is 100,000, and will be completed as soon as possible.

Strawberry vines in Oregon have no regular hours of work. After the public has eaten its fill of these popular delicacies in the early summer, the Oregon plants keep right on producing, and as a consequence many of the local restaurants have strawberries on the bill of fare. "The trouble is," said a caterer this morning, "that people don't seem to care much for berries in October, or else they don't notice them on the menu card. At any rate there is very little call for them."

A. F. Fiegel, secretary of the State Bar Association, has called a meeting of the executive committee for Friday afternoon to make arrangements for the annual meeting of the association, to be held in the United States court room Tuesday and Wednesday, November 18 and 19, 1902. PAINTERS' NEW PLAN

Novel Idea for Entertainment of the Members.

DISCUSS ECONOMIC QUESTIONS

Prominent Speakers to Be Invited to Discuss Topics of Interest.

The members of the Painters' Union are contemplating the advisability of adopting a new plan at their weekly meetings. At the conclusion of their regular routine work each week, if the plan now being considered are decided upon, they will hold a sort of debating society. The great economic questions of the day will be discussed, as well as other topics of general interest to the laboring man.

The matter of wages, hours, rents, etc., which are in vogue here and other places will come up for consideration. In fact everything in which workmen have even a remote interest will be thoroughly investigated and opinions exchanged on the various subjects. The obligations which capital owe to labor and conversely will be dwelt upon and conclusions arrived at after mature deliberation of the arguments presented by members who will represent both sides of the question chosen for discussion.

SPEAKERS OF NOTE

Occasionally it is the intention to secure the services of prominent speakers to address the union on economic questions.

Other political complexion will be included to the hall at frequent intervals to deliver addresses in which it is hoped to obtain the greatest diversity of opinions from various points of view. In this way the members expect to broaden their ideas in every sense of the meaning of the term. The plan is for mutual benefit of the members. In speaking of the matter one of them said:

"Generally speaking, the business at our labor meetings is so unimportant and of such a dry nature that we very frequently become weary of them. The idea is to make a new departure, and get the members interested in matters which will be beneficial to them. I think the idea will prove a popular one. Everyone seems favorable, and there is no doubt but that many benefits will occur therefrom."

BANGOR LOTS

Great Central to Issue Deeds and Place Land on the Market.

J. J. Walter, at the head of the Immigration and Colonization Department of the Great Central Railroad, has returned from a successful trip to Spokane, where he sold all the stock he had on hand, amounting to \$13,000.
