ACROSS THE RIVER CRY FOR HOUSES

Large Number of New Factories
Makes Demand More Acute.

Property owners on the East Side are
making arrangements to build an addi-
tional number of houses during the com-
ing spring.

"The demand for small-sized houses is
increasing so rapidly," said a well known
real estate man, "that large numbers of
families are compelled to double up with
other families who have a home. I know
of several instances where there are
three good-sized families huddled in one
seven-room house."

"A prominent property-owner came to
me yesterday and said that he was pre-
paring to erect a number of medium-
sized residences in the fore part of next
year. He said that already a number
of people had come to him in search of
homes. They had probably heard that
he was going to build and so wanted to
be sure to get one of the houses when
they were completed. That is the way
with most of the residences that have
been under construction in this city this
year—they have been rented even before
the architect had completed the plans."

DEMAND IS INCREASING

"The large number of new factories
now under construction in this city will
make the demand for houses more acute
than ever. A large sawmill is being
erected at Sellwood that will employ
about 75 men; the Sellwood Woolen
Mills will soon be enlarged to double its
present capacity and the Neudorfer
Brothers are erecting a factory on Grand
avenue. This will employ several hundred
people. And in addition enterprises
that will soon be located in this city and
yet there are no houses for rent for even
the present population. Most of the em-
ployees of the new concerns will most
likely come from distant cities and they
will have to find accommodations some
place."

WANT FIRE COMPANY

Sunnyside Residence District in
Control of Fire Demon.

A full sized fire company is wanted by
Sunnyside residents.

Now that section of the city is protect-
ed by a hose company which has but one
regular man in attendance. If a fire
breaks out in that section the Sunnyside
company is nearly worthless on account
of its lack of apparatus and men. Other
companies have to be called and the dis-
tance is so great that before they can
arrive on the scene of the trouble a great
deal of property might be destroyed.

The Sunnyside district has grown more
than any other section of the city in the
past two years. In every direction doc-
ens of residences can be seen under
course of construction. Altogether there
are about 75 houses under construction
in that territory and these will be at
the entire mercy of the fire demon.

The water supply through the district
is so small that an engine company is
unable to throw a stream of water high-
er than the first story of the dwellings.
Of course this will be somewhat remedied
when the 20-inch main now building
on Margaret avenue and down Thirty-
fifth street is completed. This will give
all the hydrants in that section of the
city more pressure.

Broke Up Show.

Fred Ritter, an Albina photographer,
notified the police yesterday that his
studio had been entered and some films
and pictures to the amount of \$100 had
been stolen. Detectives Kerrigan and
Snow were detailed on the case, and af-
ter following up a number of clues
found the missing articles in the possession
of a number of small boys who had
taken them because they said that they
needed them in a show that they were
going to give on account of the ages of
the youngsters they were returned to their
parents.

Boy Thieves at Work.

The East Side police have been bothered
a great deal lately by the large number
of petty robberies that have been com-
mitted in their territory. A wood saw
owner reported yesterday that some one
had stolen a number of tools belonging
to his machine. The saw is located at
the corner of Union avenue and East
Ash street. The police believe the work is
done by a gang of boys, who sell the
booty to junk shops. A number of sus-
pects are being watched.

Laying Power Wire.

The Portland General Electric Company
is engaged in laying a one and one-quarter-
inch cable across the Willamette at
the "Morison-street bridge." The wires
will be used to furnish the power for a
large number of electric lights to be
erected on the East Side.

McAllister Is Thrown.

While trying to drive a horse that he
was breaking in, Ward McAllister, of
Lower Albina, was thrown from a cart
and was seriously bruised last evening.
The animal frightened at a passing elec-
tric car.

GLASS COMBINE PLANS.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Oct. 23.—At a confer-
ence called for today it is expected that
the final details for the flint bottle mak-
ers' combine will be perfected. The pre-
liminaries have been arranged, more
than 90 per cent of the flint bottle mak-
ers of the country agreeing to enter the
combination, which is to be capitalized
it is said, at \$20,000,000.
