WEATHER FORECAST.

Moderately heavy rains fell yesterday and last night in California, eastern Oregon, southern Idaho and in the upper Mississippi valley. The weather is partly cloudy and somewhat threatening in western Oregon and western Washington. It is warmer in eastern Washington, and decidedly cooler in Utah, Arizona and western Colorado.

The indications are for fair weather in this district Sunday, except in western Oregon and western Washington, where showers are probable.

Oregon: Tonight and Sunday, fair, except probably showers in west portion Sunday, easterly winds.

Washington: Tonight and Sunday, fair in the east, showers in the west portion; southeasterly winds.

Idaho: Tonight and Sunday, fair; cooler in south portion tonight.

BOYS' DEPARTMENT.

FREIGHT RATES ON FURNITURE

Raised by New Classification—Rates on Differed Articles to Portland.

Local furniture dealers who have occasion to order sideboards and chiffoniers have discovered that the segregation of freight rates as a result of the transcontinental meeting last spring has brought about a 20 per cent advance on freight.

Due to the new classification and rating, sideboards and chiffoniers could be shipped in connection with iron beds at a rate of \$1.25 per 100 pounds in carloads. Under the present arrangements those articles of furniture are excluded in combination with beds and bedroom suites and take a rate of their own, amounting to \$1.50 per 100 pounds. The Portland rate also applies to Pacific coast terminals on this class of goods. A reduction was also made in valuation on shipments of bedroom suites, thus adding about 10 per cent to the freight rate as compared with the rate in effect prior to July 1.

COMPROMISED SUIT.

Mrs. Theresa Leben will be a pensioner of Multnomah County for the next six years. She recently brought suit against the county for the sum of \$5000 damages for the death of her husband, who fell through a bridge on the St. Helens road July 21 and was killed. The bridge was decayed and in a dangerous condition and the County Commissioners decided the suit was liable. A compromise was agreed upon yesterday, whereby she will draw \$25 per month from the county treasury for the next six years for the support of herself and minor children.

NEW INDUSTRIES COMING.

W. B. Palmer, secretary of the La Grande Commercial Club, is in the city and to a Journal representative gave an outline of the plans of the Commercial Club for the development of Eastern Oregon.

"Through the efforts of this club," said Mr. Palmer, "the sugar beet industry was introduced in Eastern Oregon. Over a half million dollars of foreign capital was induced to take the initiative in that business, and it is now one of the leading industries of our section, furnishing work to hundreds of men the entire year. We expect to arrange for some public meetings in the near future, to discuss plans and offer business openings for new enterprises in the Eastern portion of the state. We have some well-matured plans for creameries, fruit drying plants, fruit packing establishments and other branches that can be handled very successfully in our locality. Through our co-operation, the industrial agent of the O. R. N. brought the herd of the American Hereford Association into Oregon, to the lasting benefit of stock men. We hope to see the best seed growing industry take hold in Oregon. At this time all the best seed is imported from Germany, costing our farmers about 12 cents per pound. The growing of seed is a separate branch of the beet industry and requires special treatment and knowledge. With the co-operation of other like institutions in the state we hope to bring industries here that will complete our commercial symmetry."

The Monk, who always takes a great interest in industrial and economic problems, has been taking advantage of a day off to visit the tenement districts of New York. His distinguished appearance and philanthropic countenance attracted much attention, and induced confidence. While he found the condition of the poor much better than that of their class in our country, he also found much that was far from good. He ascribes these conditions to the tendency of the poor to crowd into the cities, where they are compelled to live upon the earnings of their hands alone, and where employment is uncertain and labor poorly paid. He pointed out to many of them the way to better their condition, and to achieve independence on the farms of the Pacific Northwest.

While many appreciated his arguments, he found that nearly all of them were too poor to attempt the journey, and as he says of the older ones, too firmly fixed in their grooves to accommodate themselves to the new conditions which the change would necessitate. He thinks, though, that there is a growing sentiment among the younger element to own land and acquire homes for themselves.
