BAD ROADWAYS

Eastern Visitor Not Favorably Impressed With East Side Streets.

"I see that Portland has a new kind of street paving material," said an Eastern man who was paying a short visit or

the East Side last week. "This is the first city that I have ever seen that uses shibwood for street repairs. I have been over quite-to-number of your elevated roadways and and them all patched with large pieces of slabwood, In some places I have passed there were several patches of this material over the same hole. The condition of the roadway after being fixed up with these slubs is much worse than having no patch at all

WAGON FALLS THROUGH. "The other day I was passing down East Morrison street and saw a large furniture wagon fall through the pave-ment. If it had not been for the fact that part of the bed of the vehicle became fustened to one of the joists underneath. there certainly would have been another serious accident to record-similar to the one recently happened on a South Portland bridge in which one man lost his

"East Morrison street is not the only street that I have noticed on the East Side in this same condition. It seems to me that all of your elevated roadways

are allke. ROADWAYS ARE CLOSED. "Another condition of things that I could not help noticing was the large number of your roadways that are closed up and have danger notices on them. This I consider a disgrace to any city. I am told that only one street in Portland is improved at the same time and while this is being done all the traffic is thrown to the next street which is too soon worn out as a result, even before the workmen are through with their labors on the ad-

joining roadway. "Carriage repairers and blacksmiths must be making money here for I don't see how a vehicle can pass over one of your ordinary roadways without breaking a spring. This town certainly ought to be a bonanza for them."

CLOTHING FACTORY

Sellwood Mills Board of Directors · Consider Project.

There is a strong likelihood that the board of directors of the Sellwood Woolen Mills Company will authorize the construction of the proposed clothing manufacturing plant at the next meeting of that organization.

One of the officials of the company, in speaking of the matter, said: "I, for one, am heartily in favor of erecting a clothing manufacturing plant in connection with the wooden mills there is a great need of such an institution in this city, and the factory will undoubtedly be well patronized if erected. When our company first began to broach the subject for a woolen mills for this city, there were many who cried that such an institution could not receive enough support to warrant the outlay. things are changed now, the woolen minis. were built and there has been so much demand for its product that the company is seriously thinking of putting in additions to the machinery.

"There is hardly a day passes but some one of the local clothing firms of the city do not receive a large consignment of

clothing from the East. A large sum of money that goes into payment for the freight on these goods could be saved, and large number of our own workmen giv-

en employment if such an .ns itution should be located in this city. Oregon people do not stop to consider that most of the woolens that are made by the Sellwood mills are sent to the Eastern cities to be made into clothing and then shipped had been sell to the and then shipped back to this city and state for sale. 
