Good Roads Officials Visit Prison
Warden to Obtain His Views.

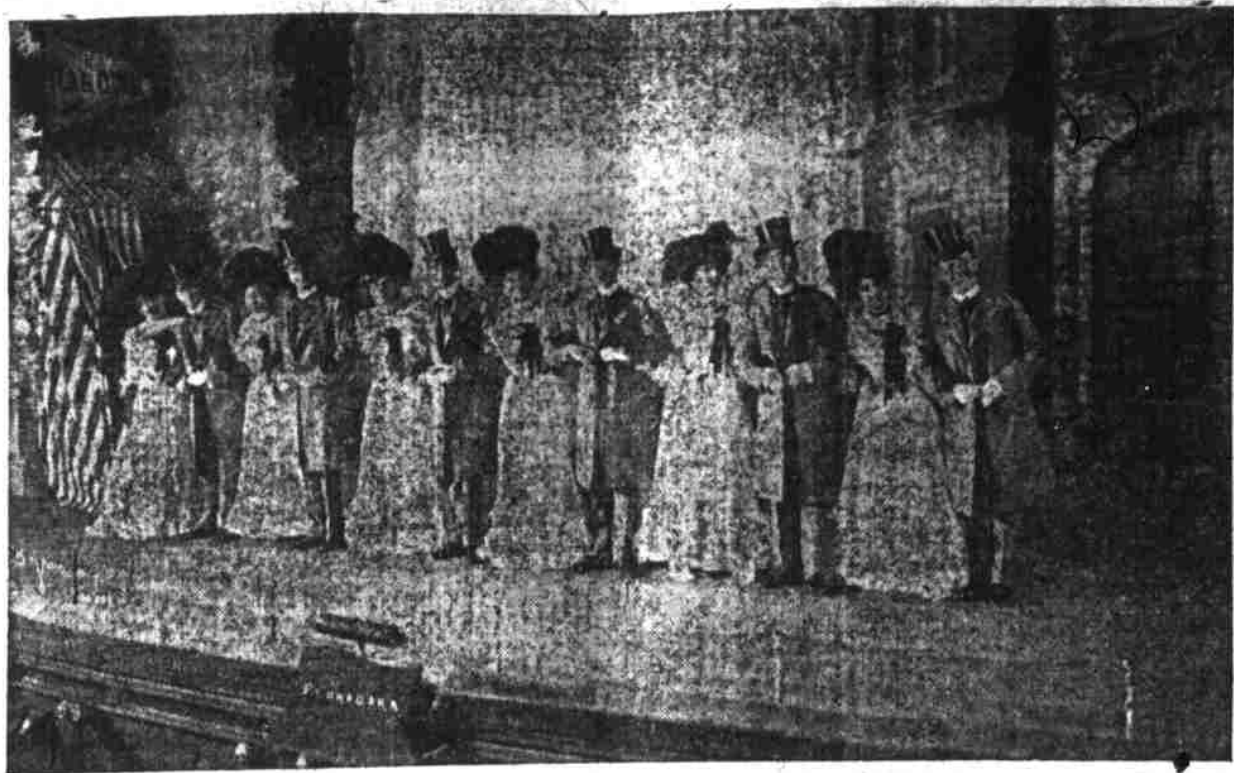
James W. Abbott, Commissioner of Highways for the Department of Agriculture, and Judge Scott, president of the Oregon Good Roads Association, left Portland yesterday for Salem where they will visit Warden James of the state penitentiary. Their principal object is to discuss with the warden the general question of working convicts on highway improvements throughout Oregon. This subject was first publicly broached by Mr. Abbott in an interview published in The Journal a few days ago. It is a

matter on which the Good Roads officials are enthusiastic and it is very possible that a bill providing that state prisoners shall be employed in building highways through the state, will be presented to the next Legislature.

SUES FOR DAMAGES.

Rodney Berger yesterday filed suit for \$5,000 against the Astoria & Columbia River Railroad Company in the State Circuit Court. He alleges that on July 2 he purchased a full fare ticket from the company from Portland to Ilwaco and return, with the understanding that the ticket was good on the railroad train from Astoria to Portland at any time prior to October 15. He further says that he presented the ticket to the agent at Astoria, who punched it and checked his baggage and at Astoria, the conductor refused to honor the ticket and had the trainmen put him off the train in the presence of about 40 people, which caused him great humiliation and much hardship in getting back to Astoria.

TROUBLE
BREWING

Between Butchers and
Meat Cutters.

A NEW AGREEMENT

Must Be Signed by the Proprietors
Before November 1,
Next.

It begins to look as though trouble were brewing between the Retail Butchers' Association and the Amalgamated Meat Cutters' Union. The agreement which has been in force between the two parties since April 15 expired October 15 and the union has prepared a new agreement slightly different from the old one. The only material difference between the two, however, is a matter of hours and the holiday question. At present the shops open for business at 5:30 a. m. and close at 6:30 p. m. The union demands that employees be not compelled to go to work before 6 o'clock in the morning and quit at 6 o'clock in the afternoon, taking an hour off at noon. The employers claim that their men work but 10 hours a day now. Those who go to work at 5:30 quit half an hour earlier in the afternoon.

OPPOSED TO IT.
A great many of the shops objected very strongly to signing the old agreement, and in regard to the new one they are assuming the same attitude. The members of the association meet tomorrow evening, and the union is expecting them to sign at that time. The new agreement is to go into effect Saturday, November 1, if signed, and is as follows:

THE AGREEMENT.
"First—That the party of the first part agree to employ none but members of the aforesaid union, members in good standing, when members of said union are available; provided that persons not members of said union may be employed for a period of time not exceeding 10 days.

"Second—It is further agreed to open this place of business at 6 a. m. and close at 6 p. m. on all days except Saturday, and all evenings preceding legal holidays, when we agree to close at 9 p. m.; also that 10 hours shall constitute a day's work for meat cutters, deliverers, butchers, sausage makers and helpers. They shall have ample time for breakfast and one hour for dinner.

"Third—It is further agreed that this place of business shall be kept closed all legal holidays, Sundays, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Washington's Birthday, Decoration Day, Fourth of July and Labor Day. Only when holidays come on Saturdays or Mondays, when places of business shall close at 12 a. m.; also to close at 9 a. m. Labor Day.

"Fourth—And that employees shall board and lodge where they may choose. "Fifth—in consideration of the signing of this agreement by party of the first part, the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen, local 143, Portland, Or., hereby agree to furnish a union shop card to be displayed in a conspicuous place in said establishment, and the said card shall remain the property of the aforesaid union."

COURT BREVITIES.

Claud L. Simpson filed a petition in the County Court yesterday to be appointed administrator of the estate of his mother, Julia Simpson, deceased. The estate is valued at about \$1,100.

Nottingham & Co. filed a mechanic's lien in the State Circuit Court yesterday to recover the sum of \$104 from Morris Pailly and wife and F. Perry. Attorney Charles A. Petraitis stated yesterday that he would soon submit affidavits to Judge George in the case of George Smith, the wife murderer, to show that there was no premeditation, and consequently murder in the first degree was not committed. He hopes to secure a new trial for Smith, believing the sentence would be reduced to life.

BROKE RECORD.

Large Attendance at Ashland Convention.

ASHLAND, Wis., Oct. 29.—Representative clubwomen from Milwaukee, Madison, Janesville, Fond du Lac, Oshkosh, La Crosse and other cities of the state were present this morning at the opening of the sixth annual convention of the Wisconsin State Federation of Women's Clubs. The gathering was called to order shortly after 10 o'clock in the Presbyterian church, the interior of which was prettily decorated for the occasion. The roll call showed the attendance to be of record-breaking proportions. Besides the regular delegates those present included literary and club women of prominence from outside the state. Among the number were Mrs. Robert J. Burdette, of California, vice-president of the general federation; Mrs. Herman J. Hall, of Chicago, a leader of the American Outdoor association, and Mrs. Linda Hull Larned.

Routine business occupied the forenoon. An invocation by Mrs. H. E. Fuller opened the program, following which there was an address of greeting by Mrs. S. S. Fifield and a response by Mrs. Edgar P. Sawyer. Then came the annual address of the president, Mrs. H. M. Youmans, of the Michigan Equal Suffrage association, which tended to show the flourishing condition and gratifying progress of the state federation. The feature of the afternoon session was an address on "Reciprocity," delivered by Mrs. Lydia P. Williams, of Minneapolis. This evening the delegates and other visitors will be guests at a reception given in their honor at the residence of Mrs. Thomas Bairdon.

EQUAL SUFFRAGE.

CHARLOTTE, Mich., Oct. 29.—There was a large attendance today at the opening of the eighteenth annual meeting of the Michigan Equal Suffrage association. The sessions of the convention will continue three days, during which time there will be addresses by a number of well-known leaders of the movement, including Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, of New York; Rev. Caroline Bartlett-Crane, of Kalamazoo, Mich.; Mrs. Winifred Harper Cooley, of Grand Rapids; Mrs. Clara B. Arthur, and Mrs. Helen P. Jenkins, of Detroit; Mrs. Snyder Root, of Bay City; Miss Nettie Southgate, of Saginaw; and Miss Martha Baldwin, of Birmingham.

G. Y. Harry Writes An
Interesting Letter.

TOUR OF THE STATE

Labor Candidates Up For Office
in Baker City.

G. Y. Harry, president of the State Federation of Labor, is at La Grande, Or. Writing to the Labor Press under date of October 25, he says in part: "I have now become acquainted with the labor situation sufficiently well in Eastern Oregon to be able to give you some idea of the phenomenal growth and prosperity of our organization. I had the pleasure of meeting with and addressing the Federal Union at The Dalles, Thursday night of last week. I found that they number a great many active, sincere workers and gave me tangible results of their efforts by initiating six new members that night. They were anxious to have me present and talk to them of the progress of our labor unions, and try in my humble way to encourage them to renewed effort to strengthen their cause."

SITUATION GOOD.
At Pendleton I found a great many untoward events had occurred to dampen the ardor of unionists, but they are deserving of considerable credit that the situation is as favorable as I found it. I arrived here on my way East last Monday morning and arranged for a mass meeting for Friday night on my return trip. I organized the Bartenders' League Monday night, visited and spoke to the bricklayers' union and caught the 9 p. m. train for Baker City. J. F. Johnson, vice-president of the State Federation, and A. P. Hanz, president of the Trades Council, met me on the arrival of the train at Baker. I arranged for a mass meeting for the following Thursday night and took the 7:45 a. m. train for Sumpter Tuesday morning. That night I addressed a crowded meeting in Ellis' Hall. At the conclusion of the meeting I succeeded in organizing the following unions:

THE RESULTS.
"Federal Labor Cooks and Waiters, Carpenters and Bartenders. I also started off the Teamdrivers and Retail Clerks, and think they will be able later to get the Electricians in line. I do not have time to predict the Sumpter will rapidly become the best organized town in Eastern Oregon—for that matter they will all have to look to their laurels or this little mountain mining town will eclipse the latter."

OPPOSED TO MAYOR.
"Our unionists in Baker City became dissatisfied with the administration of their present mayor, Carter, and held a mass meeting of labor unionists at which they adopted a platform covering municipal affairs and nominated a candidate for mayor who subscribed to their principles. They also nominated a candidate for councilman."

"Their mayoralty candidate is a young attorney, W. J. Lachner, and seems conscientious in his stand with the labor unionists. The election will be held a week from next Monday and our boys feel quite sure of victory."

A GOOD RECORD.

There are at least two teachers in the Portland schools who have a record for promptness and close application to their work that is worthy of mention. Miss Kate Kingsley, who teaches in the ninth grade at the Park school, has taught in the Portland schools for 21 years, and during that time has never been tardy and never asked for an excuse for absence but once, and that was on account of sickness in her family.

Miss Annie E. Gray, a teacher in the Central school, has nearly as good a record. For 17 years she has been a teacher in the Portland schools and has never once been tardy, and only once has she been absent, and that was on account of illness in the family.

GOLCONDA
EXTENSION

Portland Party Visits Sumpter and
Are Pleased With Their Mine.

A party consisting of George L. Colwell, S. W. Swiggett and M. E. Thompson returned Monday from a visit to the Sumpter country and to the Golconda extension mine in particular. To a Journal representative Mr. Colwell expressed his astonishment at the magnitude of the mining industry of that region. "I had expected," said he, "to find a small mining camp with a boarding-house and blacksmith shop at Sumpter, but I found instead one of the liveliest little cities of 3,000 inhabitants I ever saw. The Orleans, or Golconda extension mine is yet in the development stage, but is making a fine showing. It is six miles north of Sumpter, and surrounded by fine properties, the Mountain Belle on the north and Mayflower on the east. A tunnel has been run a distance of 140 feet, cutting a vein of low-grade ore 30 feet in width. The tunnel will be continued along this vein for some distance, and until it is under the apex of the ore chute, when a winze will be sunk on it. The vein has a strong outcrop, and can be traced a long distance. While there lumber was purchased for houses, tunnel-sheds, etc., and a day shift put at work driving the tunnel along the heart of the tunnel, show good assays, and for the amount of work done the Golconda extension makes as good showing as any mine in the district. The Oregon King joining it on the east is making a fine showing, gold being visible in much of its ore."

Mr. Colwell was highly pleased, and felt confident a rich ore chute would be encountered before the tunnel was driven very far.

METHODIST BISHOPS.

WILMINGTON, Del., Oct. 29.—The semi-annual meeting of the board of bishops of the Methodist Episcopal church began here today and will continue five days. The work of the meeting consists of a review of the church's affairs during the last six months, the outlining of plans for the future and the arrangement of the Methodist conferences, to be held throughout the country early next year. The local churches have arranged a notable program of entertainment for the visiting bishops, the principal feature of which will be a big welcoming demonstration tomorrow evening.

GOLD DUST
SAVED THEM

Nome Miners Have Narrow Escape
From Drowning.

CAPTAIN J. L. SPERRY RETURNS

Says Nome Is Now Big Gold Camp
Without a Doubt for Its Future.

Captain J. L. Sperry, formerly chief of police in this city, and W. M. Beagle, of Pendleton returned this morning from Nome, Alaska, where they have been mining for a year. Last autumn these gentlemen purchased Discovery claim on Kasaan Creek near Nome, and after building a two-mile ditch to drain the more cheerful work of taking out the gold, in this they were most successful. "We were on our way out with our gold dust," said Mr. Beagle at the Fortine this morning, "when the big storm came that nearly swept the whole city of Nome out to sea. The gold saved our lives in this way: Owing to the weight which was carrying passengers to the steamship that laid in the offing over a mile away. This lighter was caught in the storm and swamped."

"Nome has become in the past season a camp of whose value there is no question. A district that can produce nearly \$3,000,000 in one season is a noticeable factor in the mining field."

SPERRY ALSO HAPPY.

Captain Sperry was in a hurry to reach his home at 454 North Union avenue, and did not remain long at the hotel.

"The Nome country is all right," said the Captain. "The mines are panning out much better than was expected, and everybody is making money. The St. Paul, the steamer that I came down on, brought out at least \$400,000 in the treasure vaults besides a large amount that some of the passengers carried on their persons. The storm that struck Nome just before we left, was one of the fiercest I ever saw. The water in front of the city is very shallow and the wind has clear sweep across the Behring Sea. The sea rook so high that people were going around the streets in boats. My partner, Mr. Beagle, a day myself will return to our mining property there next season."
