The best offers being made at the present time are little above 2 cents per pound in bulk, while one small grower has sold for 1 1/2 cents in bulk.

Ward & Co. have made a sale of 10 cars of French prunes to Messrs. Chisney & Martineau of France, but the price paid was not learned.

## GOLD NUGGET IN ROGUE RIVER BED

## Alleged Discovery of Precious Metal Near Grants Pass.

GRANTS PASS, Oct. 31.—Gold nuggets are being picked up from the gravel in the bed of Rogue River during the process of putting in the big power dam above Gold Hill by the Condon Water & Power Company. In putting the timbers for the structures on the bedrock, excavation is necessary and from the gravel removed the workmen have found a number of gold nuggets, some of them of several dollars' value. The gold appears on the top of the gravel. The men are employed to build the dam and are not supposed to mine. However, a number of ladies who are sojourning at the world of the company amuse themselves by panning the gravel, and as a result they have found some large pieces.

The Golden Drift Mining Company, which is putting in the dam across Rogue River, in the Dry Diggings district, three miles above Grants Pass, have their surveyors at work surveying the route for the irrigation ditches the company will put in. This side of the river, instead of the top of the gravel, the dam will be built on the top of the mountain. The water will be pumped to such a high level the whole amount of water for the two ditches at the dam. The upper ditch will start at an altitude of 50 feet above the level of the river at the dam. The water will be pumped into it by a system of powerful rotary pumps. This ditch will follow the base of the mountains about Grants Pass and will supply water for all of this city and the farmlands and orchards below here as far as the Louisa Creek Valley. The lower ditch will reach and irrigate the farms and orchards of the lowlands of the Rogue in the immediate vicinity of the dam. It should be along the river below this city. C. W. Annett, manager of the company, stated to a correspondent of The Journal that they intend to have their ditches constructed and water flowing through them in time for next season's crops. In the meantime they will complete their big dam and put in the mammoth pumps and lay the pipe line to the Dry Diggings for the operation of hydraulic giants in those famous rich gravel fields.

The assessment roll of Josephine County for 1902 has just been completed. The gross valuation of all properties of the county for this year, after subtracting exemptions to the amount of \$135,550 is \$1,521,945. This shows an increase of \$57,265 over the gross valuation of Josephine's properties for last year. The assessment for this year has been largely in the mines of the county. A number of quartz properties that were thought to be prospect holes one year ago are producing large quantities of gold and silver. The placer properties have added to their plants and general equipment, thereby greatly increasing their value. There has also been a decided increase in the value of farms, and the value of the county's property has increased to a greater extent this coming year than it has been in the past. Another thing that has been largely accountable for the increase in the value of taxable property in this county has been the good work of the county court in the matter of increasing the valuation of mines that have been paying shamefully low taxes in past years. Mines in this county that were assessed for \$150,000 have been paying taxes on but \$100,000 worth of property. This unjust condition of affairs is being rightly adjusted by the fearless assessors that are now at the helm in this county.

Articles of Incorporation.

The Fashion Tailoring Co. filed articles of incorporation yesterday with the county clerk. Capital stock, \$5,000. The incorporators are E. L. Thompson, H. F. Fittley and D. E. Kase.

R. J. Jennings, S. H. Bingham and E. T. Merrill are the incorporators of the Bennett Oil Co., which has filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk. The capital stock is placed at \$50,000, divided in 50,000 shares of the par value of \$1 each. The object is to prospect for oil.

W. A. Hill, H. Rockwith, W. E. Wright, J. A. Wadden, J. B. Anderson and T. J. Geisler have filed articles of incorporation of the Pacific Patent Promoting company, to carry on the business of buying and leasing meritorious patents. The capital stock of \$15,000 is divided into 1,500 shares of the par value of 100 each.
