Pruning Commenced in the City Physician's Office.

FIRE CHIEF CAMPBELL'S REPORT

Routine Business Transacted by the Common Council.

The Common Council transacted a vast amount of business, including the passing of three railway franchise, reading of Chief Campbell's report of his trip to New York, authorizing street improvements, reading new ordinances, and routine matters.

Chief Campbell, of the Fire Department, in his report, recommended that a fire boat be provided to protect the water front, a water tower for use in fires above third-floor buildings, a fuel wagon to be kept in the city, and an extra team, change from psh call to full paid department, and placing of fire hydrants under control of fire commissioners.

MORRISON STREET IMPROVEMENT An ordinance was passed appropriating \$860 for the improvement of East Morrison street, between Union avenue and East Water street.

ORDINANCES INTRODUCED. The license committee presented an ordinance amending the occupation tax ordinance regulating the license of commercial agencies.

ESTIMATES FOR BILLS. The Board of Public Works sent in a communication stating that the City Engineer had prepared estimates of the amount of material necessary to fill the gulches at Williams avenue and Wilder street.
