

MATERIAL FOR ROAD IS READY

Tons of Ties and Rails at Riparia.

It Is Believed That Railroad Agreement Men's Work on Lewiston Branch.

(Journal Special Service.)
LEWISTON, Idaho, Nov. 10.—The report that came out from New York through Portland, Ore., that a railroad agreement had been entered into between the Northern Pacific, Great Northern, Union Pacific and O. R. & N., guaranteeing track privileges to the mouth of the Columbia, has caused much comment here. The fact that work has never been actually begun on the grade and track of the O. R. & N. extension between Riparia and this place was laid to a disagreement between the railroad leaders in New York and the announcement that final arrangements have been made is received with joy.

It is believed here that work on the road will be taken up within a short time and pushed to completion with the greatest possible speed. The fact that winter is coming on will not materially interfere with the blasting and grading, as there is but a small portion of the year when the soil is frozen to such an extent as to materially interfere with the handling of scraper and shovel. Rock blasting can be done better during cold weather than at any other season, as there is less danger from slips and landslides.

MATERIAL IS READY.
For several months the O. R. & N. has been collecting material at Riparia and several miles of track have been laid there for storage purposes. Rails, ties and other necessities have been shipped there in large quantities and now lie exposed to the weather while negotiations are being carried forward. Engineering crews have been operating between this point and Riparia for more than five months and during that time have completed the survey of the proposed route. This road, it was announced by E. H. Hartman, would be owned jointly by the O. R. & N. and the Northern Pacific, but the manner of applying that joint ownership has never been definitely made public. Leading railroad men claim the line from Lewiston to Wallula will be operated as a separate company and will handle the cars of other roads for a stipulated compensation. Whichever way the road is constructed it will mean much to Lewiston, as this city will be made a division point and will then become the home of many railroad men and their families. Wallula may profit in like manner.

EXAMINING NEW DENTISTS

State Board of Dental Examiners Meeting in Portland Today.

The State Board of Dental Examiners commenced its regular semi-annual session this morning at the Dental College. About a dozen applicants are to be examined and this will occupy the greater part of three days. The examining board consists of Dr. W. C. Logan, of Astoria, president; Dr. A. L. Beattie, of Oregon City, secretary; Dr. W. A. Wise, of Portland; Dr. J. L. Reeves, of Portland; and Dr. G. S. Wright, of McMinnville. Regarding the meeting, Dr. Wise said: "There are not nearly very many applicants at this time of the year. Those who will be examined now are mostly new comers from other states, who wish to practice in Oregon. The examination held in June, immediately at the close of the college year, naturally attracts the largest number of applicants, as the students who have finished their courses are then ready to acquire licenses to practice."

IN GREAT TERROR

Volcanic Ashes, Darkness and Fear of Death.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Nov. 10.—Three hundred miles through falling ashes was run by the steamer Luxor, which has arrived here. Capt. Timmerman declares the volcanic activity in Southern Mexico and Central America to be greater than ever before. The greatest terror prevails among the natives and many of the foreign residents are leaving the country. While the steamer was in the harbor of San Benito, Mexico, a cloud suddenly enveloped that section of the earth and ashes began to fall. Darkness as of night was everywhere. The ship raised her anchor and steamed out to sea, with the passengers on their knees praying for deliverance. There was no damage.

MAY SHIP THIS WAY.

CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—San Francisco has asked for an offer of 250,000 bushels of Manitoba wheat at dock at Puget Sound. The prospect of J. J. Hill, of the Great Northern, will be realized on the day that some one finds it profitable to move wheat from the extreme Northwest to the Pacific Coast. That prediction is not as improbable now as it was when it was made a few months ago. Last year San Francisco wheat prices were 12c under the Chicago; yesterday they were 3c over Chicago.

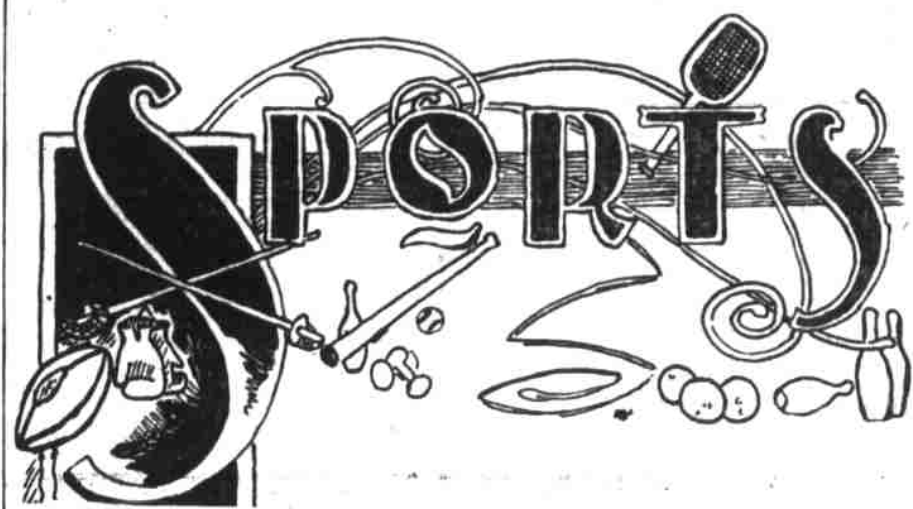
A difference of 10c in the relation between Chicago and San Francisco prices and in favor of the Pacific Coast might turn wheat westward from points in the extreme Northwest that had never thought of shipping except eastward.

HE LAUDS THE CANTEEN

General Corbin's Report Is Strongly in Its Favor.

SAYS GIVE THE SOLDIERS BEER

Discipline Will Be Better as a Result Has Been Proven.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—If Lieutenant-General Nelson A. Miles forgot to mention the army canteen in his report for the year 1902 there was no such oversight on the part of Adjutant-General Corbin, which was made public here. On December 1 the force of the United States army will be reduced to the peace footing of 60,000 men. During the year 35 officers and 1,277 enlisted men were killed in action or died of wounds. The report is most emphatic in its declaration that the post canteen should be restored and the enlisted men permitted the privilege of purchasing beer inside the government post enclosure. He declares experience both with and without the canteen has proven discipline to be better when the men are given liberties where they are constantly under the watchful eyes of their officers. Regarding this report says: "The restoration of the exchange, as it existed prior to the passage of the act of February 2, 1901, prohibiting the sale of beer, is desired and urged by the great majority of officers and men, and by none more than those of pronounced temperance views. Numerous reports confirm the views long held by this office that the old exchange contributed to sobriety, health and contentment of the men. The increase of desertions, and of trials for infractions of discipline is, by those best informed, attributed to the abolition of the former privilege of the exchange." In conclusion, the report says: "The instruction of our men in vocal music would be a step in the direction of contentment and better discipline. Every regiment should have its marching song. Frequent practice in singing, particularly during the long winter evenings, would do much to make the men satisfied to remain in quarters and away from the baleful influences of the barrooms that exist in too great numbers in the vicinity of our military posts. These barrooms are under the protection of the license law of the several states, and are beyond the control of the military authorities."

been implicated in racing frauds were accepted as final by the Jockey Club, and sentence was pronounced in a manner that left no chance for the accused riders to appeal from the decision reached. Alterations and improvements made during the summer have transformed the track into one of the fastest and safest in the country. The meeting promises to be a success in every respect and at attractive stakes and handicaps have been added and many of the turf classics, such as Dixie and the Vestal, will be revived. The meeting continues until November 23.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—Two hundred members of the Minnesota Society of New York have accepted invitations to attend the annual banquet of the society, which takes place tonight at the Waldorf-Astoria. The speakers will include Archibald, the Review of Reviews, the Rev. Dr. J. Burrell, Thomas Lowry, Wheeler H. Peckham and President Grover Cleveland of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company. W. Krech, president of the society, will act as toastmaster.

DID NOT PULL OFF THE MILL.
People of Rainier Objected to a Sparring Match.

The people of the hamlet of Rainier on Saturday night made a kick on the pulling off of the sparring contest between Kid Swanson and Harry Freeman. A crowd of the local sports went down the river in the hope of seeing a contest for a decision. The officials of the lower Columbia River town gave an imitation of the Louisville and Waterbury moralists and sent out warnings that an attempt to fight would result in the arrest of all the principals. The mill was called off, and a disgusted crowd of Portlanders returned home yesterday morning. The contest has been postponed. It will take place in connection with some other events to be held in Portland in the near future.

CORRETT AND RICE TO MEET.
NEW LONDON, Nov. 10.—Young Corbett and Austin Rice have arranged to meet before the club offering the largest purse. The action of the Waterbury church people in stopping the former fight has not discouraged them. TURF SCANDALS ON FRENCH SOIL.
John Relf and Milton Henry's License Revoked.

PARIS, Nov. 10.—The suits for damages brought by John Relf and Milton Henry, the American jockeys, against The Jockey Club, because of that body's action in revoking their licenses to ride in races, and thus depriving them of a means of livelihood, came up for hearing today. The sentence of the French Jockey Club revoking the jockey licenses of John Relf and Milton Henry caused a turf sensation when it was announced on October 12. At the time it was stated that the action was taken on evidence secured by detectives of the French police department, the offense specifically charging that the jockeys had "prevented favorites from winning." William Roth Suffers Complete Fracture of Left Leg.

It was found that the lad had suffered a complete fracture of the limb. It is very likely that the leg will have to be amputated.
