ANOTHER WAGE RISE.
PITTSBURG, Nov. 14.—Today noon the announcement was made at the general offices of the Pennsylvania lines that employees of the road west of Pittsburgh would be granted the same rate of increased wages which has already been declared to be in effect east from that point. The rise will be retroactive and will date from November 1. All told about 150,000 men will annually receive better remuneration by \$11,000,000.

OLD WOMAN HAS BIRTHDAY

She Is 132 Years Old and Happy.

An Aged Negress in Philadelphia Remembers Very Well George Washington's Army.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 14.—Another milestone in life has been passed by Mrs. Mary McDonald, making her 132d that has been put behind her in the voyage toward the beyond, which in her case seems without an end. So old and feeble that her eyesight is gone and she has to be helped about her room, this oldest woman in the world still possesses a bright mind and a cheerful heart. She is a negress and now occupies a pensioner's cot in the Home of the Aged and Infirm in West Philadelphia.

"Grandma," McDonald, as she is known, is a native of Virginia. She passed her youth on a farm in the vicinity of Valley Forge and clearly remembers the passing of the army of Gen. Washington in the Revolutionary War. During the long and bitter winter that the Colonial troops passed at Valley Forge soldiers frequently came to the plantation of her master and were given food.

She is a devout Christian and believes she will yet live for many years.

NEWS OF THE LABOR WORLD

What Portland Workers Are Doing for Their Advancement.

The Electric Workers met Wednesday night and initiated one new member and received four applications for membership. A resolution was passed bearing on the examination of the candidates. It is to the effect that if a man fails to receive 60 per cent in the examination he will have to wait 30 days before making another attempt to pass. If he fails the second time he will be obliged to wait 60 days, and when not succeeding on either occasion he will be required to work as helper until such time as he is qualified to pass the examination.

At the carpenters' meeting, Wednesday evening, all affairs relating to local business were disposed with and full attention given to the consideration of the amendments to the constitution which were passed at the biennial convention held at Atlanta, Ga. Those discussed and acted upon were adopted. George E. Shaver was nominated and endorsed last night by the Painters' Union for the proposed office of state labor commissioner. Mr. Shaver was recently appointed secretary of the Oregon State Federation of Labor to succeed William H. Barry. There are now two nominations, each of them being head officials of the state organization.

E. A. Arthur has resigned as general secretary-treasurer of the Pacific Coast Federation of the Longshoremen, Marine and Transport Workers' International Union, which was recently organized here. His successor has not yet been named by the executive board.

COMPLAIN AGAINST SOUTHERN

CHARLESTON, S. C., Nov. 14.—The State Railroad Commission today began an investigation of the complaints made against the Southern Railway by the cotton dealers of Charleston. While the local cotton receipts this season have been far in excess of the receipts of last year, the dealers say they have been seriously hampered by discrimination, one house charging that its buyers had to be withdrawn on account of a lack of facilities for shipping. These allegations have been vigorously denied by the railroad, and the result is a bitter controversy between the two interests.
