



## ASHLAND TEAM BUMPED HARD

### Normal School Team Was Helpless Before College Eleven.

ALBANY, Nov. 20.—The Ashland Normal School and the Albany College eleven met on the gridiron here yesterday afternoon. The visitors had no chance to win, although they put up a plucky game. The score was 30 to 0. The strong front of the college line withstood the rushes of the opponents, while the line-up of the Normal team was repeatedly broken by the bucking of the Albany players. The feature of the game was the 70-yard run and touchdown of Halfback Conroy, of the home team. During the second half the game was stopped for a time owing to injury to some of the players.

## FARMERS ARE UP AGAINST IT

### Albany Refuses to Meet Them on Salem Grounds.

ALBANY, Nov. 20.—The challenge of the Oregon Agricultural College has been received by the Albany College for a game to be played on Salem, and refused. The reason is given that in the games heretofore between these two colleges the Albany boys have always gone to Corvallis, and it is no more than fair that this season the Farmers should play the return games on the local campus instead of trying to play on neutral ground. The conditions of the game and the officials are said to be perfectly satisfactory, but as the two teams are about on an even footing, the Albany boys think that the slight advantage of a game on their home ground should be theirs.

## WILL BATTLE FOR VICTORY

### Light Forest Grove to Struggle With Eugene Eleven.

FOREST GROVE, Nov. 20.—The football eleven left this morning for Eugene, where they will meet the University of Oregon tomorrow. The local team does not expect to win the game, as the average weight of the men is only 147 pounds, while that of Eugene is 158. The Groves recently defeated the Pullman team easily, which had a great advantage in weight. Last year the game resulted in a score of 10 to 0 in favor of Eugene. It is conceded that this season the eleven of Forest Grove is much stronger and a closer contest will result. Payne and Tompkins, owing to injuries, will not play with Eugene.

CORVALLIS AND EUGENE.  
CORVALLIS, Nov. 20.—Manager Johnson of the Agricultural College team has accepted the challenge of the University of Oregon football eleven for a game a week from Saturday.

BAKER CITY AND WESTON.  
BAKER CITY, Nov. 20.—Weston and Baker City yesterday met on the gridiron and played the hardest game of football ever witnessed in Eastern Oregon. The score was 6 to 0, and this was made at the close of the game. A large crowd was in attendance and the enthusiasm was intense.

## BASEBALL WAR IS PATCHED UP

### Controversy Between American and National Settled.

CHICAGO, Nov. 20.—The arbitration board of the National Baseball Association, last evening, agreed upon peace terms in connection with the war between the National and minor leagues. The controversy was between the Kansas City and Milwaukee teams, who disagreed on playing on each other's territory. It was decided that each club play on its own grounds.

The American Association, which has been an outlaw, comes into the National Association. The players that were signed prior to the New York meeting, will be retained by the Americans, while those signed since then will go back to the clubs to which they formerly belonged.

## BOXING BIDS WERE OPENED

### For McGovern and Young Corbett Match—Not Satisfactory.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 20.—The bids for the 25-round contest between Young Corbett of Denver and Terry McGovern of Brooklyn were opened here yesterday. The two clubs bidding for the match were the Penn Art Club of Philadelphia and the Haystack Club of San Francisco. They did not offer a guarantee

for the match. Neither did the forfeit of \$5,000 accompany the bids. The boxers have decided to leave the bids open for a week longer.

The two men since their Louisville experience have been anxious to come together.

HART AND O'BRIEN DRAW.  
PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 20.—Jack O'Brien and Marvin Hart fought a fast six-round draw here last night before the Penn Athletic Club.

FITZGERALD-FLAHERTY.  
NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—White Fitzerald, the rugged Brooklyn lightweight, and Martin Flaherty of Lowell, are reported in fine fettle for their bout which is slated to come off at New Britain, Conn., tonight under the auspices of the National Athletic Club. They are to box 20 rounds at 135 pounds, ringside. As the two are considered evenly matched, an interesting go is expected by the followers of the fighting game.

## CHOYNSKI VS. JACK O'BRIEN

### Great Fighter to Go Six Rounds at Philadelphia.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 20.—"Philadelphia Jack" O'Brien, whose great reputation as a fighter was somewhat clouded by his showing in his recent fight with Peter Maher, is to have a chance to redeem himself tonight. He is slated to go against Joe Choyinski, the clever Californian, in a six-round go before the Penn Art Club. This will be the second time these two fighters have faced each other in the ring recently. In their previous meeting, which was a six-round go in Chicago, O'Brien got the decision over Choyinski after a one-sided contest. Choyinski claimed that he was not in proper shape on that occasion and as a consequence tonight's go was arranged. Both men appear to be in good fighting condition, and from all appearances neither will have the excuse of poor condition to fall back upon in the event of defeat.

BRITT THE FAVORITE.  
JIMMY BRITT, the California lightweight champion, will surely be the favorite in the betting when he meets Frank Erne in the 30-round bout before the Yosemite Athletic Club of San Francisco, on November 26. Some betting has been done on the contest on the coast, with Britt favorite, at odds of 10 to 9. The sporting men of San Francisco feel certain that Britt will beat Erne and will wager heavily on his chances. Erne is not worried, though, and says that he expects to beat the Californian in 10 or 12 rounds.

FOOTBALL MITTENS.  
The latest thing in the way of football gear is Mike Murphy's invention of leather mittens. In the West Point game Goss, the right guard, wore a pair of these mittens. They consist of a strip of wood on the lower part of the hand, bound to the men with tape, which is passed around the hand. It is claimed that Goss wore the mittens to protect his damaged hands, although they might be of value in bringing the straight arm into play. ## BIG WRESTLERS WILL STRUGGLE

### For Championship of the World Next Month.

Tom Jenkins, the world's champion catch-as-catch-can wrestler, has signed a contract to meet Dan McLeod, the Canadian grappler. The match will take place during the week of December 15, before the club offering the best inducements. The conditions of the match will be straight catch-as-catch-can style, with the struggle hold barred, but two in three falls to win. Both wrestlers posted \$250 as a forfeit to bind the match. Bids for the contest will be left open until November 28.

## CORBETT IN FINE FETTER

### Meets His Old Sparring Partner, Mike Conley.

Jim Corbett and Mike Conley, the Irish giant, who used to be the champion's sparring partner, met in Cincinnati the other day. Conley had not seen Corbett for more than a year and declared that he was delighted surprised at Jim's condition. According to one of the Cincinnati papers this conversation took place:  
"I must say, Jim," remarked Conley, "that I never saw you looking so well. I believe that you are bigger and stronger now than you have been any time during your fighting career."  
"You're right about that," replied Corbett. "With this remark he stripped and displayed his muscular development. Conley could hardly believe his eyes. He never saw Corbett's back and arm muscles to show up to better advantage. To tell the truth, Jim, you have developed wonderfully," said Conley. "I am positive of that," said Corbett.

"Here's a shirt I had made to order. My hands have become so big that I cannot pull the shirt off without buttoning the cuffs. A few months ago I could slip my hands through without half trying."  
"Have you taken on any weight?"  
"No, I guess not. I scale about the same as I did last year this time. I am simply working to harden my muscles. I have been exercising daily for six months. I began early last spring. I made my home down on Long Island and used to take the train into town every morning and spend several hours in Woods' Gymnasium. I have kept up the work all summer and fall and will continue exercising until I start in training to fight Jeffries."  
"Are you sure Jeffries will fight you?" asked Conley.  
"Mike, it's a cinch. If I were not so sure of the match I would not put in so much time training," said Corbett.

Before leaving Corbett and Conley had a little talk in reference to a set-to this week at the Cincinnati Gym. Conley said he would be pleased to box Corbett, and the latter promised to bring a big set of gloves some morning, and they will spar three rounds in private.  
"I haven't had on a glove for some time," remarked Corbett, "but I guess I can go well enough to get up a sweat."  
"Indeed you can," replied Conley. "There never was a time when you couldn't make it interesting for anyone up against you in a friendly bout."

TO FIGHT JEFFRIES.  
Conley said after visiting Corbett that there could be no doubt about Corbett's determination to fight Jeffries for the championship. The fact that Corbett gives two shows a day and gets up every morning to do gymnasium work is pretty good evidence that he is anxious to be fit and well when he tackles the champion.  
Conley stated that Corbett's arms and wrists showed remarkable development. His chest has also broadened out to a considerable extent. His friends would hardly know him now stripped for action in the ring. Formerly Corbett's muscles showed but little development. Now they stick out like whip-cords, and his chest expanded is enough to make Tom Sharkey turn green with envy. Corbett, in his present condition, is a model specimen of physical development. If looks count for anything, the ex-champion will give Jeffries the hardest fight of his life when they meet next spring.

PORTLAND BOY WINS.  
Howard H. Freeman, of Portland, Ore., won the first and third heats of his match race against Floyd Krebs of Newark, at the Vailsburg cycle track at New York the other day. The contest was best two in three, half mile heats, un-paced.  
The first heat was won by a scant half wheel. In the second heat Krebs cut Freeman down on the last turn and the latter sat up, not making any attempt to win. Freeman paced during the first lap of the third and deciding heat, but Krebs led at the bell. They went through the backstretch, Krebs leading into the last turn. Freeman drew up on even terms with the Newark man in the home stretch and just managed to beat him out at the tape by less than six inches.

## NEED GOOD EYE KICKING GOALS

### Michigan's Fullback Tells How It Should Be Done.

Football teams who have found it difficult to get the ball over the cross-bar after a touch-down, will be interested in a little talk by Edward Lawrence, the crack fullback of the Michigan team, whose record this year in kicking goals is well-nigh phenomenal. When asked recently "how he did it," Lawrence said:  
"That is an implied question that I would rather not answer, because it is agreed by all football men that kicking is not a very difficult task when once you have the swing of it. I can tell you better how the goal kicking ought to be done, and if it happens that I can follow my own advice and make a few of that part of the game, then you may call my advice all right if you want to. The first thing of importance, I should say, to a goal kicker, is to be sure that he has a good eye, both to measure the angle at which he wishes to have the ball placed and the distance, even to inches, he is away from the horizontal bar he wishes to kick the ball over. Of course, it is important that one kick the ball in a certain spot, if possible, but that is not always possible in one's endeavor to make the extra point, owing to various reasons. This is the secret of the whole affair, not to think that you must hit the ball in an exact spot in order to get it over well. If you have used the right judgment in placing it, measured your angles well and have the strength, you can't very well miss it."

STRENGTH REQUIRED.  
"The strength after the ball is well placed is the important thing. A great many people would be excellent goal kickers were it not for the fact that they get nervous in their effort to be sure to kick the ball lightly. No, sir, if the ball is placed correctly and you put the ginger behind it you can get it over with a pretty rocky kick. Everyone has his own way, but the best kickers will tell you that the man holding the ball is doing about as much toward making the kick a good one as they themselves, and I firmly believe it to be true."

"The man holding the ball must not simply keep it in position, but he must hold it so that it will take a hard kick to get it away from his hand. This will help the ball sailing in the right direction when the kick is made. If the ball is held in the hand, a square-toed shoe is, of course, necessary and a metal strip on the bottom with no give in it whatever. It is very easy to learn to swing the upper portion of the leg always the same way, but from the knee down, especially in the ankle, the leg is pretty liable to prove false. To swing the leg from the hip and knee joints, keeping the ankle and foot rigid, is my method. Of course, plenty of swinging the leg this way, even when one is not kicking the ball, is the best kind of practice."

## "BUTCHER BOY" AND BOTHNER

### Lightweight Wrestlers to Meet Tomorrow Night.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—John Piercing, the "Butcher Boy," and George Bothner, the lightweight champion catch-as-catch-can wrestler, have been expected to tie their differences in public, and the contest will take place on Friday, November 21, at the Grand Central Palace, Forty-third street and Lexington avenue, where the Graco-Roman champion de-

fended Natchio, the Turk, and Rasoul du Colonel, the big Frenchman, and where he made his first appearance against Paul Pons, the giant champion of France.  
Hugh Leonard, the wrestling instructor of the N. Y. A. C., has been selected as the referee, and Ben D. Bee and Alexander Brown, of the Coney Island Athletic Club, will be the timekeepers. Two preliminary contests between heavy-weight wrestlers at catch-as-catch-can and Graco-Roman style of wrestling will precede the main event.

## GOVERNOR GEER IS "THE ONLY ONE"

## Tall Tamarack States His Case.

### What Fulton's Friends Hope for the Man From Fishy Clatsop.

Governor T. T. Geer, in an interview with The Journal, said last evening:  
"I may say to the people of Oregon that I was the only candidate for the United States Senate who came out in the open and put the issue to the test. All others have kept in the dark, so far as official cognizance is concerned. Of course there are candidates. But they are candidates only by common report. I hold that I am entitled to consideration because I went before the people openly to stand or fall by their decision."  
"I may also call attention to the fact that I received an immensely larger majority in this county than was given to members of the Legislature, for instance. They stand as representatives of the people for the reason that they were endorsed by the people's votes in an election. By what course of reasoning may anyone argue that I am not equally the choice of the people, when I received more votes than any of them received?"

WHAT MEANS THE MAYA LAW?  
"I am disposed to ask this question: What means the Maya law? It was enacted by the Republican Legislature, signed by a Republican Governor, and therefore stands as the expression of the Republican party of Oregon upon the subject of election of Senators by popular vote.  
Did the Republican party mean anything when it enacted that law? Did it mean anything when it placed in its platform plans favoring election of United States Senators by popular vote?  
"In accordance with that law, openly and above board, keeping nothing from the people, willing to stand by their decision, I came out as a candidate and received a majority of the votes cast upon the 2d of last June.  
"I submit that there was no element in the act that was not proper, but that the conception of the people of the nearest approach to the ideal system of electing Senators that is possible under the present laws."

SAYS HE HAS STRENGTH.  
Governor Geer stated also that he is receiving encouragement from all parts of the state, and that he will be supported by members of the Legislature who have not yet declared for him.  
"I do not hesitate to assert that my candidacy has grown in favor during the past few weeks, and that it is rapidly taking hold of the people of the state. Every day I learn of accretions of strength, and, when I view the field and cast up the probabilities, I am quite content with the prospects."  
The governor has been circulating among the delegates to the irrigation convention. He has been accompanied by Mrs. Geer, who came to attend some club functions, notably the parliamentary law lectures by Mrs. Lillian Bethel Cole.

## SOME FULTON FIGURES.

A prominent Mitchell-Fulton follower gives to The Journal these figures on the make-up of the Legislature on the election of a senator:  
Fulton ..... 36  
Geer ..... 32  
Scott ..... 12  
Bourne ..... 8  
Moody ..... 5  
Total Republican members ..... 73  
"This is giving the most liberal estimate to the following of the opponents of Mr. Fulton," he said, "and, in reality, Fulton will have more votes than 25 when the Legislature meets. I believe he really has about 40 members of the assembly who will stand by him through thick and thin.  
"In assigning five votes to Malcolm A. Moody I do so upon the theory that there will be that many who would support the congressman before anyone else. I regard Moody as one of the possibilities, when Fulton is eliminated. That is to say, that were Fulton subtracted from the problem, Moody comes closely next as to possibilities.  
"This is also dependent upon the theory that Mr. Corbett does not become a candidate.  
"Fulton will receive all scattering votes that will go to other candidates at first on the principle of the 'band wagon.' He will be elected senator, probably upon the first ballot, or, if not then, at a very early date thereafter."
