**WILL BUILD A NEW LINE**

Great Northern Contemplates Extension to Phoenix.

Information has been received by local railroad men that the Great Northern will extend their road from Curlew, Wash., to Midway, B. C. President Hill also contemplates the building of the Granby ameter spur and the extension of the main line from Grand Forks to Phoenix. Certain of the surveys are already being relocated by engineers, who are on the ground. Construction will probably begin within three or four weeks, as the present work of surveying will be completed by then.

It has been stated on good authority that the road will be completed to Phoenix within six months. It is the intention of the Great Northern to follow up their extension to Phoenix by extending their line to Midway via Greenwood, the construction of which will in all probability commence next spring.

**THE LAUNDRY WORKERS MET**

**A Proposition on Foot to Establish a Public Library.**

The Laundry Workers' meeting last night was well attended. Increased interest is manifested by the members in the organization. No special matter being before the union, those present indulged in a general discussion looking to the social welfare of the members.

A movement is on foot looking to the starting of a library for the benefit of employees in the city. It was argued that such an institution is needed here, as well as in other cities, because the average public library does not contain the reading matter that the workingman usually wants. He is eager, say the Laundry Workers, to familiarize himself with economic questions, and it is impossible for many of them to do so unless libraries are established with this end in view.

President Powell reported that during the past year 50 new locals had been organized, and the increase in membership was 100. Only three strikes occurred, two of which were successful and one was lost. The pushing of the union label is being used to secure the benefits in place of the more doubtful strike.

**CAPT. EDWARDS' TRIP EAST**

**Speaks of Cities Visited--The Small Cities in Newport.**

In speaking of his recent trip to the East to a Journal representative, Capt. E. S. Edwards, United States steam vessel inspector, said:

"I went direct from Portland to New York, from there to various large Eastern cities, including Washington, Philadelphia, Boston, Buffalo, Niagara Falls, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Louisville, Cincinnati, New York, St. Paul and Minneapolis. I wouldn't live in either of these cities if I was receiving \$25,000 a year; Portland beats them all."

"While in Washington I crossed over to Mount Vernon and saw the graves of the nation's founders, and the graves of other prominent men in the history of this country."

"In New York I had the pleasure of being at the top of a 33-story building. This reminds me that there is no more sociality there than there is in the penitentiary in Salem. In Newport I saw some of the smallest cottages ever built, the smallest of these being larger than the Portland Hotel."

**Senator Pierce of Union and Umatilla Talks.**

**Thinks That the Organization Should Be Maintained in Contest.**

Walter Pierce, joint senator from Umatilla and Union Counties, is at the Perkins Hotel. He is on his way home to Pendleton, from a visit to San Francisco, near where he has extensive interests in the post land island district. Senator Pierce avers that little talk is heard of political matters in Eastern Oregon, because people are very busy attending to their share of the huge wave of prosperity now sweeping over the country. He consented, however, to speak of subjects pertaining to the Legislature and the relationship toward it that Democrats should sustain.

"I am of the opinion that as Democrats we should carry out the idea of maintaining the organization and voting for a Democrat for Senator. I do not know as there is any talk of repeating the action of two years ago, when Democrats voted for Mr. Mitchell for Senator. But if there is, then I am disposed to deprecate it."

"It is right to keep in mind the need of maintaining party organization, and nothing that I know of does more to disorganize a party than to throw support to candidates of other parties."

"I am not a sympathizer with narrow partisanship, but I believe it is right to preserve the framework of organization, and we cannot do it if we all of the time break across the line and support Republicans."

Senator Pierce has stored his warehouses 100,000 bushels of 1902 wheat. He is a partner in three wheat-raising firms: Pierce, Treedy, and Pierce & Cooley, in Umatilla County. They raised 100,000 bushels in all. Some time ago, when wheat reached 51 cents at Pendleton, for standard grade club, his partners were so high so he bought up the entire wheat holdings of his partners.

"I could now sell at 63 cents," said Senator Pierce, "but I am holding for a higher price, and expect to receive it."

Senator Pierce has launched a summer resort and sanitarium project at Hot Lake, Union County, over which he grows quite enthusiastic and from which he anticipates great results.

**RUBBER CULTURE IN MEXICO**
