A TOWN THAT DID.

The town of Nelson in British Columbia as not been afraid to venture into the field of municipal ownership, and the first results are of a most encouraging nature. According to one of the local papers, the town-or, as they prefer to call it, the city -paid \$5.000 for the water works system 1 1897, spent \$101.580 on improvements, collected \$64,639 in water rates at an operating expense of \$9.578. After providing for all the charges, the people of Nelson are \$18,966 in pocket through owning waterworks service, and \$23,676 ahead through owning their electric light service since 1897. The town was incorporated that year, and the electric light and waterworks taken over by the municipality, and these two services since then have profited the municipality to the aggregate of \$42,043.

The rates have not been raised to the public, the services have been good, and the town has received the profits that would have gone into private pockets.— Toronto (Can.) Star.



# THOUSANDS OF **NEW HOMES**

The East Side Undergoes Building Boom.

FACTORIES AND WAREHOUSES

New Woolen Mills, Sawmills and Other Enterprises Added.

The advent of the wintry season does

not seem to have affected the erection of new structures on the East Side. Every day new dwellings and business houses are being started. Old ones are undergoing much-needed repairs and the whole section of the city is being remodeled. The past year has been one of unusual activity in the building of factories and warehouses. Several new large warehouses are projected if the oil district ordinance is thrown out. During the past year the Studebaker Brothers have completed the erection of a large fourstory warehouse, corner East Second and East Morrison and Belmont streets. Across the street on Belmont the Advance Thresher Company has just completed its new warerooms. Next to the Studebaker Brothers' establishment on Belmon street another storeroom has been crect ed by the Buffalo Pitts Company. of these establishments do a business when aggregated together of at least a million dollars a year.

BURNED DISTRICT REPLACED. The evidence of the fire at the Phoenix on Works, which destroyed nearly \$100 800 worth of property early last summer is swiftly disappearing under the magic spell of a large force of carpenters, brick

layers and architects.

The two brick structures owned by Dr D. Surman on Hawthorne avenue are being rebuilt as fast as brickmasons and their helpers can do the work. The Ore-gon Water Power & Railway Company is replacing the small warehouse and dock estroyed by the fire, by a monster freight lepot and a wharf extending from Haw thorne avenue to Inman. Poulsen & Co. The Standard Oil Company has already made the repairs to its brick storehouses ravished by the same blaze
