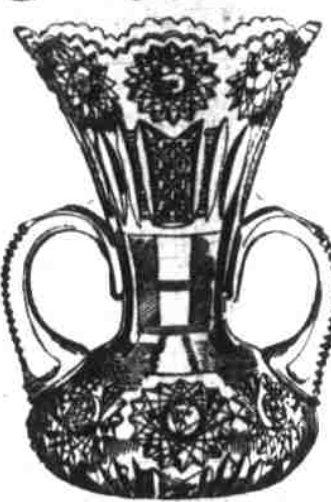

JEFFRIES AND
FITZSIMMONSBig Pugilists Will Box
Here Tuesday.Good Men Will Go for Decisions in
Some Redhot Preliminaries.

James J. Jeffries, the champion pugilist of the world, and Robert Fitzsimmons, one of the hardest fighters in the history of the ring, will give a sparring exhibition at the Exposition Building Tuesday evening, December 2. The bout will be no tame affair, as the famous heavyweights delight to mix matters, and even with soft gloves they put up a go which is not free from strenuous. The two top-notch exponents of the flat art have the admiration of all those of athletic inclinations. In view of their recent fierce championship battle, their appearance is of unusual interest at this time. The big men will arrive on Monday, and it is expected that they will do some duck shooting in the locality, before they continue their sparring tour of the United States. Portland is the first place at which they show on the present trip. J. P. Egan and Sam Mott, who represent the boxers, are in the city making arrangements for the show.

HOT PRELIMINARIES.
Jack Cooper and Ed Barry, two heavyweights, will go for a six-round bout for a decision. Both are men with records, and will put up a warm contest. Cooper has but recently arrived from the East, where he has met some good men. Freeman and Murray, the local featherweights, will go to rounds for a decision. A number of other mills will be held, consisting of good talent. The show will be under the auspices of the Pastime Club, which is a guarantee that the matches will be up to the usual high standard of those previously held by this organization.

REILLY AND
NEILL TO MEETWill Fight at Seattle on Decem-
ber 23.

SEATTLE, Dec. 3.—Tommy Reilly, the local boy, who recently defeated Young Gibbs and Bea Tremble in this city, will fight Al Neill of California in Seattle on the night of December 23. Frank Clancy has come to the front, secured a permit for the encounter, and today prepared a set of articles for the men to sign. It was a foregone conclusion that Neill and Reilly would fight some time this month, either in San Francisco, Oakland or Seattle. Offers have been received by Manager Frank Kelly from all three cities. Naturally he preferred to fight his protegee in Seattle and willingly accepted Mr. Clancy's proposals.

In speaking of the affair, Mr. Clancy said: "One thing is certain, I will pick the referee. No one but myself shall know who that official is to be until the men are in the ring. I don't propose to pick a good man, like Morrison did, and then have one of the fighters back out at the last moment. The articles state that I am to pick that official, and they will fight under the man I choose or they don't get the money."

MAHER VS. "KID" CARTER.
PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Dec. 3.—Followers of ring events in the Quaker City are on the qui vive in anticipation of the bout at the Penn Art Club tonight between Peter Maher and "Kid" Carter. Interest in the match is heightened by the excellent showing Maher made in his recent go with "Philadelphia Jack" O'Brien. Both Carter and Maher are fast fighters and "hard" hitters, so that the meeting is likely to be a gruelling match whether it last only a round or goes the limit.

HART AND O'BRIEN.
Marvin Hart and "Philadelphia Jack" O'Brien have been matched again for a 30-round go before a club soon to be selected on December 22. It is probable that the bout will go to Fort Erie. O'Brien was not satisfied with the showing he made against Hart in their recent argument in Philadelphia and has secured Hart's consent to another meeting over the long route.

TOM SHARKEY
COMES TO LIFETells Two Fairy Tales—One About
Meeting O'Brien.

Tom Sharkey has renounced his intention to permanently retire from the ring. In an interview he said: "You can say for me that I have reconsidered my determination to retire for all time from the ring. I am again a full-fledged pugilist, and I will prove it with a fight with Jack O'Brien, who is thought by Philadelphians to be a world beater. I am ready to prove to O'Brien's admirers that their idol is a great way from being a champion. He cannot stand the punching and I will prove it with a fight with O'Brien in the city in the country where contests of ten or more rounds are allowed, and I will agree to knock him out. If he will agree to meet me I will bet him \$5,000 that I will put him to sleep in ten rounds. Sharkey is in Peter Maher's corner in his fight with O'Brien."

Tom Sharkey has certainly told many a "hot one" in his time about the large deposits he has in bank and about the big ranches he owns in California, but the latest, relating to an experience he had while in the navy, takes not only the heat but the whole bakery shop including the lemon pie. Tom says:

Smith is not adverse to entering the ring, providing the inducements are such as to make up his loss in the sailor boarding house business while preparing for the battle.

CLANCY TALKS
OF TURF PLANSThe Proposition at Seattle and
Portland Discussed.

Charley Clancy, the well-known Seattle turfman, who is now at Ingleside with the runners Sailor Boy and Volcher, who he bought from the C. who is at present creating a sensation on the Eastern circuit as a pacer, in speaking of conditions in the Northwest to the San Francisco Bulletin, said:

"The Seattle Association has decided to give a 30-day meeting in the Spring and another of the same duration in the Fall, and we expect to have Judge Murphy to preside in the stand. A proposition was made to him by telegram at about the time the Butte meeting closed, but he had departed for St. Louis and I do not think he received the telegram. Afterwards, the judge was communicated with at St. Louis and asked to make the trip to Seattle to look over the ground and have a conference with the principal owners of the establishment. I would not be at all surprised to hear that he was up there now. We have one of the prettiest plants in this country, situated right in the bend of a river, but a few miles out of Seattle, with first-class transportation facilities, electric and steam cars running to the track, a commodious, up-to-date grand stand, over 500 stalls for horses—in fact, everything that goes to make up a first-class racing establishment. The first meeting held over the new course was a success from every standpoint, and we were laboring under some disadvantages, too, in that many horses we might have had ordinarily were racing at Butte. Next season's meetings should be much better ones in every way. I would like to see some good manager secure the Irvington Park track, just out of Portland, the lease having about expired. There is no reason to be advanced why a success could not be made there if a circuit were made up of Portland, Seattle and some other sport-loving city, for six of the seven months of the year we do not race around San Francisco could be filled in at these points with pleasure to the people in the making of money for the horsemen and the racing association."

WANT STREET IMPROVEMENTS

Commend City and Suburban for
Prompt Attention.

Manager Swigert, of the City and Suburban Railway Company, is in receipt of the following communication from the Albina Improvement Association, which he prizes very highly:

"Dear Sir:—At the last meeting of the Albina Improvement Association, the Montgomery Slough bridge question was under discussion, and in that connection a resolution was offered and unanimously adopted commending your company for its prompt action in undertaking the repair of the bridge, and I was directed thereby to write you a letter, expressing the appreciation of your efforts to accommodate the people traveling over your line to Lower Albina.

NEW MEMBERS
TO TAKE SEATSLast Regular Meeting of the Oregon
City Council.WILL WORK FOR
CITY'S HEALTHThe Mayor and the City Council
Are Active.

Mayor Williams and the councilmen are in earnest regarding the infected meat and impure milk situation that exists in Portland. That strenuous measures will be taken to correct the evil is a promise made by these officials that will be kept.

It was the intention of Councilman Sigler to bring up the old milk ordinances at the council meeting this afternoon. However, after consulting the Mayor, the auditor and the city attorney, it was found impracticable to do so, for the reason that the time is too limited between this date and the early days in January when the new city charter will become operative. He proposes to pass an ordinance creating a meat and milk inspector.

Mayor Williams wished to go on record as favoring a meat and milk inspector, both officers to be directly under the supervision of the health officer. Such an order of things would place all health matters in one department. I do not favor independent officers of that character," said the chief executive.

SIGLER MEANS BUSINESS.

Councilman Sigler, in reviewing the important subject this morning, said: "I intended to bring ordinances before the Common Council meeting this afternoon, but after going into conference with the Mayor and others I found that a law could not be passed for several weeks. It is a grave subject, and needs much and careful study to perfect an ordinance that will completely regulate this evil. However, I will make it my duty to follow the subject diligently until we get the new city charter, and then make suggestions and accomplish work that will, I believe, bring about the great needed reform."

"I have expressed myself pointedly on the meat and milk question, and am prepared to say right now that The Journal has done the citizens of Portland a lot of good by exposing the rotten conditions which allow dishonest dealers to impose upon an ignorant public. Ignorant, only because the public is not expected to know."

WILL BE SHIPPED
FROM TACOMAHay For Manila Goes by Way of
Puget Sound.OREGON PRODUCTS
TO THE ORIENTIndravelli Will Be Ready to Sail
Friday.

The Oriental liner Indravelli is making good progress loading, and will be ready to sail not later than Friday. She will take out 7,000 tons of general merchandise, consisting principally of flour and cotton. A big consignment of beer is also being stored away in the holds, as well as 700 boxes of Oregon apples.

Commerce between here and the Orient is rapidly increasing, and it is quite probable that another vessel will have to be added to the fleet at no distant date. In both China and Japan there is a growing demand for Oregon products. A larger shipment of apples is being made at this time than ever before, and there is a corresponding increase in the orders for other Oregon products all along the line. During the past year the capacity of every Portland-Asiatic liner has been taxed to its utmost. Had there been ample accommodations the shipments would have been much larger.
