OVER THE WILLAMETTE EAST SIDE SUBURBS NEW FACTORY AT SELLWOOD BRIDGE IS WANTED

Company Is Incorporated to Manufacture Clothing.

II WILL USE OREGON WOOL

Charles Coopey and Other Prominent Men in Company.

Another clothing factory will soon be established in this city. A few days ago a company was organized in this city with Charles Coopey, a well-known tailor of this city, as prime mover. Its object will be the manufacture of clothing out of Oregon-grown wool.

The leading members of the new corporation are the backers of the Portland Woolen Mills at Sellwood. Already it has been found necessary to enlarge the plant of the factory to keep up with the large number of constantly increasing orders.

"This shows," said one of the managers of the concern, "that as good or better wools can be manufactured in Oregon as any place on earth."

"When the subject of a woolen mill for this city was first broached there was a general cry that it would be a failure as it could not hope to compete with the older concerns of the Eastern states. This idea has proven false and Portland's only woolen mill has proven a success even greater than its promoters ever dared to hope."

The Sellwood mill is at present employing about 100 people and when the additional machinery is ready to operate at least 50 more employees will be needed. The company will shortly begin the work of erecting another building 7500 feet and two stories in height.

It is understood that the quarters for the new clothing factory will be erected near the site of the woolen mill, the product of which it will use.

In Justice Seton's Court.

The Portland Credit Association has filed a suit in the East Side Justice Court against S. S. McFadden and his wife, for the sum of \$29.80, alleged to be due on a bill of merchandise purchased. Costs of bringing the action are asked for.

A. H. Trege has brought suit against Ira Dodge and W. W. Baker for \$50 with interest at 8 percent from October 1, 1901.

The Fickenshield-Mayer company has sued C. M. Vaughn for a paper bill amounting to \$16.00. Costs of the suit are also asked for.

Enlarging Church Basement.

Workmen are engaged in excavating in the basement of the Centenary Methodist Church, East Ninth and East Pine streets. A cut of about two feet will be made in the floor of the basement and a new 18 ft. wide and 12 ft. long partitioned off and used as a kitchen by the ladies.
