

## SALOON BOXES THE SUBJECT

### Common Council Battles With Proposition.

### After Long Talk Nothing Is Done, and the Measure Is Deferred.

Whether young girls, their escorts and the like can enter side doors of saloons in the City of Portland, will be determined probably at the special license committee of the Common Council meeting, set for 8 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Councilman Albee's ordinance to eliminate side boxes from saloons and the entrance thereto was turned down by a substitute measure introduced by Councilman Flegel yesterday afternoon.

The ordinance proposed embodied the licensing of music halls wherein liquor was sold, with an additional tax of \$300. On motion of Councilman Flegel the suspended measure was carried, and tomorrow afternoon it will be discussed and decided upon. Among the supporters there was much discussion regarding the morality of places supporting side boxes wherein liquor is sold to frequenters.

Councilman Bentley spoke upon the subject, and said that he would oppose the passage of the ordinance at that time, and believed that it would be wise to discuss it at a special meeting held for that purpose. He said it should be the endeavor of every councilman to vote against an ordinance permitting it.

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Batted from desk to desk among the councilmen did the subject of morality and immorality pass; and the consensus of remarks led to the conviction that all vice in Portland, that can be curtailed, will be.

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## HE SAYS NEED HAS NO CHANCE

### Whealdon, of Wasco County, is Here.

### Does Not Name His Choice But Says Legislators Are Not Bound by the Popular Vote.

"Governor T. B. Geer feels certain of election to the office of United States Senator from Oregon, and from expressions made by C. W. Fulton he seems equally well assured of the success of his candidacy. It is true that Mr. Geer has been endorsed by the common people, and that he is entitled to recognition on that score, but the legislators are privileged to express their own views, independent of that expressed by those who went to the polls and cast a vote which could not count. It is their duty to act as they consider best in the general interest of the state. Mr. Hirsch was considered a senatorial possibility, but unfortunately he has taken a change of venue to a post of higher honor.

Representative N. Whealdon, a real estate dealer of The Dalles, Wasco County, made the above statement this morning to a reporter for The Journal. He was questioned regarding the chances of Davey, Eddy and Harris, each of whom is out after the honor of house speakership, but would not commit himself.

Mr. Whealdon is in Portland on business of a private nature and is stopping with friends.

### WASCO'S VIEWS.

"What is the preference of the people of Wasco County in the matter of senatorial choice?" Mr. Whealdon was asked. He shook his head and replied:

"The people of Wasco County take a great deal of interest in this contest, but they are divided. They place reliance in the Scott case, and the Scott case is a legislative matter, and the first duty of these members is to keep their own counsel until called upon in legislative session to cast their votes.

"The Eddy-Davey-Harris fight is also attracting a great deal of attention, but I have never been called upon by my constituents to make known my stand, and I guess that knowledge can be denied the public until its coming out will count for something in the Oregon House of Representatives."

### GEER HAS NO CHANCE.

In response to a direct question, Mr. Whealdon said he did not believe the fact that Governor Geer had been given a popular vote for the senatorship should mean that members of the Legislature were pledged to support him. However, he would not declare that he opposed the present governor in his future aspirations.

The Wasco County people are not making a great deal of fuss over the present just at present, anyway," he said. "They have wool and wheat to attract their attention, and are not following the senatorial troubles."

"Who will be Senator from Oregon is a matter that is far from settled as yet, and it may be considerable time before the choice is made."

### AFTER COOS BAY TRADE

### W. A. Mears Speaks of Proposed Steamer Line to Coos Bay.

In an interview with a Journal representative this morning, W. A. Mears, chairman of transportation committee of the Chamber of Commerce, said:

"Our coast duty of work lately working on this steamer line to and from Coos Bay. The main difficulty we are experiencing is the fact that a steamer cannot run with a cargo one way and none the other. We have tried to get the coal men in the Coos Bay to carry their coal to Portland thus giving us a north-bound cargo, and we are willing to guarantee a southbound cargo. As yet we have come to no agreement.

"At the present time the Coos Bay trade is all going to San Francisco. If they could get the coal cheap enough up here the merchants are willing to do the best they can to encourage them in establishing a profitable market in Portland. There is no reason why the trade from that part of the state should not come to Portland instead of going to San Francisco.

"Our committee has been at work on other propositions, but I don't think it advisable to give them to the newspapers for fear they will be taken from other cities on the north and south."

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## BAD WHISKY AND JEALOUSY

### Cause of Conjugal Inharmony—A Divorce Now.

Though bedridden and absolutely unable to protect herself it is alleged that it became necessary for Mrs. Jane Moody to appeal to the courts for a restraining order against her husband, William Moody. Attorney J. F. Logan placed the matter before Judge Sears, who promptly issued the order.

In an affidavit filed in the State Circuit Court, Mrs. Moody states that since she has been sick in bed her husband has subjected her to abuse which she can no longer endure. A divorce suit is pending in court, and Mrs. Moody recites that her husband has made bodily assaults on her since the papers were filed, and as a result she is confined to her bed.

### CONSTANT ABUSE.

The Moody case was tried in Vancouver, Wash., August 25, 1902, and Mrs. Moody says her life has been a burden ever since. Her husband has made the marriage state intolerable by constant abuse, ranging from a hair-pulling to a downright hard beating with his clenched fists.

Whisky is the chief cause of the trouble, and his twin brother, jealousy, follows a close second. The divorce will probably come before the court tomorrow, unless Mrs. Moody is too ill to be present.

### MORE SHIPPERS SIGN AGREEMENT

### All Shipping Firms in City Recognize Grainhandlers' Union.

The shippers have undergone a great transformation since then, however, as is evidenced by the alacrity and willingness by which they entered into a written contract with their employees for the ensuing year. A union man expressed it in this wise:

"The shippers are thoroughly in touch with the tendency of the times, and they fully recognize that it is becoming exceedingly unpopular to stubbornly oppose any just demands that a labor organization may make."
