

WRITES ABOUT OSAKA FAIR

Largest Ever Held in Japan.

Consul Lyon Makes Report to State Department--Foreign- ers Well Looked After.

Relative to the Osaka Exhibition, Consul S. B. Lyon made the following report to the State Department on December 28:

This exhibition will be by far the largest in scope and plan of any ever undertaken by the government, and under the roofs of the fine buildings which are being erected will be amassed the most extensive collection of manufactures and products of the Empire ever yet seen. A special feature is the admission of foreign exhibits, it being the desire of the government to do everything possible in order to strengthen the commercial interests and relationship of Japan with other countries.

TWO AREAS.
Two separate areas are to be occupied by the exhibition—one at Tennōji, Osaka, and the other at Sakai; that at the latter place being devoted to the aquarium only. The premises at Osaka occupy 630,000 square feet, while the aquarium is to cover a space of 60,000 square feet. Many more firms than were originally allowed for will exhibit, and all the goods sent will be selected ones only, so that the exhibition will furnish a water opportunity for those desiring to inspect samples of first-class Japanese manufactures and products. Many of the firms whose spaces have had to be reduced in consequence of the lack of room in the main hall have decided to erect their own buildings, which will form an annex and will be totally different from anything undertaken at similar exhibitions in this country.

FOR FOREIGNERS.
Bazaars, stalls, and kiosks are to be erected by the several prefectures for the sale of goods produced therein. Foreigners who visit the exhibition will therefore be enabled to make purchases from all parts of Japan and choose innumerable souvenirs which might otherwise necessitate long and expensive railway journeys. The Japanese government will occupy a separate building, in which will be exhibited the products of that island. There will also be a special hall of European architecture in which will be given musical entertainments entirely under the direction and management of Europeans.

EVERYTHING JAPANESE.
In the fine-art hall will be found works designed and executed by the leading Japanese artists of the day, which will include paintings, brass work, sculpture, pottery, etc.
Japanese restaurants and tea houses will be placed in various convenient positions. There will be an athletic and recreation ground where Japanese sports in dress and present style will be performed daily, with many other entertainments. Dances and music as performed in various centers throughout Japan will be provided; visitors will, if they wish, be enabled to enjoy the novelty which has proved so popular in England and America—"shooting the chute"—a water chute being in course of construction; a big tower is being erected from which visitors will be enabled to obtain a fine view of the City of Osaka; and military and other bands will perform daily and nightly. The exhibition itself will be closed during the evenings, but the grounds are to be brilliantly illuminated by means of electricity, and here most of the entertainments will take place. Various special facilities for seeing the neighborhood are to be offered to holders of exhibition tickets.

FOREIGN VISITORS.
Foreign visitors will be well looked after in every way. A hundred and fifty students from the Foreign Language School are to act as guides.
The expense of the exhibition, apart from the cost which is being defrayed by the 47 prefectures for their respective exhibits, is estimated at 1,000,000 yen (\$40,000). Three million Japanese visitors are expected.
The exhibition, apart from its general interest, will be an event of great national importance, and it bids fair to be a huge success.

CELEBRATED NEW YEAR

Whole World on Fire.

All free Americans and all Americans are free—have an inborn desire for noise, and all who love the rattle and rattle of a "good old rousing time" welcome the advent of each year while its age is limited in moments, seconds and minutes. But the human mind is prone to forgetfulness, and he who forgets must reap the reward thereof.

And this is the story of the way a certain couple who reside in Albina celebrated the dawning of 1909.
Early in the evening the young husband returned home from his daily work. He was tired and his head ached. He ate his supper in an absent-minded way and sought his bed. CHARTER RATES IMPROVE SOME

A Ship Refused 16s 9d to Load for Europe.

Charter rates seem to be picking up slightly. A ship yesterday refused an offer of 16s 9d to load for Europe. This is about 1s 3d above the rates which have prevailed for the last two months. There is the largest amount of disengaged tonnage, however, in Portland and on Puget Sound that was ever known, and ship-owners are very much discouraged over the situation. The vessels remaining unchartered in Portland are the Euphrosyne, the Bladen Hill, the Boydade, the Wisconsin Park, the Emile, and the County of Tenitigow, having a combined carrying capacity of 11,798 tons net register.

During the past year 112 ships have taken grain cargoes from Portland, carrying over \$20,000 tons.

WIDENED THE CHANNEL.

The new dredge Columbia of the Port of Portland Commission has been doing some good work for the past week. It has dug out almost 60,000 cubic yards at Postoffice Bar, widening the channel from 150 to 200 feet. It is expected that she will be taken by the United States engineers early next week who will place her at work in the Columbia River, under Assistant Engineer Baglan.

SPECIAL DATE FOR BREEDERS

Railroads Enter Combine to This End.

Object Is to Promote Quality of Stock All Over the Pacific Northwest.

While stories were going the rounds of the newspapers of impending building and rate wars between the Harriman and Hill railway systems, these two great traffic concerns got together in Portland, discussed plans and devised means for bettering conditions throughout the Pacific Northwest generally, and will work hand in hand to this end. The live stock industry is the one that has been taken up and uniform rate reductions have been agreed to for the purpose of upbuilding this particular feature of Northwest business.

These reductions in rates will be operative locally only, and will apply to pure-bred stock merely. It is the object of the companies entering the agreement to promote as much as possible breeding of high-grade stock and the lessening of shipping charges from one Northwest point to another is to enable stockmen to purchase from one another and interchange animals to elevate the grades. The reductions agreed upon by representatives of the Southern Pacific, O. R. & N., Northern Pacific and Great Northern are as follows:

THE NEW RATES.
On pure-bred cattle weighing 1,000 pounds or less, freight will only be made for 1,000 pounds. Hereafter freight has been collected on 2,000 pounds, the amount of car space occupied by the animal being taken into account.

On sheep and goats, pure-bred, the reduction will be from one and one-half first-class, formerly charged, to simply first-class.

On pure-bred hogs, one and one-half first-class rate, to simply first class. In order to reduce the rates on livestock, the reductions announced above it will be necessary for announcement to be made that they are for breeding purposes solely. Horses are not affected by the reduction.

This rate will go into effect about January 15. Representatives of all Pacific Northwest lines met in the offices of General Agent Coman, of the Southern Pacific, in this city and arrived at the above understanding. Speaking of the matter to a reporter for The Journal, Mr. Coman said:

"This action has been taken by the railroad lines for the purpose of assisting livestock breeders. Live stock is the principal section of the country where the world over are advocating breeding upward and it is to facilitate this that we are working. If a man has sheep which he wants to improve and knows some one in another section of the country who has a ram which would be of benefit to him, he is now enabled to ship that animal from the place of purchase to the point of pasturage at much less figure than formerly. Of course, we see where the rule would be applied to the same time they are along their lines, but that does not in any manner detract from the value of the present rate reduction which will be of much benefit in the livestock industry. Hereafter a half-rate ticket will be allowed each person traveling in charge of pure-bred stock.

A BIG TUFT OF MESQUITE

A Single Seed Produced 115 Stalks Near Salem--At S. P. Offices.

A tuft of mesquite grass, five feet four inches in height, and which contains 115 stalks, springing from a single seed, is on exhibition at the local offices of the Southern Pacific Railroad Company. The specimen was sent to Portland from the vicinity of Salem and photographs have been made from it which will be turned into "lantern slides" for use in advertising. By industrial and agricultural experts this tuft is considered a wonder. That 115 separate and fully matured stalks should spring from a single seed is something heretofore unheard of. Mesquite grass is a volunteer range grass introduced into the Northwest from Texas. Once seeded the land on which it is desired mesquite to be grown needs no further attention. The plant will not "winter kill," and each succeeding season will spring up thicker and more plentifully than before. It is considered excellent food for stock, but is not valuable for hay purposes.

WANT FIRE ENGINE

Sunnyside Residents Say That They Are Entitled to It.

Residents of Sunnyside are not satisfied with their present protection from fire. The Fire Commissioners have provided that section of the city with a hose wagon with one regular man to fight fires.

This is unsatisfactory and now Sunnyside wants the commissioners to provide them with a regular engine company. They argue that the distance is so great between Sunnyside and any of the other engine companies on the East Side that the whole town would be destroyed before the blaze could be reached.

Lee Holden, East Side engineer of the department, is in favor of providing another company of fire fighters for that locality and thinks that the work cannot be done too quickly to insure public safety.

W. Stone; 11:45 to 12, the coming in of the New Year. President W. M. Ladd presided.

\$600 PLEDGE KEPT.
The Portland association has raised its pledge of \$600 for the Nagasaki association building, which is soon to be built. The money will all be collected in a short time, after which it will be forwarded to John R. Mott, the international secretary of the foreign work of the Young Men's Christian Association. His headquarters are located in New York.

On Sunday, October 12, Dr. U. Sasamori, president of the association work in Nagasaki, and also president of a college there, visited the Portland association and laid before the members the project of building a handsome structure in his native city. The local association pledged \$600.

**POSTAL CARD
WAS RETURNED**

A Minister Wrote Message on Both Sides.

"I have no fault to find with the government," said Rev. Hubert Ferguson yesterday to a Journal reporter, "but it certainly does indulge in strange caprices occasionally. An incident happened a short time ago which led me to this conclusion. I was writing on a postal card to send to a particular friend in the East. There was hardly enough space on the back of the card for me to say all I desired, and I concluded with the following line on the opposite side: 'I wish you good cheer.' The card came back in a short time marked this way: 'Contrary to regulations.' Now, it is certainly going pretty far when the postal department writes to a person wishing a friend good cheer, 'don't you think so?' And the reverend gentleman walked away with an injured look.

EIGHTY MILES NEW WALK

Portland will have the finest sidewalk in the West by the close of this year. The new law requiring cement walks to be constructed within the limits of the principal section of the city will operate greatly to the beautifying of the residence sections.

The report of the city engineer for the past year will not be out until about February 1, but a Journal reporter learned from an authoritative source that 80 miles of sidewalk has been laid during the past year. Half of the walk was cement and half plank. Most of the new walks have been put down on the East Side, although quite a noticeable amount was laid on this side of the river.

So much new sidewalk is being laid that the city has had to employ a force of 10 inspectors, who attend to the work exclusively. At first the city employed but one inspector, who filed 1,800 reports of defective sidewalks in the first six months of his work. Now it is an uncommon thing for reports of dangerous walks to be filed.

ENLARGE POWERS OF COMMISSION

Some Provisions of Revised Elkins Bill.

Orders of Inter-State Commerce Commission Will Be Subject to Review.

The proposed Elkins Bill, as revised, relates to the enlarging of the powers and jurisdiction of the Inter-State Commerce Commission whose rights are at present not recognized by the courts.

Section 1 provides that any definite order made by the commission declaring what rate or rates or regulation or practice affecting the subject shall be substituted for those found, after hearing and determination of any formal complaint made to the commission, to be unjustly discriminatory or unreasonable, shall become operative within 30 days after notice thereof to the carriers concerned. Such order shall continue in force for the period of one year, but if the carrier shall hereafter see fit to increase the rates or change the regulation established by the order, it shall file 30 days' previous notice thereof with the commission.

When the rate substituted by the commission is a joint rate and the carriers fail to agree upon the apportionment thereof among themselves, the commission may determine the portion to be received by each. When the order of the commission prescribes the just relation of rates to or from common points on the lines of several carriers, and the carriers concerned fail to agree upon changes to be made to produce the required relation, the commission may prescribe the rates to be charged by either or all of the parties to the proceeding to or from such common points.

Orders of the commission are subject to review by a Circuit Court of the United States having jurisdiction, upon petition, to be heard upon the record of the case before the commission; and the court may, in its discretion, upon application of either party, cause additional testimony to be taken in such manner as it shall direct. If the court finds that the order of the commission is unjust or unreasonable upon the facts, it shall suspend or revoke the same; and it may, upon application and hearing, suspend the order pending the review. Either party may appeal to the Supreme Court within 30 days, but such appeal shall not operate to stay or supersede the order of the Circuit Court. The case shall have the precedence in both the Circuit Court and the Supreme Court over all except criminal cases. The defense is to be conducted and the costs and expenses thereof borne by the United States.

ANTISEPTIC BARBER SHOPS

Latest Achievement in Hygienic Science Being Introduced.

An English-gentleman who recently passed through the city was not favorably impressed with the tonsorial parlors in this country. In the course of conversation he said that in London they now have what is known as the "Antiseptic Shaving Saloon." This is the latest achievement in hygienic science.

The process which one must undergo is somewhat as follows: The victim is seated in an enameled iron chair, with his neck and shoulders enveloped in a rubber pad that has been dipped in an antiseptic solution. Previously the soap dish and brush have been sterilized by half an hour's hard boiling. Nothing is allowed to touch the face that has not been either sterilized or disinfected antiseptically. Even the finger tips of the operator are dipped in a solution. Taps are turned by the foot, and drawers where towels are kept are microbe-proof.

The process which one must undergo is somewhat as follows: The victim is seated in an enameled iron chair, with his neck and shoulders enveloped in a rubber pad that has been dipped in an antiseptic solution. Previously the soap dish and brush have been sterilized by half an hour's hard boiling. Nothing is allowed to touch the face that has not been either sterilized or disinfected antiseptically. Even the finger tips of the operator are dipped in a solution. Taps are turned by the foot, and drawers where towels are kept are microbe-proof.
