IT BEGINS OPERATION

The St. Johns Electric Cars Started Yesterday.

SWIGERT TAKES CAR DOWN

First Trip Made in About 14 Minutes—Will Run Permanently.

At last the St. Johns electric line has been put into operation.

Yesterday C. S. Swigert, manager of the company, brought down car No. 199 and turned it over at St. Johns to Motorman William Evans and Conductor Thomas Monahan.

The first through car was run from St. Johns at 10 o'clock and made regular trips until 5 o'clock in the afternoon. The first trip down to St. Johns was made by Manager Swigert in about 14 minutes.

Residents of St. Johns are elated over the completion of the line and many funny incidents occurred to mark the first day of its operation. The people residing along the Peninsula are so familiar with the whistle of the old steam motor that they were with suspicion the advent of the electric car.

Every man, woman and child living along the line of the new car route was out yesterday to get a ride. Three little children about 6 years of age got aboard the car at Portsmouth and wanted to take a ride. They were asked by Conductor Monahan who they were and where they wanted to go. To this one of the little totos replied, "We want to wide on eltwick car."

TO RUN PERMANENTLY. The new cars will be put permanently on the run, and will, for a short time at least, take the old motor schedule. As soon as the new sub power station is in full operation, an extra car will be put on the run and a half-hour schedule made.

SMALLPOX SCARE. Residents of St. Johns are alarmed over the reappearance of smallpox in their usually quiet little burg.

Although only one case of the disease has as yet made its appearance in the vicinity, steps are about to be taken to keep it within bounds.

A resident of St. Johns called at the Journal office yesterday and said that there was little doubt in his mind but that the place was soon to have an epidemic of the dreaded disease.

"It is all due to the greed of landlords," he says. "A year ago our suburb was visited with smallpox. It was brought in by a number of workmen who were engaged in laying the O. R. & N. Company's branch to St. Johns. For a long time the patients were allowed to go unmolested any place they pleased and the disease soon began to spread."

QUARANTINE INEFFECTIVE. "All the patients were finally quarantined in the old mill along the river front. When this became full, the other sufferers were put in tents. Although some people might call this sort of business a quarantine, still the men were allowed to mingle with their fellow workmen. Some of the patients were even allowed to come into the city on the old steam motor."

The old mill building and other surrounding structures were not properly disinfected after the quarantine was cleared off, and I am quite certain that the present case is due to the lax methods employed by the authorities.

All the old huts formerly used for smallpox patients have been rented by the city to unsuspecting people, and I think it to be the duty of the county to see that these places were properly disinfected before they were allowed to be occupied."

STUDENT BROKE LEG. Anthony Webber Is Injured at Columbia University.

As the result of a fall received yesterday, Anthony Webber, a student at the Columbia University at University Park, is confined to a ward in St. Vincent's Hospital.

Young Webber was swinging over a bar in the University's new gymnasium when one of his hands slipped and he fell heavily to the ground. A physician was instantly called, and it was found upon examination that one of the lad's legs had been broken in the fall.

ARC LIGHT WANTED. East Siders to Pettition County for Lamps.

Electric arc lights are wanted for the Madison street bridge. They are not only wanted, but East Siders now demand them.

The Morrison street bridge is the principal artery between the East and West Sides of the river. The bridge is the poorest lighted one in the city, and a petition is about to be prepared and sent to the County Court asking that something be done in the year and the room of the Morrison street bridge is owned by the city, it is operated under the supervision of the county.

ANNUAL BANQUET. Church of Good Shepherd Holds Its Yearly Celebration.

The annual banquet of the Church of the Good Shepherd was given Tuesday evening, a majority of the church officials of the city being in attendance with their friends and families. This was the Epiphany celebration of the year and the room of the Morrison street bridge is owned by the city, it is operated under the supervision of the county.

CEMENT SHIPS. The British ship Riverdale has entered at the custom house from Hamburg with 30,475 barrels of cement. The following ships have brought cement from the same port during the past few months: The Hudson Mill, in December; the Riverdale, in November; the Matterhorn, in October, and the Samantha, in September.

MARINE NOTES. The steam schooner Sequoia has been taken to Supple's boatyard for repairs. The Jean Bart has finished discharging ballast at the Victoria dock, and shifted to the elevator to load wheat.

The Alaska dock has been fitted up with incandescent lights.

Mrs. Beck says that this is the second time her lord and master has left without telling her of his future whereabouts. "The next time he leaves," she says, "it will be a charm, and then perhaps he will not come back again."

The deserted woman is compelled to take in washing to support herself.

John Swanson Nuptials. Justice Waldemar Seton yesterday evening performed the ceremony uniting Jacob John and Miss Carrie Swanson, at the Elmon Hotel, on the West Side. The ceremony was performed in the parlors, a large number of the friends of both parties being in attendance. George P. Maitland acted as best man, and Mr. L. M. Levinson as bridesmaid. A large table contained numerous presents. A wedding banquet was served in House's Restaurant.

LARGE WHEEL CAST. Phoenix Iron Works has just completed one of the largest casts ever made in this city.

It is a large band wheel for use in the Eastern Lumber Company. The new wheel will drive all the machinery in the large concern. It has a diameter of 11 feet 2 inches, and a face of 49 inches.

A double set of arms add strength to the casting. The wheel was cast in two sections and is fastened together with 16 two and a half inch bolts. The hub of the wheel measures 22 inches in width and 38 inches in depth. It will be used on an 11-inch shaft. Eighteen tons of metal were used in the casting.

VOTE FIFTEEN MILLS. Montavilla Annual School Meeting Held Yesterday.

A 15-mill tax was levied at the annual meeting of the taxpayers of the Montavilla School District yesterday afternoon. The report of Clerk Robert Ehlers showed that on June 1, 1902, the district's treasury had \$2,515.58, which sum was afterward increased to \$3,743.07.

The directors then asked that a levy of 15 mills be made to pay the current expenses, and for the payment of the interest on the bonds. No provisions were made at this meeting for any enlargement of the school house.

Truck Falls Through Street. Accidents are frequently happening on the elevated roadway on Union avenue and East Stark street. Yesterday a large, heavily loaded truck fell through the roadway, and it was some time before the vehicle could be brought to the surface. The city engineer's force aided in the work of rescue.

Car Jumps Track. By the derailing of a Woodstock car at the corner of Grand avenue and East Harrison street yesterday morning, traffic on the Woodstock-Brooklyn branches of the City & Suburban Company was delayed for over an hour.
