

WORKMAN MEETS FEARFUL DEATH

Paper Worker Crushed
at Oregon City.

Other News of the City at
the Falls of the
Willamette.

(Journal Special Service.)
OREGON CITY, Jan. 24.—A Sunderland, an employee of the Crown Paper Mills, was fatally injured yesterday morning while at work, dying last evening. He leaves a young widow and an infant child to mourn his loss. He was a young man about 25 years of age. The remains were taken to Corvallis, where they will be buried this morning and an inquest was held.

Sunderland was working on a wood conveyor, which was not in motion when he started to repair it, but all at once it began to move, crushing his body as it took him toward the big knives used in shelling up the wood. Had his body been taken a foot further he would have been cut into mince meat. When a doctor arrived it was ascertained that his injuries were of a fatal character and that he would soon die. Every effort was made to ease his pain and he was taken to his home, suffering intense agony. The whole body was bruised, several ribs were broken and internal injuries were received. It is thought that he carried a moderate life insurance with one of the fraternal orders. Funeral arrangements have not been made and it is not known where the remains will be interred.

SHOES BROUGHT WOE.
A part of the Jewish colony in this city was worked into a great excitement yesterday afternoon over the theft of a pair of shoes. Those concerned turned out in force, when the trial came up at 2 o'clock and then their excitement was increased by the mystery of the Justice Court. But they won their case. Just before noon a young man entered the second hand store of L. Topholar and began talking to the owner's wife. He soon left and with him a pair of shoes. They became too heavy to carry, so the man tried to sell them to Wiley, the harness-maker. Wiley did not want them, so the second-hand store was asked to take them. The store owner was willing and the bargain was closed. Just then Topholar came pulling down the street, found his shoes and his man and had that sent arrested. At 3 o'clock the trial came up and the man giving his name as Frank Clifton was convicted and sentenced to 30 days in jail. Then he became angry saying that the man who said he stole the shoes was a "blankety blank liar." Chief Burns informed the man that he said so and then the man cooled down. He did not like the scowl of the chief.

Jacks, William Lehman, and Miss J. Kell did exceptionally well in their parts. But it is sufficient to say that every person in the cast deserved praise. The show was a success. It will be repeated tonight.

The pupils of Miss Velda Williams' junior class gave a very satisfactory piano recital last evening at the residence of Mrs. C. G. Miller. Several of the little tots were only seven years old, but all who participated showed talent which is brought out under the careful instruction of their teacher, Miss Williams, who deserves great credit for her successful affair. Eighteen numbers were given by the pupils.

A lively football game was played yesterday at Willamette Falls by the teams from the Ninth and Eleventh grades and the Tenth grade of the public schools. The game resulted in the score of 21 to 4, in favor of the Tenth grade. Only a small crowd witnessed the contest, stormy weather prohibiting a greater attendance.

At 7 o'clock this morning the interior of Shanks' undertaking parlors were discovered to be on fire, by Walter Birnie and Paul Moser, who were passing. They immediately broke open the door and extinguished the blaze before much damage was done. From the location of the fire, it is thought that it was started by the electric or telephone wires becoming crossed.

MITCHELL GETS SALARY RAISED

The Mine Workers Increase the
President's Pay.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 24.—President Mitchell of the United Mine Workers of America will hereafter receive a larger remuneration for his services than heretofore.

At today's session of the convention the salary of the president was increased from \$1,500 a year to \$2,000 a year. In a report declaring that the railroads were unable to move coal. LONDON AGAINST GERMAN METHODS

People and Press Censure
Kaiser's Acts.

Venezuelan Controversy Is Straining
European Situation and
Break May Come Any Time.

(Journal Special Service.)
LONDON, Jan. 24.—Public sentiment in England is very much against Germany in the matter of the bombardment of Port San Carlos. Among public men it is said that this last act of the Germans in bombarding Venezuelan forts and allowing their shells to fall in villages where women and children have been killed is a step too far, and deserves censure from the British government, allied with the Kaiser's power in the present controversy.

Evening newspapers have taken up the matter and there is much strong censure of the German course, which is characterized as bloodthirsty.

"We are ashamed of this ally of ours," says the Star, "who shells and slaughters defenseless children. We deplore this disaster into which the mad acts of the German Emperor are drawing us. He acts like a mad man with a lighted torch in a powder magazine. Yet in the face of all this censure on the streets and in the press, there is a rumor abroad that the court party together with the King approves of Germany's action and is anxious to continue the alliance."

United States Is Unhappy.
NEW YORK CHRONICLE.—Private reports from Washington that one of the Senators would introduce some warlike resolutions in the Venezuelan situation are much discussed in speculative circles tonight and are a damper on bullish sentiment. People do not feel like buying stock on the face of uncertainties growing out of rather strained relations now existing between this country and Germany. They generally concede that in the main substantial influences are favorable and justify the purchase of stocks. WRECKED BY HIGHWAYMEN

Robbers Derail Train in
New Mexico.

Lost Their Nerve After Seeing
Crash and Failed to
Loot Express.

THUNDERBOLT, Col., Jan. 24.—Last night robbers wrecked a passenger train on the Colorado & Southern Railroad near Waterville, N. M.

Four trainmen were badly injured and one passenger was slightly hurt. The robbers evidently lost their nerve after seeing the smashup, for no attempt was made to loot the express car. A large amount of money and valuables was in the through safe, and it is supposed the highwaymen were aware of this.

The wreck was accomplished by pulling out several fish plates. The engine, baggage car and smoking car were overturned.

A posse is in hot pursuit of the wreckers, who have gone in the direction of the Mexican line.

OTHER TRAIN WRECKS.
HOUSTON, Tex., Jan. 24.—A Santa Fe freight train collided with the East-bound passenger train near Cooper Cove today. Two passengers were killed and four seriously injured.

LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 24.—A collision occurred on the Union Pacific at midnight between a passenger and a freight train, near Gottenburg. The fireman of the freight was killed.

VANCOUVER, Jan. 24.—The following military prisoners have been sent, under an escort, to the military prison at Alcatraz Island: Joseph P. Brown, William Evans, Daniel Miles, Harvey Mack, Fred S. Hopkins, Robert H. Stanley, George Folk, Percy H. Paulsen, Samuel H. Bailey and William P. Croft.

Capt. J. B. Gowen, Tenth Infantry, has been assigned to station at Fort Lawton, Wash., pending the arrival of his regiment in that department.

First-Class Sergeant Robert D. Hogan, Signal Corps, will be granted a furlough for four months as soon after June 1 as his services can be spared.

Private John Vener, 32d Company, Coast Artillery, has been granted a furlough for three months.

Private Bireless F. McCluskey, 25th Company, Coast Artillery, has been tried by a general court-martial convened at Fort Flagler, Wash., and found guilty of drunkenness and disorderly conduct and disobedience of orders, involving willful defiance of the authority of a non-commissioned officer, attempting to engage in a fight, using obscene language and resisting arrest, was sentenced (three previous convictions having been considered): "To be dishonorably discharged the service of the United States, forfeiting all pay and allowances due him, and to be confined at hard labor for a period of nine (9) months at Alcatraz Island, California."

FAIR WOMAN IN POLICE COURT

Mary McArdle Once a Beauty and
Her Sad Case.

"Lemme in!" yelled Mrs. McArdle, outside Henry Law's saloon at Second and Couch, last night at 1 o'clock.
"Go away!" said Henry, "I have shut up."

"Lemme in!" said Mrs. McArdle. "Here's my card." And she threw a rock through the window.

"Not at home!" cried Henry Law, and sent for an officer. Mrs. McArdle was booked on a charge of defacing a building.

This morning Henry was loath to make complaint, and it was only when Deputy District Attorney Adams had cornered him that he finally swore to it.

McArdle said she knew nothing about the case and wanted a lawyer. Her case was continued till Monday.

Back of this record on the police blotter is a sad tale of a woman's downfall through drink. Once handsome, prosperous and admired, Mary McArdle has steadily gone down toward ruin, till now her flushed face and unsteady hands are only pitiful reminders of her former beauty.

Today as she sat in the court her dark eyes and waving brown hair attracted a good deal of attention, and it was hard to believe that she was the same that a few hours before had raged in the darkness at Second and Couch in an attempt to get more liquor. She has been up before in court and seems unable to keep away from drink. Otherwise she has borne a fair reputation.

FOUR-YEAR TERM FOR ASSESSORS

A four-year term for county assessors instead of two years, as at present, is to be introduced in the Legislature during the coming week by Senator Marsters. As the county assessor is not a constitutional office, this may be done by act of the Legislature, and will not require the tedious and complicated form of constitutional amendment. The reasons urged for passing the measure are that just, honest and rigid assessments are essential to the welfare of the state as well as of the people. Assessors, when elected every four years, are less likely to be influenced by political combinations or power than when elections come more frequently.

"The assessment of property is one of the vital essentials of our form of government," said Senator Marsters. "Purely impartial assessment is the only assessment that can be right, and we should strive in every possible way to aid assessors in the correct performance of their duty."

Sunday performances at theatres will be legalized by a bill to be introduced in the Senate Monday or Tuesday.

WANTS A DIVORCE.

Minnie Whitcomb has filed an action for divorce from her husband, Fred E. Whitcomb, alleging desertion and cruelty. She alleges they were married in Vancouver, October 4, 1882, and that her husband deserted her on January 10, 1901. She has since been supporting herself.

The startling allegation is made that on July 4, 1900, her husband drew a knife on her and cut her in several places. She says she ran from the house to escape further harm. She names several times when her husband beat her. She alleges he was a heavy drinker, and when drunk was very dangerous.

PAY OF INDIAN VETERANS

Mr. A. Gates of Gates, Oregon, writes to correct the impression that the state had agreed to pay the balance of government veterans. Mr. Gates says that the Legislature of Oregon agreed to pay the veterans \$2 for services rendered. The pay was the same as remuneration for ordinary laborers at the time of the Indian Wars.

FULTON EXPECTS SIX MORE VOTES

(Continued from Page One.)

win more than two at the outside. All the influence which Jack Matthews could muster in the fight for the organization of the two branches of the Legislature was thrown against Fulton, and the latter's victory has wiped the breach thus created.

Vital Question Involved.
But there is a much more powerful argument that is being used among the Multnomah delegates, and which appeals to all of them, irrespective of the cabals of petty bosses or an editor's unwarranted ambitions. There is a widespread belief that the future of Portland as a port is dependent upon the result of the contest over the senatorship. As every one knows, it has been a hard struggle to keep the port in this city. It has been by no means a merely local fight, for all of the Willamette Valley and of Eastern Oregon as well, have been deeply interested in maintaining the present status and in keeping open and navigable the Columbia River. Even with two Senators from Portland, both of them working in unison to this end, they have encountered an incessant effort to divert the traffic of Portland to the mouth of the river and to make Astoria the real port of the state. The plausible argument has been advanced that the only purpose of the people of that city is to make it a common point of entry with Portland, but this assertion is regarded with suspicion by a large proportion of the residents of the state. They see in any such move the incipency of an effort to concentrate at Astoria all the shipping business of the state and to deprive Eastern Oregon of its waterway to the sea.

Fulton Is For Astoria.
Even with two Senators from Portland this city has failed to get her legitimate share of the transport business. With one Senator from Astoria, it is argued, Portland's prospects will be far worse than they are now. Fulton has spent all his life in Astoria. His interests, his associations and all the influences of his surroundings will incline him to espouse the cause of that city. It is true that he has endeavored to place himself on record as favoring an open river, but these protestations are viewed with skepticism.

This is one of the most potent arguments against the candidacy of the Clatsop candidate. It has strongly influenced the members of the Legislature from Eastern Oregon and from the Willamette Valley as well as those from Multnomah. It may prove the obstacle that will be fatal to his ambition. Should Fulton cease to make gains in his fight his condition will become critical. Among those now voting for him are many who at heart would prefer some other candidate. It is indisputable that Blinger Hermann has warm friends among the Fulton forces, and if Hermann should ever enter the race as an avowed candidate they would rally to his standard. Jonathan Bourne, the man of mystery, is another dark horse, who at present is contributing largely to Fulton's strength. But for Bourne's aid, Fulton could not have won the fight for the organization of the Legislature, and it is Bourne's influence today that keeps some of the Fulton votes in line.

The coming week promises to make or mar the fortunes of Charles W. Fulton.

Will Confer With Taxpayers.
The Multnomah members of the Legislature will meet this evening at the City Hall to confer with citizens who are interested in measures now pending in the Senate or the House. An important subject of discussion will be the fireboat, which will be built by the city in case House Bill No. 55, which passed the House on Friday, receives favorable action from the Senate. The Morrison street bridge is another topic which the delegation desires to talk over with the taxpayers.

EXTEND THE TIME.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 24.—The Cuban Minister arranged today with Secretary Hay for an extension of time in which the Cuban reciprocity treaty may be ratified. This will be accomplished by means of the protocol permitting a reasonable extension of time if the Senate fails to ratify the treaty by January 31, the present limit set.

ENDS LIFE WITH ACID

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 24.—Paul Egry, a noted violinist, ended his life with carbolic acid this morning.

Egry had been dissipating heavily for several months. At 4 o'clock this morning, after an all-night carousing, the musician purchased a bottle of carbolic acid at a drug store and, going out onto the street, drank the liquid. He was taken to the receiving hospital, but the physicians were unable to save him. He was 42 years of age.
