

CHINK LOTTERY DAYS ARE DONE

Chief of Police Issues an Ultimatum.

Nefarious Gambling Hells Are to Be Closed Up for Good and All.

"Chief, I understand that you have sent word to the agents and dealers in Chinese lotteries."

"I have."

"May I ask what your object is?"

"Certainly," said Chief of Police Hunt. "These Chinese lotteries have existed for years. It is one of the things to start in on immediately. This is not in the nature of a spread-eagle proclamation, simply a statement of fact. Chinese lotteries can be stopped. So I have sent for all the dealers and agents. I have instructed all the officers to tell them to meet me at 4 o'clock this afternoon. Then I shall say: 'It can't be done. Your lotteries can't run.'"

No Spasmotic Effort.

"My experience has been that when these people understand that the police officials do not intend to let lotteries run, the business is stopped. They must understand that this is no spasmotic effort. Spasmotic efforts bring no results. It would do little good to take this or that one, capture a few tickets and then have to do it all over again. Persistent effort will end this lottery business entirely and I purpose, if necessary, to use every means in my power and every officer on the force to accomplish my end."

"Then this afternoon will be the time when you announce your intention to them?"

"At 4 o'clock," responded Chief Hunt. "If they neglect the warning, then they will have no excuse. The lotteries will be stopped."

China town looks with some dismay on this move and there is much quiet talk among the lottery men in the midst of the New Year celebration. "Tomoliah, we see," said one of the most prominent when approached on the subject by a Journal reporter.

"Will you obey the Chief?"

The dealer looked sober and replied evasively, "No can tell. Tomoliah, we see."

MONTANA MAY GIVE \$10,000

An Encouraging Report From Commissioner.

Mr. McIsaac Now at Olympia in Behalf of Lewis and Clark Fair.

Special Commissioner McIsaac, of the Lewis and Clark Fair, sends some encouraging news from Helena concerning the appropriation from Montana. The letter, in part, is as follows:

"There has been very little change in the situation here since my communication of Friday, the 23d. I have been in consultation with the committee on Fairs and Expositions. I have furnished them with a copy of the Idaho bill, and have the assurance of a majority of the members of this committee that if there are any funds left over after the various bills for appropriations have been satisfied that this committee will be prepared by the extent of at least \$20,000.

"The members of finance and claims in the Senate have taken a very great interest in your Exposition and will use their best endeavors and efforts with the committee on Expositions and Fairs in the House to prepare a bill that will satisfy all the members of the House and Senate."

Now at Olympia.

Mr. McIsaac concludes his letter by stating that there is a disposition among some members of the Legislature to lay the matter over to 1905, but that he has good reason to believe that an appropriation of at least \$10,000 can be obtained this session.

Mr. McIsaac is now at Olympia, endeavoring to have the Washington State Legislature make an appropriation of \$250,000 for the fair, instead of \$100,000.

Special Commissioner Freeman will leave this evening for Canyon City, Nev., where he will lobby for an appropriation of at least \$15,000 for the fair.

LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE.

Hillsboro, Ore., Jan. 23.

Editor Oregon Daily Journal: Attention was called to the publication of an article in your issue of this date under the heading of "Tub Butter vs. Creamery Butter," presumably correctly quoted by you in an interview with William Schuchman, president of the Oregon State Dairy Association, in which that gentleman puts me in a very false light before your readers. This gentleman says that I am trying to nullify one of the best portions of the Oregon Pure Food Law and, with others, are now lobbying in the Legislature at Salem for the purpose of changing part of section 2, which he gives as follows:

"And it shall be unlawful for any person to offer or expose for sale any tub or packed butter remolded into prints or rolls or squares, unless the same is plainly marked 'tub butter'; and it shall be unlawful for any person who offers or exposes for sale reworked, mixed or molded butter, to mark or brand said butter with the stamp of any creamery or with the words, 'Creamery Butter.'"

The facts are, in regard to the above part of section 2 of the Oregon Pure Food Law, the writer would not for one moment consider its repeal, and would fight its repeal to the bitter end. What I desire to have incorporated into the present Oregon Pure Food Law is a section that will not confound May and June, Oregon creamery-made butter, with country bought up, mixed and reworked, and process butter, of which the above law is intended to, and does, prohibit the working or labeling as creamery butter.

When creamery-made butter is manufactured from pure cream, and in May and June, when the creameries have a large surplus above the market demands, this butter is placed in cold storage in large quantities. When this butter is taken out of storage at the season of year when there is not enough of the fresh to supply the market demands, any it is cut up and put into squares and placed on the market for sale, it comes under the dairy law, section 2, which requires every pound of square sold to be branded "Tub Butter."

Part of this section 2 refers to "mixed, reworked or remolded" butter, and when the words "Tub Butter" is branded upon this pure creamery-made article it conveys the impression in the consumer's mind that this cold storage creamery article is a bogus creamery butter, when it is not. Cold storage creamery butter should be classified as such, and not be confounded with the mixed or process article, as I have been under the impression that a law framed which will allow creamery-made cold storage butter to be branded in connection with the regular Oregon creamery butter brand, the words "June's," and a suitable label for the same, which should require every creamery desiring to place creamery butter in cold storage to place upon each package this label, when stored. I have made my desires fully known in this matter to Representatives Jud and Eddy and other members of the Legislature for their respectful consideration. This is the extent of my "lobbying" in the Legislature to kill off the best part of the Oregon Pure Food Law.

When Mr. Schuchman intimates in his interview that I have taken any action or used any influence to overthrow any part of our present dairy law, that will in any manner impede the progress of the dairy interests in this state, he is a wilful prevaricator. As president of the Oregon State Dairy Association his actions become semi-official and are such, in this, his interview is a disgrace.
