Action of Portland Company Causes Alarm.

Montavilla Residents Will Remonstrate Against Establishment of a Graveyard There.

Residents of Montavilla and Mansfield are excited over the proposed establishment of a cemetery in their midst. A company composed of Portland capitalists is negotiating for a tract of land containing about 50 acres between the two suburbs, and it is said that the deal has about been closed. Some of the residents say that they will oppose the establishment of a graveyard in their vicinity, and a petition will soon be circulated for the purpose of keeping out the invaders. The petition will be presented to the county commissioners for action and if the project of the enterprise then they will establish their business in their locality. The matter will be taken into the courts for settlement. "No, we don't want any cemetery out our way," say Montavillians.

MONTAVILLA LIVELY

Building Operations Are Not Interrupted by the Rain.

Building operations are lively in the vicinity of Montavilla. New structures are being constructed by the score and preparations are now being made for the building of many new ones during the early spring. C. A. Aylsworth will soon begin the work of erecting a two-story store building on the corner of Hubbard street and the Base Line Road. The new structure will be built of wood and will cost about \$2,500. A. B. Horton, a well-known business man of the Villa, is about to begin the construction work on a new store building located along the Base Line Road near the Montavilla Post Office. Plans for the structure have not yet been completed.

VILLA ARTISANS

Reception Given to Newly Married Members.

At the regular meeting of Montavilla Assembly, No. 58, United Artists, Tuesday evening a reception was tendered Mr. and Mrs. Jack Speller, who were recently married. A large number of members were present and after an informal program, a delightful supper was served in the banquet hall. Next Tuesday evening the male members of the assembly will tender the lady members of the lodge an oyster supper at Odd Fellows Hall as the result of a wager in which the latter faction was victorious. On February 10 the assembly will hold its regular monthly open meeting and entertainment. An excellent literary and musical program is being arranged for the occasion.

TEMPORARY SCHOOL

Mansfield Union Church Being Remodeled.

Work has been commenced by the Board of Education of the Russellville School District on the remodeling of the Mansfield Union Church into a temporary school building. Plasterers are now busily engaged in finishing the interior. At the last session of the Board of directors of the district held a few days ago it was decided to open a primary department on account of the large number of the younger children who reside in that neighborhood. The new school will probably be opened on the convening of the February term.

DANGEROUS WELLS

County Begins Work of Closing Many Holes.

At last the county officials have heeded the many appeals of the residents of Montavilla to close up the many wells and cisterns in that locality. A number of men are now at work and the dangerous places will be boarded up as rapidly as possible. Most of the wells complained of are owned by the county, having been bought in for taxes due. The danger of allowing the wells to remain uncovered was very great, and many serious accidents have taken place as a result. A short time ago a young son of one of the residents fell into one of the holes and it was with the greatest difficulty that he was finally rescued.

CITY OF ST. JOHNS

Petition for Incorporation About to Be Filed With County.

A petition for the incorporation of the City of St. Johns will likely be presented to the county commissioners at their meeting tomorrow. The petition has been quietly circulated for several months, the opponents of the measure being kept in the dark as to its movement. It is said that the paper has enough signatures to allow it to pass before the county board. A determined fight to the finish will be made by the opposition.

FARMERS ORGANIZE

Will Again Try to Form Combine - Expect to Operate Cannery.

Lewis, was appointed by the chair to look into the matter. The chairman will call another meeting when the occasion demands.

Standard Box Factory Company Will Soon Build.

Work will soon begin on the building of a large sawmill and box factory by the Standard Box Factory Company at the foot of East Ash and East Ankeny streets and running up to East First street.

PASSENGERS TO SECURE PRIVILEGES

Southern Pacific Co. Issues Permits to Ride on Freight Trains.

The Southern Pacific lines in Oregon will hereafter issue time permits for passengers to ride on regular freight trains on the East Side main line south of Albany, and all branch lines. By signing a release for the extra hazard of riding on freight trains, a time permit can be secured which, when presented in connection with regular transportation, will authorize conductors of freight trains to allow the holder to ride on same. This action is taken principally to accommodate the commercial travelers, who will now be enabled to get over the territory operated by the S. P. lines in Oregon with less delay. Applications for these permits can be made to the superintendent direct, or through any agent or traffic representative of the company.

TO DISCUSS SANITATION.

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 29.-Sanitation is the general subject selected for discussion at the thirteenth annual meeting of the State and Local Boards of Health, which began here today. Among the topics for consideration are the following: Regulation of the barber shop, the fly and mosquito as disease carriers, the importance of pure air and sunshine in the home, methods and cost of garbage disposal, clinical aspects of the present epidemic of smallpox throughout the United States, together with the consideration of previous outbreaks.

THE ENGINEERS HAVE TO TESTIFY

Or Else Remain Under Suspension Permanently.

(Journal Special Service.) SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 29.-A Washington dispatch states that Supervising Inspector Birmingham, who is now in that city, has decided that the engineers who left their posts on the steamer Columbia at Portland, and subsequently declined to testify before the local board of inspectors, will have to remain under suspension until they are willing to give testimony on the charges which had been preferred against them. The names of the engineers are M. C. Burpee, R. Foley and J. L. McCauley. They walked out at Portland in sympathy with the marine engineers, who were on a strike at that place. The O. R. & N. Co. immediately brought charges against them to show cause why they should not be removed from the board on the day set for the examination, but when called upon to testify, refused to do so. Their licenses were then revoked, and the case was appealed. Later they were given a hearing before Supervising Inspector Birmingham, who decided the case as above stated.

OLD RESIDENT PASSES AWAY

Mrs. Kern of Umatilla County Dies at Advanced Age.

PENDLETON, Jan. 29.-Mrs. Rhoda Kern died at her home in Holt at 9 o'clock yesterday morning, after a week's illness of a complication of diseases with old age. Mrs. Kern was born February 28, 1833, and had lived in Umatilla County since 1878. There is scarcely a woman in the county more widely known. Among the relatives who survive her is a husband, W. C. Kern, who was for six years Treasurer of this county. Except for their residence on the Holt place, Mrs. Kern had lived at Holt during the entire period of her residence in Umatilla County.
