The Growers Say It Is Not a Trust.

Organization Will Stop Ruinous Competition -- A Co-operative Cannery.

The meeting of the fruit growers of the eastern section of the county at the Russellville schoolhouse Wednesday evening is likely to be the means of organizing the growers of this vicinity nto a combine for self-protection. At the meeting mentioned, a committee was appointed for the purpose of looking into the matter and to define some plan

of organization. "The proposed organization," said a well-known Mt. Tabor fruitgrower yesterday, "is not a trust by any means. It is simply an organization effected for the purpose of protecting its members from ruincus competition. During the berry season especially the competition is so flerce that many of the growers sell their stocks at a decided loss.

Co-operative Cannery. "It is one of the ideas in perfecting an organization of the growers, to operate sort of co-operative cannery in this Stock in this institution is in de mand but the purpose of the fruitgrowers is not to let any one person have any more stock than his neighbor carries This plan will do away with all that talk of the institution being run in the interest of the larger growers. The operating of the cannery will have a tendency to raise prices on all sorts of fruits for canning purposes."
