

ALLIES MUST ACCEPT OR TAKE CASE TO THE HAGUE

Minister Bowen Insists on Justice to All Creditor Nations of Venezuela—Diplomats Much Perturbed—Financiers Are Anxious.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 3.—Minister Bowen has made his final concession, if it may be called a concession; he has delivered an ultimatum to the blockading powers, and it now rests with the allies whether they will yield to reason and justice or tempt a formidable coalition against them. The situation today developed exactly as exclusively forecasted in The Journal's dispatches yesterday.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—Minister Bowen this morning gave the allies their choice between sending the Venezuela dispute to the Hague and accepting his proffered terms of preferential treatment for one month only, as outlined exclusively in The Journal's dispatches yesterday.

After two hours in consultation Herbert Sternburg went to the British embassy where he was joined by the representatives of Britain and Italy. The diplomats have been in conference on Bowen's stand since noon.

Minister Bowen this morning made further representations to his callers on the proposition of the allied powers, showing that it was impossible for Venezuela to accept an arrangement whereby the allies get two-thirds of the 30 per cent deductions from the customs. He said that Venezuela's agreement with the other creditors would forbid such an arrangement.

Hanna and Hill Anxious.

Minister Bowen this morning received Senator Hanna and President James J. Hill of the Great Northern. The financiers were very anxious to ascertain the exact Venezuelan situation. Hill asked directly if the affair was likely to go to The Hague. Bowen replied that his personal opinion was that it would not; he regards the situation as extremely doubtful, however, owing to the many complications that have arisen during the past week.

William Has Them Lined Up.

BERLIN, Feb. 3.—The President of the Reichstag today exhibited in the lobby the new great naval plans presented to the Reichstag by the Kaiser. The plans show a line of British and German battleships prepared for a front. The plans demonstrate the undoubted predominance of the British Navy.

FULTON MAKES SPEECH

Comes Out of His Shell to Fight Against Bill No. 65.

Measure Requiring Trained Attendants for Insane Calls Forth Fervid Eloquence.

SALEM, Feb. 3.—Fulton emerged from his shell of political reserve this morning and spoke 20 minutes against the adoption of the minority report of the Senate Judiciary committee on Bill No. 65, requiring trained attendants to accompany insane persons to the asylum. The complicated one. The original bill required a trained attendant, but a substitute bill was reported, making it optional with the County Court.

Pierce made a minority report against substituting the original bill. It came up under special order, and was widely and violently discussed. Many women were present in the interest of the original bill, and applause was given the minority report.

Fulton has the stage. Rand, Mays and Fulton opposed the minority report, but the greatest of these was Fulton. In a passionate address he held those opposed to him up to ridicule, defended the sheriff and his deputy and held that the people were for the insane and the question of a trained attendant with the courts.

Smith of Multnomah made an impassioned reply to Fulton. He scored the sheriff and deputies for their barbarous methods of handling patients and accused them of grafting from the state. Mulkey, Pierce, Kuykendall, Smith of Multnomah and Booth all spoke against the majority report.

A burst of applause followed Mulkey's speech. Fulton jumped to his feet and demanded of the chair that expression of sentiment by outsiders be suppressed. Fulton again had the floor when the hour for the senatorial ballot arrived.

Pierce Wins Out. (Journal Special Service.) SALEM, Ore., Feb. 3.—The minority report of the Senate Judiciary committee, substituting the original bill requiring the people to pay for the insane while enroute to the asylum was adopted, 23 to 7.

Labor Bill Goes Through Senate. SALEM, Feb. 3.—House Bill No. 148, introduced by Bailey of Multnomah, and designed to protect employees in the right to belong to labor organizations, passed the House this morning. The bill provides that any employer who seeks to compel employees not to join such organizations shall be subject to a fine. There was no debate and only six dissenting votes.

Orion of Multnomah introduced a bill to incorporate the town of St. Johns, Multnomah County.

Fellow Servant Bill. SALEM, Feb. 3.—The Democratic Senators and Representatives caucused at noon today and agreed to support unanimously the fellow servant bill (House Bill No. 744). Despite strong opposition of the railroads and the other big corporations, the bill is expected to pass.

SALEM, Feb. 3.—The Governor signed at noon, House Bill No. 93, Ashland charter; House Bill No. 126, Elgin charter; House Bill No. 151, Enterprise charter; House Bill No. 154, Lexington charter; House Bill No. 173, Sublimity charter; Senate Bill No. 46, Cornelius charter; Senate Bill No. 76, Adams charter.

The British ship Foyledale began taking on lumber this morning at the North Pacific mill for South Africa.

The Musselberg began discharging this morning at the Mersey dock.

The Ephraim, which was recently chartered by J. J. Moore & Co. of San Francisco at \$50,000 a month, left for Sydney was rechartered Saturday by Epfinger & Co. of this city to load for the same place.

The schooner will complete her outward cargo this afternoon and will probably sail tomorrow morning for the Orient. The steamer will carry a cargo valued at \$152,803. It will consist of flour, wheat, apples and miscellaneous merchandise.

The steam schooner Sequoia, which has been undergoing repairs at Supple's yards, was successfully launched yesterday.

NO ONE WILL BE ON HAND

Witnesses Against Murderer Young Mysteriously Disappear.

Cannot Be Found and It Is Thought They May Have Been Frightened Away.

(Journal Special Service.) NEW YORK, Feb. 3.—The prosecution in the case of William Hooper Young, charged with the brutal murder of Mrs. Pulitzer, is much worried over the fact that the witnesses against the prisoner cannot be found.

The subpoena servers have been scouring New York for the past few days in an endeavor to locate the people whose testimony was relied upon to convict the grandson of Brigham Young. Not one of the witnesses can be found. All have mysteriously disappeared.

For some time past persons representing themselves as Mormons have been threatening dire vengeance on the witnesses if they dared to tell the truth in court.

Letters setting forth the alleged doctrine of the Mormon Church relative to the "Blood Atonement" have been sent to people who were supposed to be willing to testify in behalf of the state.

Are Mormons Responsible? The police and district attorney's office believe that the missing witnesses have been persuaded to leave the city by threats or actually made away with.

It was openly stated here by Mormons a week ago that the entire power of the church would be exerted to secure the acquittal of the prisoner.

The prisoner's father is a son of the late Brigham Young, and is himself one of the foremost leaders of the church. The father and other relatives of the young man have declared their belief in his innocence and their readiness to stand by him in this trouble.

A letter found in Young's room, where Mrs. Pulitzer was done to death, set forth the "Blood Atonement" theory and caused the district attorney to declare that this had nothing to do with Young's crime.

CLAIM MATERIAL WAS ALL WRONG. Trouble Over East Burnside Pavement—Exhibit of Rock.

"There's going to be a hard-fought case today," said the clerk of the court to his friend.

"What makes you think so?" "Why, don't you see that box of rocks there on the floor?" and the clerk laughed merrily.

The case wherein the plaintiff's attorney saw fit to bring four boxes and four sacks full of rocks, and specimens of the material with which he claimed the city paved East Burnside street, was the case of A. R. Kaddery vs. the City of Portland. The residents of the portion of East Burnside where the pavement was put down, object to paying for the same, alleging that it was not paved with the proper material.

A Rocky Exhibit. R. R. Dunaway, representing the plaintiff, had an expressman lug the rocks and specimens into the court room this morning, evidently desiring to show what kind of material was used in paving East Burnside. One of the rocks was measured, and it was 10 inches in diameter.

City Attorney McNary represents the city, and will attempt to show that the city paved the streets according to specifications, and that payment should be made.

There was considerable merriment over the large amount of rocks placed in evidence, the clerk being heard before Judge Frazer in the Circuit Court.

DELAY MAY PROVE FATAL. Applications for reclaimed land in the Pumilio Valley have been pending upon President Lytle of the Columbia Southern Irrigation Company in such a flood that he says it is impossible to get them. This is due to the fact that the contract which was signed by the state authorities is hung up at Washington. The signature of the Secretary of the Interior is awaited. President Lytle says that the new irrigation bill before the State Legislature may work as a further cause for delay. Should the bill become a law the reclamation contract in Washington may not be approved at all, which would deter progress in Oregon.

TWO BIG BEGGARS. Big, fat and saucy, Frank Thompson was arrested along with Thomas Hogan by Detective "Snow" yesterday. The charge placed against these worthies is begging. Their way of extracting the reluctant dime or the uneasy nickel was too crudely efficacious. Therefore some outraged housewife who had been informed that their stinkiness was only discounted by their oddity of feature, made complaint; and some men, averse to being called misbegotten reprobates because they would not "dig up" also complained. Thereupon Thompson and Hogan are in trouble.

WOMEN HANGED AT HALLOWAY

Murderers of Infants Are Executed.

Sequel to Awful Deeds Committed by Women on English "Baby Farm."

(Journal Special Service.) LONDON, Feb. 3.—At Halloway this morning two women were hanged. The execution was witnessed by a large crowd of spectators.

The crimes for which the women suffered the death penalty shocked all England when the revelations were made. The women conducted a "baby farm," where infants were taken to board and afterward put to death to save the expense of feeding them.

Through the efforts of a London newspaper the iniquities practiced at the institution were exposed and its proprietors brought to trial.

One of the nurses in the place gave testimony of the methods in use at the "farm," that was almost incredible.
