

NEW COMMITTEES ARE APPOINTED

Grounds Set Aside for Livestock Exhibit.

Directors and Building and Grounds Committee on Lewis and Clark Fair Hold Session.

At the meeting of the directors of the Lewis and Clark Fair held late yesterday afternoon, a revised list of committees as appointed by President Corbett, was approved. In this list quite a few changes have been made in the membership of various committees. Owing to the absence of President Corbett, Vice-President Scott presided at this meeting. The principal business of the meeting was the ratification of the action of the executive committee in appointing a superintendent of grounds and in amending the Wolfe resolution. Superintendent Huber, who was present at this meeting, explained to those present the kind of work he is doing. He stated that the railroad would not run passenger cars on the switch leading to the fair grounds. He was instructed to proceed with his surveys and get everything in readiness for right of way application from the railroad. A proposition that four rooms be rented for use as headquarters of the Lewis and Clark Fair Company was referred to the committee on ways and means. The suggestion was made by Adolph Wolfe that four rooms be rented in a central location, to be used by the secretary, superintendent of grounds, board of directors and general workmen.

Committee Meets.
The grounds and building committee held a meeting after the session of the directors. At this meeting it was decided to set aside 25 acres of land for a livestock exhibit. The question as to whether the Lewis and Clark Memorial Building should be within or without the Exposition grounds consumed some of the time of the meeting. No agreement was reached, however, although the question was thoroughly discussed. Gardner Otten, who was present, showed to the members of the committee a plan of the Exposition grounds as prepared by him. This plan was examined and Mr. Otten was pitted with questions regarding it.

Paul Westinger and G. W. Bates were appointed a committee to consult architects regarding what would be best to pursue in offering prizes for plans of various buildings.

LABOR MEN URGE APPROVAL OF BILL

FINAL ACTION ON NEW LAWS

Governor Approves and Vetoes Many Bills.

Complete List of Measures Filed With or Without Executive Signature.

(Journal Special Service.)
SALEM, Feb. 25.—The Governor today vetoed several bills passed at the recent legislative session. In disapproving of Senate Bill 198, amending the Australian ballot law, the Governor says:

"The people of the state are generally satisfied with the present arrangement of the Australian ballot. It is difficult for any party or faction to use money or corrupt means to influence voters for the reason that when a man registers to a booth to prepare his ballot, the names being alphabetically arranged, he is compelled to read each name and carefully consider the merits of individuals before depositing his ballot. Under the new law, corrupt means may be more easily used because the voter is not required to read the names of the candidates. The purpose of the Australian law is to safeguard elections and to come as near as possible to procuring unbiased, unprejudiced expression of the people. Anything that will assist in doing this is to be commended and whatever retards it is to be condemned. The proposed amendment, instead of assisting to purify the political atmosphere in Oregon, will have the contrary effect, and I therefore return the said bill with my veto."

House bill 204, providing for issuance of sale and redemption of bonds by counties of more than 50,000 population, the Governor says, applies only to Multnomah. In his veto message, he says:

"If it be conceded that issuing of bonds to cover the present indebtedness of Multnomah County would not be creation of new debt, still the total amount of warrants issued will exceed constitutional limitations and every warrant now outstanding of indebtedness intended to be bonded may be questioned as being in violation of this provision. If the validity of each of these warrants may be questioned, the bonds issued in lieu thereof may be questioned and entail much useless litigation."

"Second, the act provides that bonds exempt from taxation, and shall draw interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum. I do not think that such property ought to be exempt from taxation. If assessors do their duty, and if holders of warrants comply with the law, warrants of Multnomah County now outstanding are subject to taxation. If they are not taxed they ought to be, and with a tax rate in Multnomah County of more than 3 per cent. for all purposes, it would be more advantageous to the county to pay 5 per cent. interest on outstanding warrants than 4 per cent. on bonds to be issued under the provisions of the act."

"For the reasons mentioned, I return said bill herewith with my veto."

House Bill No. 198, a pure food law, was also disapproved. The Governor states that few complaints have been made against the old law, but a great complaint is being made against the new act.

"So stringent is it," he says, "that, in the hands of an unjust or arbitrary commissioner, it could be used to great detriment of many growing industries of the state."

In giving his reasons for disapproving the act, the Governor says:

"It is well to protect consumers against adulterated foods, but the law that we now have is amply sufficient for this purpose, and I can see no reason at present for the enactment of a law that meets every possible condition that may arise and at the same time places a handicap upon industries which are being rapidly developed throughout the state."

"The establishment of a laboratory is wholly unnecessary. This has been done by the Agricultural College, and ought to be done there in the future. If the dairy and food commissioner attends conventions in other states he ought to pay his own expenses or stay at home. If such a precedent be once established, any officer in the state, no matter what department he may be connected with, will seek at some time during his term to attend some convention each year and make the state pay his expenses therefor. But ought not to be to be established, and will not be with my consent."

SALEM, Feb. 25.—Gov. George E. Chamberlain was the busiest man in the capitol yesterday and today, as a large number of bills enacted by the late Legislature had to be examined and either approved, filed without approval or vetoed by him by 12 o'clock tomorrow night, unless he wished them to become laws without action on his part, and he has about disposed of the mountain of work left on his hands. At midnight tomorrow night the five-day limit within which he can act on the bills will have expired, and it is safe to say he will have disposed of all bills left in his hands.

Outside of the two veto messages filed with the Secretary of State yesterday afternoon, and which were published exclusively by The Journal, he approved or filed without his signature a large number of bills, and these will in due time become laws of the state, unless the referendum be invoked. TURKS BATTLE WITH BULGARIANS

CHARGED WITH MANY MURDERS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Feb. 25.—Albert Knapp of Hamilton, Ohio, was arrested here this morning at the home of his bride, to whom he was married but four days ago, on a charge of wholesale murder. He has had four wives, and of these the police believe he has murdered three. The last one disappeared in the latter part of last December, and since that time the police authorities have been working on clues to the crime.

Although his latest bride believed him to be an honorable man, the authorities say that a number of years ago he was given a ten-year sentence in the penitentiary for criminal assault, and was only freed after serving eight years of his term.

ROBBERS TOOK ALL HIS COIN

McMINNILLE, Feb. 25.—Two masked and mounted highwaymen held up William Scott, a music dealer of this city, late evening on the road near McMinnville. Mr. Scott was driving a double team and making good time, when he was suddenly halted by two men on horseback, who pointed revolvers at him and commanded him to turn over all the coin in his possession. This he did to the extent of \$15.

The robbers then told him to drive on. The highwaymen wore black masks and appeared to be otherwise disguised.

wherever he went. If he entered the lobby of the Imperial, where he is stopping, all present would rise and do him honor.

Fulton's Appreciation.
"They are too good to me," he said. "I appreciate it, but I have done nothing to deserve it. I shall never forget the cordial greeting that has been mine in Portland, to Astoria, and along the line wherever I have gone. I only regret that I must go to Washington tomorrow, and cannot stay and enjoy it longer."

At the same time he is the guest of the City of Portland and the people of the State of Oregon, whom he is to represent in the highest legislative office within their power to give. Senator Fulton is attempting to so arrange his business affairs as to leave everything in perfect order when he takes the train tomorrow morning on his way to the national capital. Although, doubtless, much hindered in this by the attention being showered upon him, Mr. Fulton never complains. He has a smile, a pleasant word, a warm clasp of the hand for everyone. In response to declarations of regard and expressions of confidence he says:

Will Do His Duty.
"I will do my part," he will say. As I see my duty to the nation and to the people of Oregon, that duty will be performed."

It has been hinted that Senator Fulton was once a follower of the free silver banner. This he denies.

"I never declared myself in favor of free silver," he said this morning. "I was once quoted in an interview that was very much overdrawn and made to say things that have been variously commented upon, but I do not care to discuss that now. I have shown by my work where I stand and I hope to make my work speak for me in future. It is work that really counts."

Being pressed for a direct reply Senator Fulton said he was well satisfied with the present monetary system of the country and would neither advocate nor lend his assistance to a change.

No Secretary Appointed.
When Senator Fulton leaves Portland tomorrow morning it will be alone. He takes no private secretary with him and the members of his family will not go to Washington until later. Speaking of this he said:

"I have not as yet had time to do anything. I have not decided upon a secretary. In fact, have not been urged to do so. I do not have the least idea upon whom I will decide. Washington is still a long way off, and I have never been United States Senator before."

From 8 until 10 o'clock this evening a reception that will be both congratulatory and farewell in character will be tendered Senator Fulton by the members of the Commercial Club in the commodious quarters of that organization on the top floor of the Chamber of Commerce Building. Members of the Illinois Club of Salem, the Irving Club of Astoria, and of the Chamber of Commerce, Board of Trade, Arlington Club, and the Manufacturers' Association of this city are invited as a whole, and many special invitations have been sent to prominent and influential business men and citizens of the entire state. The affair will be informal and, although it is probable Mr. Fulton will make a short address of appreciation, no set program will be carried out.

strike. I cannot say that a strike is probable."

Asked what were his reasons for visiting Portland at this time, Mr. Estes said:

To Make Business Tour.
"I am to start from here on a tour of the entire line of the Southern Pacific. From Portland to New Orleans I will make a canvass of the employees of the road, and will strengthen the membership of our order, which has already climbed well into the thousands. When I was here six weeks ago I announced that such were my plans. I am here now to carry them into effect."

The tour of the Southern Pacific is a part of my regular itinerary as mapped out for me by the councils of our organization, and is made wholly in the interests of the order and not to carry out special plans or any movement of that kind, to centralize railway labor."

The association of which Mr. Estes is chief has its headquarters in San Francisco, and claims many members in the Northwest States. It was organized two years ago at a meeting held in Ashland, Ore.

Astoria's Charter.
The Governor has many protests against approval of Astoria's charter and a delegation from that city is here looking into the bill and arguing against its approval. The main objection is that the bill cuts down terms of present officers, fixes the election at one year from next June, when all officers are to be filed. For some of the officers no definite terms are provided and officers chosen would have to be legislated out of office.

WOULD KILL THEIR KINGS

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—Police and steamship detectives are today investigating a story which, if true, reveals an Anarchistic plot involving peril to nearly all the crowned heads of Europe. It has been confessed by an Italian Anarchist that a great secret international convention is to be held in Paris on March 25. At this meeting all plans are to be made and lots drawn.

Five delegates are now in this city preparing to sail for Europe tomorrow where they represent America in this convention.

The Anarchist who gave away the secret is Rudolph, a well-known friend of Assassin Czaigols. Every effort is now being put forth for this man's apprehension.

Rudolph was arrested this afternoon. He was sullen and denied any connection with the Reds. Officers learn he gave away all his personal property to different friends when he left the boarding house. He said repeatedly there would be big things done in a short time.
