

SCOTT WAS ON COALS

intoxicating perfume wafted from the bouquets tossed toward him by himself. At different times during the entire address Brownell referred to Harvey W. Scott, both directly and indirectly, and only once omitted anything like a caress in his tone. This was when he discussed the senatorial race and his attitude toward Fulton.

His Opinion of Scott.
"I have the highest regard for Harvey W. Scott's intellectual attainments and for his abilities as a writer," the speaker said, "and I should have been delighted to support him had I not owed a duty to Charles W. Fulton. I am also a close friend of Jonathan Bourne and consider him the peer of any man in Oregon. But my regard for Scott's abilities did not keep me from remaining true to Fulton, nor would the attitude of the Portland papers, which have always been hostile to me, have prevented my supporting Scott under conditions."

Brownell told about the telegram which was sent him by Scott, soliciting support for the latter in the attempt to gratify his ambition to become United States Senator. This telegram was not published in The Journal and proved Scott to have sought the office after he had made denial of such desire through the columns of the morning edition of his newspaper trust.

That Awful Telegram.
"Everybody should know that I would not be such a consummate fool as to show that telegram," said Brownell. "Everybody with the least atom of brains ought to know that I would reason out that such a display would be like a red flag to a Spanish bull. But Scott seems to think that I did show it. It seems to believe that I had little common sense to betray his confidence when by so doing I would have been making a powerful personal enemy. I want to say right here and now that I never gave out that telegram to the Portland Journal and that I never showed it, so far as I know, to a living soul."

Just at this stage of the game Mr. Brownell happened to remember that he was letting the mask drop a little too far and reveal some things which have heretofore remained unseen. So he changed about some and said:
"And you, I do not admit having received that telegram. I have never said I did receive it. But if I did receive it I did not show it around and did not give it to a newspaper for publication. I would consider myself a low, dirty sneak had I thus betrayed the confidence of the meanest man in Oregon, either black or white."

At another stage Mr. Brownell referred to the Scott newspaper combine as follows:
Mistreated by the Press.
"I have never received commendation by any paper in Portland. I have never given my aid to graft. That is the reason. I challenge any Portland editor—be he large or small—to come out and show where I have committed a really wrongful act. I have made mistakes. So have the editors.
"When I made up the Senate committee, which was my right as President of that body at the recent session, I gave a generous allowance to Multnomah County and to Portland, but not a Portland paper has said a word about George Brownell unless it was to insinuate that he ought to be in the penitentiary, or dropped over Williamette Falls in a barrel and have his neck broke."

Where Scott Smoked.
Having thus worked himself up to the proper pitch, Brownell launched forth into a tirade against Scott, saying:
"I gave my assistance to Harvey W. Scott and his faction in their battle to place Jack Matthews in the seat of power as dictator of the state. And now their papers are sent from Benton County to burn me, there are men here tonight for that purpose."
Senator Marks confined his remarks to a straight statement of fact, substantiated the assertions of Brownell regarding the impossibility of securing legislation in the late session and the labors of Brownell, and was generously applauded.

GETS A PARDON FROM GOVERNOR

Geer commuted the young man's sentence, and yesterday's pardon by the governor was for the purpose of restoring him to citizenship. The action was had upon a numerous signed petition sent in by the best citizens of Benton County.

CHILD MOTHER IS RELEASED

SEATTLE, March 6.—Nellie Underwood, the child-wife who is soon to be tried for drowning her 10-weeks-old baby, was yesterday released from jail on bail furnished by relatives.

She has been confined in the city jail now for more than eight months. Her husband, Paul Underwood, was charged jointly with her. He has been tried and sentenced to the penitentiary for 15 years. He is still in the county jail awaiting an appeal.

A short time after the crime was committed in Ballard, Paul Underwood escaped from the officers. The hunt for him through the woods of three counties was second only to the great man hunt for Convict Harry Tracy. When Nellie Underwood left the jail she was allowed to see her husband. The meeting between them was affecting. She wept bitterly and asked her husband if he thought they would hang here. Underwood made no reply.

MAYOR HUME BEFORE JURY

SEATTLE, March 6.—Mayor Thomas Hume was a witness before the grand jury nearly all of yesterday afternoon. Mayor Hume refused absolutely to discuss anything that was asked him but it is known that the jury went fully into the municipal corruption story. Chief Seltman has claimed that the policy toward gambling and the general open policy of the city was dictated by the Mayor and that he simply followed it out.

NON-UNION MEN ASK FOR ARMS

SEATTLE, March 6.—In the last few days several clashes have occurred between union and non-union electric line workers. The union men have been endeavoring to persuade the non-union men from working while the strike is pending.

Despite the fact that the union men have been orderly, an officer of the Seattle Electric Company asked Chief of Police Sullivan to give his men, the non-union employees, the right to carry pistols. Sullivan said he had no power to do so. The men took the power upon themselves. Yesterday several of them were arrested. Their trials have been postponed awaiting the securing of evidence to show that they were warranted in carrying the pistols.

Deputy District Attorney Arthur C. Spencer stated this morning that De Falso will be arraigned on a charge of murder in the first degree early next week, possibly Monday. It now develops that De Falso's alleged insanity was not a matter for the County Court to determine. That is a question for the jury which will try the murderer. The County Court is without jurisdiction.

THE PARKS TO BE MADE GAY

Board Grants Money for Music and Roses.

The Park Board passed on several important matters at its meeting this morning. The March estimate for parks is \$94,171, but to the amount of \$18,833 were allowed. The board wishes to receive a formal statement in regard to the Second Oregon Regiment monument to be erected in the South Plaza block. They wish to know the amount of ground needed, and also desire to see the plans of the monument.

Much time was spent in discussing music in the parks during the summer. It is thought that if the city will appropriate \$10,000 for this amusement, \$3,000 may be raised by private subscription. There will be concerts on the evenings of each week for ten weeks. Band stands may be erected in the City Park, Holladay, Jefferson street plaza, Salmon street plaza and the North End. The board will give the needed thousand. The city will expend \$500 for the services of an expert landscape architect.

Governor's Park, on Robinson's Hill, is to be enclosed by a board fence, said fence to cost about \$350.

Parkkeeper Lowitz was present, and asked that he be allowed 13 clerical and 1,000 rose bushes, to be planted in the City Park. Mr. Lowitz had remembered the verse, "Ask largely, that ye may receive." His request was granted.

KIDNAPPED GIRL BROUGHT BACK

Special Officer Hawley of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society arrived in the city this morning from Ashland, having in charge See Ah Deung, the alleged kidnaper of little Ling Ti, daughter of Dr. Wing Lee. He also brought a girl. Both are held at the city jail, awaiting developments.

Ling Ti, the girl, stated this morning, when seen, that she did not want to go back to her father. She said that he had been in the habit of whipping her unmercifully, and that she could not bear to remain with him longer. None of the officers believe this story, as the father is known to fairly worship his girl. It is also said to be a fact that the girl is a petty thief, and is known to be wild and hard to handle.

It is probable that a charge of kidnapping will be placed against See Ah Deung late today.

Fireboat Ordinance Signed

The fireboat will be ready to save lives and property within a few months. Mayor Williams yesterday signed the ordinance authorizing the building of the craft. It is to be built of wood, will cost about \$60,000, and is to be up-to-date in equipment.

ROADS OF CLACKAMAS
Judge Ryan made good his word concerning the road apportionment of the county by giving to each district only \$100 as their share of the \$40,000 which could have been used for the improvement of Clackamas County roads. Instead of applying it in the usual way the Judge, with the consent of Commissioner Probst, will apply a little of \$30,000 to the road bed, which will wipe that bad debt from the county. However, if in the eyes of any road supervisor, any section of the roads under his care should become impassable at any time, he will be given enough money to make temporary repairs. Besides this \$100 to each district a poll tax of \$1 per man can be collected and used for the improvement of the roads.

DEATH OF W. C. KERN.
W. C. Kern, ex-county treasurer of Umatilla County, died at his home at Helix, that county, Wednesday night of kidney trouble, aged 77 years. Mr. Kern died February 1. Both Mr. and Mrs. Kern were well known throughout the state. His funeral occurred today at Helix, under the direction of the Odd Fellows.

Evening Paper FAKE EXPOSED.
Sensational Murder Yarn Branded as Absolutely Untrue.

W. H. Cummings, proprietor of the Idaho Lodging House, on Hood street, in South Portland, brands as a sensational fake, manufactured almost entirely from whole cloth, the murder story published last night in a local evening paper and today in a local morning paper. The story as published stated that F. J. Schofield, who had roomed at the house, had not been in his room for several days, and that he had been murdered by a stranger who enticed him away to rob him. Another statement published was that Schofield had lots of money, and property in Portland valued at \$15,000. Every one of these statements, with the exception that Schofield is missing, are branded as absolutely false and without foundation in fact.

The sensational yarn also receives a severe jolt from the Police Department. It was stated in the article that the matter had been reported to the police, and that Chief of Detectives Simmons was working on the theory that Schofield was murdered. This allegation is denied by Chief of Police Hunt and Chief of Detectives Simmons, both of whom state that the matter has never been called to the attention of the department in any manner.

The probable reason for the disappearance of Mr. Schofield was some trouble he had with a man at the Idaho House. He is said to have been drunk recently, and to have abused a lodger. He was asked to leave the house, and has undoubtedly done so. His wife and family live in Astoria, and he is believed to have gone there.
