From the present outlook the crowd will be a record-breaker, as every sport in the Northwest is anxious to see the fray. It will be a great treat and no one will be disappointed.

## BASEBALL MEN HOLD MEETING

### Annual Gathering of American League Officials at Gotham.

NEW YORK, March 6.—The American Baseball League held its first annual meeting in New York yesterday, with President Johnson in the chair. There also were present: R. L. Hedges of St. Louis, J. L. Kilfoyle of St. Louis, C. A. Comiskey of Chicago, S. F. Angus of Detroit, F. C. Foster of Washington, B. F. Shibe of Philadelphia and Joseph Gavin of Boston.

The playing schedule was adopted. The season opens on April 20, with Philadelphia at Boston. The teams are scheduled for two games, it being Lexington Day. The Eastern teams go West first and open on May 11, as follows: Philadelphia at Chicago, Washington at St. Louis, New York at Detroit and Boston at Cleveland.

The Western teams first appear in the East on June 4, with Cleveland in New York, Chicago at Boston, St. Louis at Washington and Detroit at Philadelphia. The Western teams close the season in the East on September 25, with Detroit in New York, Chicago in Washington, St. Louis at Boston and Cleveland at Philadelphia. Like the National League schedule, the season consists of 140 games.

## ARTICLES SIGNED FOR BIG MATCH

### Corbett and Jeffries Are Slated for a Go.

### They Will Box Twenty Rounds to a Decision and the Heavyweight Championship of World.

BALTIMORE, March 6.—Billy Delaney, representing James J. Jeffries, and James J. Corbett signed articles here last night to fight 20 rounds to a decision for the heavyweight championship of the world. The fight is to take place in California, the purse being \$25,000, of which the winner takes 75 and the loser 25 per cent. The bids and a check for \$5,000 were forwarded to Harry Corbett at San Francisco.

There was considerable wrangling over the kind of gloves and bandages that were to be used, they finally agreeing that both should use the regulation type as bandages.

Now that the two great boxers are matched, the public may hold its breath until the battle is over. Sporting men the country over are anxious to see Corbett and Jeffries come together once more. No two fighters today are worse enemies. Jeffries detests the very mention of Corbett's name, and "Pompadour" Jim threatens to pound the champion's head into jelly when they meet.

The contest is scheduled for San Francisco, and although the metropolis of the Golden West has fostered many fake fights in the past, the chances for this fight being on the square are very good.

San Francisco is Corbett's native place, but he has been living in the East since he defeated John L. Sullivan at New Orleans in 1892. California is justly proud of Corbett and will give him a royal welcome when he returns to his home to prepare for his next great battle.

Jeffries, whose home is in Los Angeles, was also a favorite in California, but dropped considerably in public estimation when he fought Fitzsimmons in San Francisco on July 25, of 1902. The great howl that was raised over the question that it was a fake seriously injured the champion's prestige. Everybody who saw the fight was of the opinion that this was carried out honestly, but certain happenings during the fight and the partnership of both after the go, made many think seriously regarding the charge brought against them.

What Jeffries Says.  
In speaking of the coming fight between Jeffries and Corbett, Jimmy Britt says:

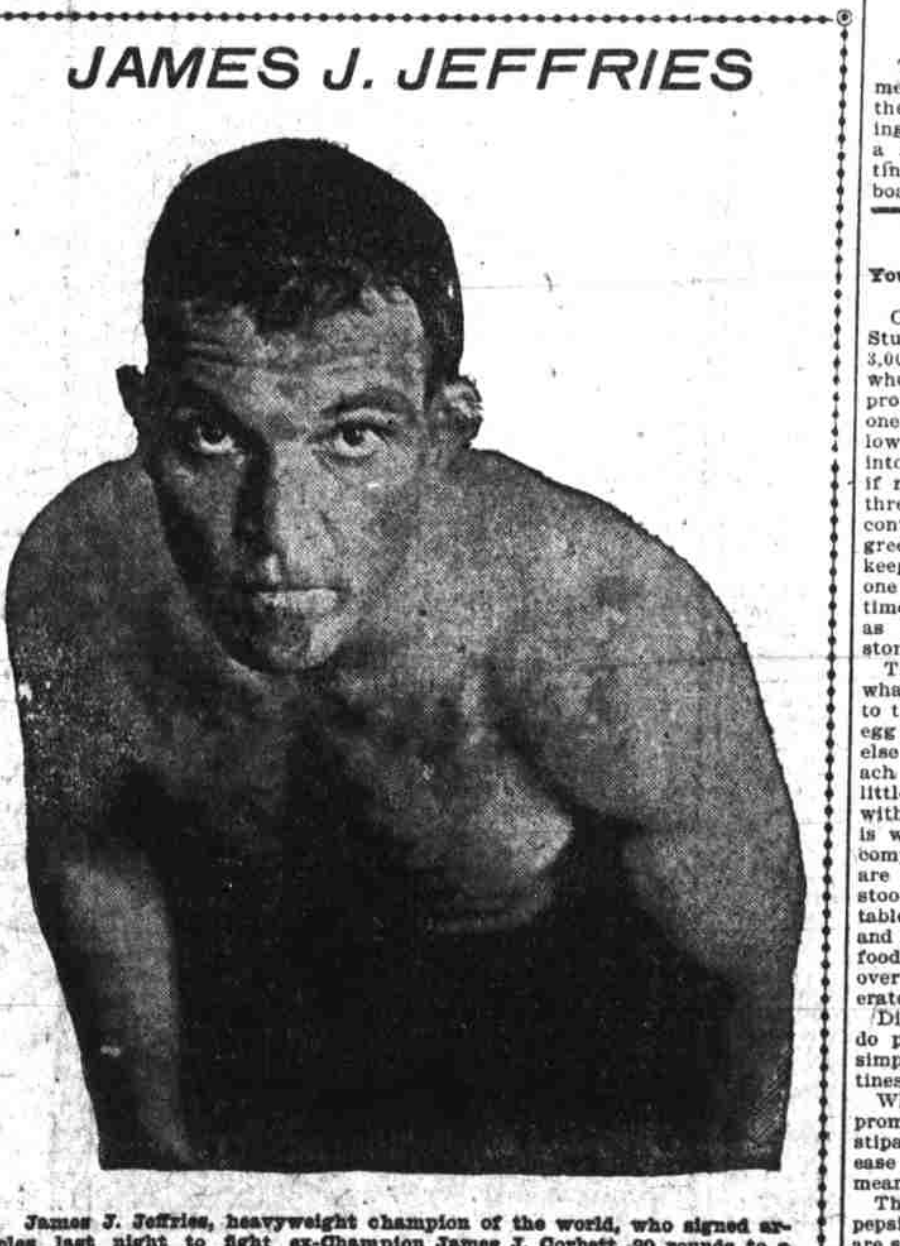

## WILL ERECT A LABOR BUILDING

### Carpenters Buy Valuable Lot for That Purpose.

The Carpenters' Union has become weary of paying high rent, and has concluded to erect a building of its own. Yesterday a committee representing the union purchased a lot, 50x100 feet, on which it is the intention to build an imposing structure at the earliest possible date. It is situated at No. 88 Tenth street, in the heart of the business district, and cost \$6,000. It has not been yet definitely decided just how large the building will be, but leading members of the union labor organizations. They will answer the purpose for weekly meetings, as well as providing offices for the various business agents.

The central location will add greatly to the value of the building. In its immediate vicinity the Foresters and Woodmen of the World have purchased sites on which to build similar structures. The temporary postoffice will be near there, and the union believes that the committee could not have made a wiser selection.

## NO SETTLEMENT YET

The journeymen and master painters have not yet arrived at an agreement. It was generally supposed that they would do so last evening, but the conference committee reported that nothing tangible had been accomplished. Another conference between the employees and contractors has been arranged for Tuesday night, when it is hoped by those interested that something definite will result. One of the painters this morning said:

"It is my opinion that this matter will not be settled until April 6, the date that the new wage scale is asked to go into effect, notwithstanding all talk to the contrary. If the contractors are then in need of men they will give them \$3.00. If they don't need men they won't employ them at any figure, and that is all there is to it."

## MONEY FOR STRIKERS.

The local division of the United Brotherhood of Railway Employees forwarded \$400 this morning to the strikers on the C. P. R. at Vancouver, B. C. Members of the organization say that other contributions will follow until the trouble is settled. The various divisions all along the Pacific Coast, the local men say will give their Canadian friends all the financial assistance they need.

## THE LONGSHOREMEN.

## MOHLER DENIES SPOKANE STORY

### No Agreement Entered With Canadian Road.

### He Brands as False Assertions That British Columbia Wheat Would Come Here.

President A. L. Mohler of the O. R. & N. this morning flatly and emphatically denied the story that his line had entered into an agreement with the Canadian Pacific, whereby the latter was to be permitted to use Great Northern tracks into Spokane and thus gain access to Eastern Washington, those who build railroads on paper and then endeavor to convince the general public that these "hot air lines" are a reality at once set to work upon a new theory. Mr. Hill had been found in New York City and had denied their first "rumor," so they took the O. R. & N. into the deal.

Made Strong Talk.  
It was announced that the Canadian Pacific would soon construct a line from the British side of the line into Spokane and that an agreement had been entered into between the Canadian road and the O. R. & N. which would permit the former to ship its grain from the Canadian Northwest into Portland over the tracks of the latter. "Track privileges have been secured" was the allegation and it was claimed that some one high in authority in the Harriman syndicate of railroads, of which the O. R. & N. forms a part, had given out the story.

Spokane is Agitated.  
It was further stated that negotiations were at the present time under way in Spokane for a depot site and right of way to lay tracks to that site. The Spokane Press contains the following: "The men interested in this plan are waiting the return of D. C. Corbin from Olympia," said a city official. "As soon as Mr. Corbin returns active steps are to be taken in completing the arrangement. Mr. Corbin will be in town only a few days, and will then go to New York and Washington in the interest of the project, he being the prime mover in the arrangements that are being made."

To a reporter for The Journal this morning President A. L. Mohler, at the head of the O. R. & N. flatly denied the entire story and characterized it as false. "There is absolutely no truth in it," President Mohler said. "There is nothing to it at all." He laughed as he read the Spokane paper's account of the alleged agreement. "Not a word of truth in it," he declared.
