

IMPROVEMENT OF MANY ROADWAYS

East Side Push Clubs Cause Agitation.

Central Albina Board Wants Vancouver Avenue Widened-- Sellwood Needs Streets.

East Side residents are clamoring for the improvement of many streets in their section of the city. Many petitions are going the rounds and it is not unlikely that before the winter again sets in the East Side will have a number of the thoroughfares which can be driven over during any period of the year without danger of being mudbound or choked with dust.

The Albina Improvement Association is agitating the improvement of several streets in Lower Albina. A continuous thoroughfare is also wanted from Union avenue to the landing of the Albina ferry.

In the northern portion of the city the Sellwood board has successfully terminated the agitation for the improvement of Umatilla avenue. The improvement has already been advertised and a bid for the work will soon be called for.

The last meeting of the Sellwood organization for the matter of widening Millwaukee street and road from the southern boundary of Sellwood down to the street's Northern terminal, was agitated. The Millwaukee street and road are the principal outlet for travel between Clackamas and Multnomah counties and its surface is too narrow to stand the traffic.

Grand Avenue the Worst. Grand avenue in Central East Portland is perhaps in greater need of improvement than any other of the city's thoroughfares. From East Clay to Belmont street the wooden pavement has disappeared in a great many places and it is trifling with fate and a broken axle for a teamster to drive that way.

The elevated roadways on the East Side are among the worst in the city. Many of the streets have been patched so much that they are completely worn out and nails will not hold in their surface. On a number of the roadways the repair gang of the Engineer's Department has piled up so much slabwork over the worn places that the street resembles the famous rocky road to Dublin.

There was considerable discussion over the wretched condition of Millwaukee street and avenue. The thoroughfares during the winter is a sea of mud and traffic is very slow. During the summer months the road has about half a foot of dust on its surface and travel is disagreeable.
