

WILL ASK THE PRESIDENT TO PROLONG STAY

Mayor Appoints Committee to Entertain City's Guest.

Will Be Asked to Break Ground for the 1905 Fair.

May Also Lay Corner Stone for Lewis and Clark Memorial

It has been decided to endeavor to memorialize the President and endeavor to have him protract his stay in Portland to two days instead of one. The President will also be invited to break ground for the Exposition buildings, and to lay the corner stone of the Lewis and Clark Memorial at City Park.

Mayor Williams, at the Council meeting this afternoon, appointed the following committee which will represent Portland and make such arrangements as will best entertain the President of the United States on his visit to this city, May 21:

This committee will work in conjunction with the ceremonies committee of the Lewis and Clark Fair, and will so arrange matters that a reception may be given President Roosevelt which will be in keeping with the dignity of the occasion.

It is announced that, in all likelihood, the two committees will meet together this evening and lay preliminary plans for the reception.

The ceremonies and music committee of the fair, which will co-operate with the committee appointed by the Mayor, is composed of the following persons: W. B. Wheeler, J. M. Church, W. D. Fenlon, A. L. Mills and Paul Wessinger.

This committee will request the President to lay the corner stone of the Lewis and Clark Memorial to be erected in the City Park and to break ground on the fair grounds. The committee met this morning and decided to confer with the committee appointed by the Mayor.

M. F. Webster came down from Spokane this morning and is at the Park.

The trestle will be built over the lowlands north of Sellwood, and will connect with the main portion of the road at the foot of Spokane avenue. The new trestle will be the largest in this vicinity.

SUING FOR THE DEATH OF SON

Mrs. Elizabeth Schleiger Asks N. P. Co. \$5,000 Damages.

Elizabeth Schleiger is suing the Northern Pacific Company to recover \$5,000 damages for the death of her 11-year-old son Frederick, who was killed August 14, 1902, by being run over by a Northern Pacific Company train at the Lower Albina railroad crossing and Front street. C. F. Ford and John F. Logan are appearing for the plaintiff and Simon & Geard for the defendants.

It is alleged in the complaint that Frederick Schleiger had been sent by his mother to Lower Albina the morning of the accident for the purpose of delivering a hand satchel. In returning, in company of another boy of his own age, he failed to see a train of eight cars approach the Front street crossing. The train was being backed up, and the Schleiger boy was struck and thrown under the wheels and mangled to death. The plaintiff alleges that there was no flagman or other employee of the company so stationed as to give proper warning. The railroad company in answer states that a brakeman was on duty on the first car as it approached the crossing and gave warning which the boys failed to heed.

Mrs. Schleiger, it is alleged, secured a divorce from her husband about two years ago on grounds of desertion. Several months ago the father of the boy sued on a similar complaint as administrator of the estate of his son.

PORT OF PORTLAND IS MISQUOTED

Neither for Nor Against Victoria Dock.

No Views Expressed—Simply Looking For the Best Site.

The Port of Portland Commission visited the recently destroyed Victoria dock yesterday afternoon for the purpose of ascertaining what qualities it possesses as a site for a new drydock. It was demonstrated that an average width of 250 feet was obtained, and that the structure can be kept within the harbor line. The drydock being constructed over at Vancouver is 115 feet in width, which proves that ample room is certain. The Victoria dock site is 350 feet in length and the drydock 464 feet, which will leave room upon community property for the establishment of spar-houses, machine shops and other buildings, which would pay rent to the commission.

Notwithstanding the impression given by a morning paper that the Port of Portland Commissioners are unfavorably disposed toward the Victoria dock as a drydock site, the majority of its members state that they have been misquoted. They state that as yet they have come to no conclusion, and one and all are emphatic in saying that they will work for the selection of the best site offered for consideration.

As matters stand today, the commission is not unfavorable to the Victoria dock property as exhibited yesterday, and will consider the purchasing of it along with any other suitable site offered.

There was not a word of unfavorable comment made regarding the proposed Victoria dock site for the new drydock during our tour of investigation yesterday, said Colonel John McCracken, a member of the Port of Portland Commission, this morning. "We visited the site for the purpose of determining its value, and so far as I could judge from the temper of the members present no unkind feeling was in evidence toward the proposition. No general discussion was held by the commissioners for that will come up at the special meeting of the commission Friday, when the selection of a site will be accomplished. The Oregon made a mistake when it said this morning that the site averaged only 225 feet in width, and the ground was too hard for practical excavation. As I understand the situation, the ground is not too hard and the average width is about 250 feet. Neither do I know anything about the thousands tons of rock alleged to have been thrown under the Victoria wharf, and I guess no others of the commission know any more on this subject. News items should be correctly stated in any paper," continued Colonel McCracken.

Trucker Said Nothing.

A. Tucker, a member of the commission, and who was with the inspecting

party yesterday, said this morning that there was no discussion relative to the merits of the Victoria dock site that he heard, and if the site possessed unfavorable qualities they were not brought out. "I, for one, did not express myself and never heard a word about rock ballast having been thrown under the wharf, as is stated in a morning paper. The article which appeared is all wrong. So far as I am concerned, I will not discuss the points for or against the Victoria site until the special meeting called for Friday."

Selling Only Smiles.

Ben Selling said he was surprised to find the Port of Portland Commission misquoted so deliberately by a morning paper, but as the article was ludicrous it made little difference. "I do not care to discuss the Victoria site," continued Mr. Selling, "for I am pledged to the selection of any site which will be the best for the maintenance of the new drydock. However, I will say that yesterday there was nothing mentioned about hardness of ground, difficulty of excavation, tons of rock ballast under the Victoria wharf and other misstatements, calculated for obvious reasons, to discourage the purchase of the Victoria site, but I guess the taxpayers know the whys and wherefores of such articles as appeared this morning. I am sure that no ballast is under the wharf and I guess other members of the commission are equally sure."

I never heard any discussion of the qualities presented by the Victoria wharf property as a site for the new drydock during our visit to the location yesterday afternoon," said C. F. Adams, a member of the commission, this afternoon. "Engineer Lockwood is making tests and his report will be ready at the meeting Friday. Misleading articles told nobody."

fore the Democratic State Committee, as follows:

Shall there be a convention, or shall the committee make nomination direct?

A convention was decided upon, then the time and place?

How shall the delegates be selected?

What representation from the counties and how based?

It was realized that the time intervening between the committee meeting and the date upon which it was necessary that the nomination be made was very short, and that everything must be done in the most expeditious manner possible. "We cannot take our time; we must handle this thing," said Chairman White, and his opinion received an echo in the lobby of the Hotel Imperial.

With this object in view, much of the business of the formal meeting was in reality determined upon before the session began. The members discussed at length, in the lobby of the Hotel Imperial, the quickest way to choose delegates and at the same time enable the Democracy of Oregon to be fully represented. It was practically decided that each county committee would be asked to select the delegates except in such sections as this method met opposition. In the latter event primaries would be held.

Another point that was given much attention outside the meeting was the manner and method of conducting the congressional campaign. Several plans were discussed, but the one most favorable was that a special committee be selected to transact this political business, entirely separate and apart from the regular state committee.

It was at first intended to call today's meeting at 11 o'clock, but failure of committee men to arrive in time necessitated delay until 1:30 p. m.
