

G. A. R. MEETING AT OREGON CITY

County Central Committee Fixes Date.

City Council Transacts Important Business and Discusses Many Questions.

OREGON CITY, March 19.—In response to a call lately issued by Chairman J. V. Campbell, the Republican County Central Committee met yesterday and named March 26 as the date for the primaries and April 4 as the date for the convention to be held in Villamette Hall, Oregon City. Under the new apportionment, 152 delegates will have a right to vote. There will be one delegate at large for every precinct, one delegate for every 25 votes in a precinct and another delegate for a fraction of 25 votes, provided it be over 12 votes. The time is short between now and the primaries, but it must be in order that the delegates to the state convention, to be held at Eugene, may be elected. The meeting was addressed by George G. Brownell.

Council Meeting.
At the special meeting of the Council held Tuesday evening the ordinance creating the Third Ward District was passed and the letting of the work by contract was considered. The new system will take in much of the hill, especially that portion lying north of Seventh street and going as far in that direction as Thirteenth street. When it is finished next summer the city will have little further use for cisterns, as most of the town will have been connected with the sewer system. Those persons living on the streets affected by this new system will be allowed a "free" time in which to make connections. If it is not done at that time the work will be done by the city and the bill charged to the property. The report of the City Surveyor on the grade of the new road leading out of the southern part of Main street was read and referred back to the committee having the matter in charge, that they might confer with the citizens' committee and the S. P. R. R. Co. concerning the manner in which the road will cross the latter's tracks. A report establishing the grade on Jackson street, between Seventh and Fifth streets, was adopted. This portion of that street is soon to be improved.

As stated several weeks ago, United States Senator J. P. Dilliver, from Iowa, will be one of the principal drawing cards at the next session of the Villamette Valley Chautauque Association. He will speak on "Public Virtue as a Question of Politics," this speech to be followed by another yet to be selected from the following: "The Working Man of Nazareth," "A Poor Man's Country and a Poor Boy's Country," and "The Nation of America." Instead of impersonators, magicians will be tried at the next session. Karl Germaine, who is highly recommended, has been secured. As usual, as each session approaches, efforts are made to make it the strongest of them all. This year will be no exception, and Secretary Cross is conferring with several other persons with the view of securing their services, who are equally as prominent as Senator Dilliver.

MARRIAGE HAS NO TERRORS FOR HER

Daughter of Murdered Millionaire Wedded Five Times.

CHICAGO, March 19.—Grace Snell, the much-married daughter of the murdered millionaire, Amos Snell, made her fifth trip to the altar at the residence of Mrs. J. A. Snell, 1000 Riverside, when she became Mrs. Perkins Layman, greatly to the surprise of her Chicago friends.

She has been three times married and three times divorced. Her first husband, Frank Coffin, once married and once divorced from James C. Walker. She first married Coffin in 1885, and they lived together nine years. In 1893 she obtained a divorce for incompatibility.

She then married James C. Walker, a clerk in the Virginia Hotel. In two years she obtained a divorce for cruelty. She remarried Coffin, but in a few months obtained a divorce for intoxication. In 1901, on the death of her son, there was another reconciliation and a marriage.

Mrs. Coffin went directly to the Metropolitan Hotel, Coffin remained in the city to receive instruction in religious duties, for one of the conditions of the marriage imposed by Mrs. Coffin was that he had to become a member of the Episcopal Church.

In the meantime a woman called on Mrs. Coffin at the Metropolitan, and what took place has been veiled in secrecy. Mrs. Coffin left a note in the office for her husband that she would not see him.

She left within three hours for her summer home in Wisconsin, and the next day filed suit for divorce in Kenosha. Non-support was the charge, and Coffin did not make a contest.

Since that time Mrs. Coffin has been traveling and devoting herself to literary work. She is said to have inherited much valuable property from the recent division of the estates of her father and her mother.

The Snell murder mystery has never been solved.

HIS ITINERARY IS ANNOUNCED

O. R. & N. Gives President's Dates.

Where He Will Go on His Visit Through Eastern Washington.

President Mohler has extended the courtesy of the O. R. & N. R. R. to President Roosevelt and party, the generous offer has been accepted and this morning, through the general offices of that company, was given out the following announcement of the Presidential itinerary along their lines:

The train will be received by the O. R. & N. at Wallula at 2:50 o'clock on the afternoon of May 25 and will be taken direct from that point to Walla Walla, where the Presidential party will arrive at 4:30 in the afternoon of the same day.

At 5:30 o'clock the same evening the train will leave Walla Walla and will make a night run through the Palouse country, arriving in Spokane at 1:15 in the morning of Tuesday, May 26.

The stay at Spokane will be until noon of the 26th. From the Falls City the Presidential train will double back along its route to the north, reaching the Northern Pacific at 8:50 o'clock on the evening of May 26, the first stop of importance being Helena.

Itinerary May Change.
The above itinerary is not definitely and permanently fixed and may be slightly altered at any time. Pendleton, the largest city in Eastern Oregon, is endeavoring to obtain recognition from the President and should those efforts prove successful the time of arrival at and departure from Walla Walla must be slightly revised.

O. R. & N. officials have also been unofficially informed that President Roosevelt has accepted an invitation to dine in Walla Walla at the home of the States Senator Levi Ankeny, and if this is a fact the stay in Walla Walla must be prolonged.

No material difference would be made to Spokane in either case, the train is scheduled to arrive there during the night and must remain until noon of the day following.

The Presidential Train.
The palatial train in which President Roosevelt and those who are to accompany him will travel through the West is to consist of five cars, steam heated and lighted by electricity. It will consist of a Pullman composite car, a dining car, a sleeper, a compartment car and the private car for the exclusive use of President Roosevelt and the members of his family. The same cars will be used throughout the journey, being simply delivered to the O. R. & N. and turned over by it to the Northern Pacific after the journey through Eastern Oregon and Washington has been completed.

The finest locomotive in the employ of the O. R. & N. will be detailed to pull the Presidential train, and a "pilot engine" or "pacer" will be sent over the line in advance of the Presidential party to guard against accidents and to make certain that the road is clear.

Many Special Trains.
"The O. R. & N. has not as yet made arrangements regarding special trains into Portland or to other points along its line where the Presidential train is to make a stop," said General Passenger Agent A. J. Clark, "but we desire to give every facility at the disposal of residents along our lines. It is as yet too early to make arrangement of special trains, but they will be run wherever necessary as to N. who desire of the O. R. & N. to give everyone opportunity of seeing President Roosevelt. There is no doubt that many thousands of people will come into Portland to see him and to join in the general jubilation accompanying his reception."

"Has the O. R. & N. anything to offer in the way of Presidential entertainment?" was asked.

"The O. R. & N. has never been backward in assisting in matters of public improvement or general import," said Mr. Clark, "but it is far too early to make announcement of anything of this kind. The people of Portland have not yet outlined their plans and we could not be expected to take the initiative." It has been suggested that President Roosevelt be taken by the Columbia River route to view the splendid scenery offered through a river trip. When this was mentioned to General Passenger Agent Clark he said:

"If we could be pleased to accept President Roosevelt and party for a trip up the river, this, however, is an incidental matter and Mr. Roosevelt will in all probability be greatly pressed for time."

Other Arrangements.
The commercial organizations of this city are bestirring themselves regarding the plans for the entertainment of President Roosevelt on his visit to this city May 21. The Chamber of Commerce and Manufacturers' Association have already appointed committees to co-operate with the committee appointed by the Mayor and the ceremonies and music committee of the Lewis and Clark Fair, and the Board of Trade will appoint its committee next Saturday when its executive committee will meet.

APPOINTMENTS BOARD OF AGRICULTURE

Governor Names Men to Serve Four Years.

Convict Watts Pardoned On Recommendation of Prison Physician.

SALEM, March 19.—Governor George E. Chamberlain today appointed Hon. W. H. Wehrung of Hillsboro and Hon. Jasper Wilkins of Coburg members of the State Board of Agriculture to succeed themselves, for terms of four years each from March 14, 1903. Both appointees have been members of the board since the reorganization four years ago, and Senator Wehrung has been president of the board all of that time. Mr. Wehrung is a Democrat and Mr. Wilkins a Republican.

When the present board, headed by Senator Wehrung, assumed the management of the State Fair at Salem, the institution was, to a certain extent, in disrepair, and had for several years maintained a struggle for existence, but under the careful management of Mr. Wehrung and his associates the State fair was completely placed on its feet. For a number of years the fair was looked upon as a Marion and Polk County fair, and other portions of the State were scarcely represented in the exhibits, nor was the attendance from the State generally very heavy, while race-horse men threatened to avoid the fair grounds, as purses were not always promptly paid. But under the new regime all this has been changed; all portions of the State are annually represented in the exhibits, and even other states send their finest cattle and other animals here for the big stock show; the attendance is increased from all parts and horsemen come from far and wide to enter their runners and harness horses in the events on Lone Oak track. All this is due to the successful and business-like management of the new State Board of Agriculture, headed by President Wehrung. The board consists of the following members:

Watts Pardoned.
SALEM, March 19.—Governor Chamberlain today granted a pardon to A. A. Watts, serving an 18-months term at the Penitentiary for obtaining money under false pretenses. The pardon was granted on the recommendation of the prison physician, who stated that further confinement of the prisoner would result in his being transferred to the Insane Asylum. The prisoner has nearly served his term, and there is nothing further to be gained by keeping him in the penitentiary, while his pardon may be the saving of his reason and life.

Asks Clemency.
SALEM, March 19.—Governor Chamberlain has received a petition from Portland for the pardon of Robert Richardson, serving a two years' term from Multnomah County, having been convicted of burglary. Richardson was received at the prison on January 10, 1902.

SAYS FAILED TO GET SALARY
C. A. Snell is suing the Knight Shoe Company today for \$418.65, alleging that this amount is due him for wages. The company states that Snell was engaged by the Knight Shoe Company as a clerk and window-dresser, and that a contract was given by the firm for one year, beginning February 1, 1902. It is alleged that the contract made Snell's salary \$70 per month, but should be kept his part of the contract and continue in the employ of the firm one year, \$30 per month would be given for each month which Snell had worked. It is alleged that Snell worked one year and was not paid the \$30 per month as per contract. He refused part payment for the last month of his service, and now claims that, in addition to \$360 plus the interest, making a total of \$418.25.

SLOWLY DYING IN A PALACE

Archduchess Carlotta Said to Be Hopelessly Insane.

BRUSSELS, March 18.—A phantom empress is fast journeying to the kingdom of death. Archduchess Carlotta, widow of the ill-fated Maximilian, Emperor of Mexico, who for 27 years has been hopelessly insane, is dying at Palace Laeken near Brussels.

Since that June morning, all those years ago when the shot rang out from seven Mexican muskets that were heard all around the civilized world, and which cost a man's life, a woman's reason and an empire's existence, this beautiful daughter of the Belgians has mired among the empty shadows of a madhouse. Faithful even in her pitiful distraction to the love which has been the ruling passion of her life, she is looking constantly for the Emperor who never comes.

"I cannot find him," she will say, with vague trouble in her eyes, to those about her, "but he will see you when he returns."

A bride of 17, an Empress at 24, a madman at 26, Charlotte represents in her own person the tragedy of the chimerical empire, reared by French and Austrian ambition upon foundations of sand. The daughter of a king—Leopold, I of Belgium was her father—the sister of the present Belgian monarch, she was literally born to mount the diadem to a throne of dominating intellect and surpassing beauty she combined the most fascinating accomplishments with the executive force and determination of a man.

The princess was just on the threshold of womanhood when she met the youthful archduke, the youngest brother of Emperor Francis Joseph of Austria, Maximilian, tall, fair, slight, with the charm as well as the fatal weakness of the Hapsburgs. He was a man to win the romantic devotion of any woman, in especial one like Carlotta, in whose pride of race was a dominating characteristic. In two months they were married, and then began an ideal life, which in the soiled and blood-stained annals of both the Hapsburgs and Coburg house stands out as the supreme example of a perfect love.

On the shores of the Adriatic, in a spot where all nature seemed to have lavished her riches, the archduke built his bride a home more like a fairy palace than any dwelling of mere mortals. It was of pure white and typified all the poetical, dreamy qualities which later brought swift ruin when coupled with the iron responsibilities of a nation's welfare. Maximilian was at this time

the governor of the Lombard-Venetian Kingdom, and Miramar Castle was on the outskirts of Trieste. The untold happiness of those early years in a sense the compensation for the terrible finale. The last scene in this chapter of their lives was the reception at the castle of the embassy which dazed Maximilian and his ambitious wife with the prospect of empire.
