

POLICE FORCE ALL WROUGHT UP

Civil Service Will Sweep Officers Right and Left.

Captains and Detectives All Go— Some Too Large—Chief Hunt Measures.

Never in the history of the city has the police force been so wrought up, and never was there a time when as many old and experienced officers expected to lose their positions. It is all on account of the civil service requirements as to physical measurements, height, weight, chest measurement, etc. All day long the patrolmen have been reporting to Chief of Police Hunt, who issued the order so that he might know beforehand how many of his men would be barred under the civil service rules. As stated last night, the change will almost wipe out the present police force. Only a few men will remain, unless changes are made in the physical requirements. Chief of Detectives Sam Simmons, an old and valuable man, will be cut off. He is too short. Captain Moore, the largest officer on the force with the single exception of Chief Hunt, will have to lay aside his uniform and authority because he measures too much around the chest. Patrolman John Rasmussen is the only other officer who will be let out on this account. Both he and Captain Moore weigh too much, also. This is the most peculiar of all the rules, that a man who is possessed of the splendid physique these men have, should be barred from police service.

Captains and Detectives.
Capt. Gritzmacher, who with the single exception of Jailer Branch, is the oldest man on the force, is too short. He is at present in charge of the day patrol, and is an acknowledged expert at the business. His long service has given him much experience, and he is one of the most efficient officers in the department.

Capt. Parker is another who must go. Being too short is his deficiency, according to the new rules. "I guess I'll have to saw wood for a living," said he this morning after being measured. Jailer Ben Branch, who is the oldest man on the force, is also too short. He went on the force 35 years ago, and with the exception of two years when Penoyer was Mayor, has served continuously.

Detectives Kerrigan and Snow and Day will have to give up their stars along with their chief. Day is also together too short to fit, and Kerrigan and Snow are out of it.

Clerk Leonard is also too short, and falls in chest measurement.

Then there were numerous patrolmen who were measured this morning, who fall short of some of the requirements. Many of them were records that any officer might well be proud of. Patrolman Rasmussen is the only man who is too tall to suit the rules. He stands six feet and five inches in his fighting feet.

As the men were being measured, their remarks were varied. "I wish I

UNCOVER ABANDONED MINE

GRANTS PASS, Ore., March 20.—George Hall and John Hall, two mining men of this city, have uncovered an old and abandoned mine on Upper Grave Creek. The mine was evidently abandoned many years ago, and had caved in at the mouth of the tunnel. The two miners sunk on the old shaft and found several hundred feet of tunneling beneath. They think the original owner of the mine was caught by a cave-in and that they will yet uncover his bones somewhere in the depths of the mountain. The mine is very rich. The ledges are wide and carry high values in fine gold. No one in that district knew of the old mine. They thought the pile of dirt on the mountainside was only thrown out of a prospect hole. They did not suspect the existence of a well-developed quartz mine beneath. The new owners and discoverers of the lost mine will give it a thorough development and put it in shape for work on an extensive scale. They are elated over their strike and believe their discovery will become one of the richest mines of that noted district.
