Dressed in the latest fashion, and with jewels glittering on their fingers and in their ears, Mrs. Ben Compton, who gave her name as Mary Walker, and Miss Maud Thompson, giving her name as Ethel Briggs, were arraigned before Municipal Judge Hogue this morning on charges of larceny from the person. They entered pleas of not guilty, and their cases were continued. Bonds of \$1,000 each were fixed by the court, and as the pretty young women could not command that sum on short notice, they were escorted to the matron's department of the city jail.

The complaining witness against the two women is William Sweetman, a miner from Eastern Oregon. He alleges that the women, pretty though they be, robbed him of \$51. He proposes to punish them, and to begin with swore to a warrant charging them with larceny from the person.

"Finally, he changed his mind, and wanted the money back. We could not give it back, so he had us arrested. That's all there is to it. He simply got cold feet."

ARRESTED FOR STARVING COWS

James Hamilton Feeds
Animals Decayed Food.

For starving and otherwise mistreating his cattle and horses, James Hamilton of East Water and East Oak streets was placed under arrest late yesterday afternoon by Humane Officer Joe Reising. His case will come up before Municipal Judge Hogue tomorrow morning.

By this arrest an awful state of affairs has come to light. Hamilton seems to have absolutely no human feeling for the four cows, two calves and two horses he possesses, and they are so near starvation that they can scarcely stand on their feet. Hamilton once sold milk to his neighbors, but the condition of his cattle became known and all of his customers refused to patronize him further.

The case was reported to the Humane Society yesterday, and an investigation was made at once, resulting in the arrest of Hamilton.

Feeds Decayed Food.
When Reising went to the scene of the starving animals yesterday he found them feebly munching decayed sweet potatoes. The potatoes had been thrown into the lot, and were blue and green with decay. There was no hay or other food in the place. The lot was in an awful condition, and apparently had not been cleaned out for weeks. The cattle were wading knee-deep in the slush.

Further search revealed another box full of decayed sweet potatoes, which Hamilton was saving for feed today.

"What are these for?" asked Reising. "They are just decayed sweet potatoes," said Hamilton.

"Well, what are they for?" "Nothing—I'll dump them on the lot." "Then I'll arrest you for dumping garbage," said Reising.

Then Hamilton admitted that he had bought the potatoes for feed.

This morning State Veterinarian McClean accompanied Officer Reising out to the cattle yard for the purpose of making an inspection. He pronounced it one of the worst sights he had ever seen. Millions of vermin were found on

the animals. One of the cows had lost every particle of hair, while others were rapidly nearing the same condition.

"The cattle, as well as the horses, are all right as far as that goes," said Veterinarian McClean, "but they are simply starved. They have been terribly abused and are almost dead."
