

THE DELEGATES ARE OPPOSED TO A. L. U.

Voted on Subject at Fed-
erated Trades.

Latimer Will Challenge G. Y.
Harry to Joint Debate--
Other Labor News.

The Federated Trades Council of this city has gone on record as to where it stands relative to the American Labor Union's invasion of Oregon. At a meeting of that body last night, Secretary A. L. U. was not in the least disconcerted by the delegates to declare themselves on this subject. If they intend to remain loyal to the American Federation of Labor, or desert it for some other organization, they should decide now and for all time. A motion was put to that effect, and a unanimous verdict was reached in favor of continuing under the sheltering wing of the organization that had stood the test of time for more than half a century. The motion went through with cheers, and not a dissenting voice was raised against it.

T. E. Latimer, state organizer for the A. L. U., is not in the least disconcerted by this morning's action of the council. He intends to engage in an active campaign in the interest of the organization which he represents. It has come to this, he asserts, and no man or body of men can keep it out of Oregon.

Mr. Latimer is desirous of meeting G. Y. Harry, state organizer for the A. P. of L., in joint debate, choosing for a subject the respective merits of the two organizations. A labor mass meeting will be held at Eugene on April 5, and on this occasion Latimer says that nothing would please him more than to meet Harry and discuss the situation with him from the same platform.

At the meeting last night a committee was appointed to visit the Star Meat Market, the shops of William Ludwig and J. Stamper, which had been placed on the unfair list, and inform them that if they do not sign up immediately their employees will be called out. Two building contractors were placed on the unfair list.

Progress was reported in the fight being made against the Los Angeles Times. There are still 10 advertisers who persist in patronizing the paper, and every union printer in the United States has been requested to write each of these firms requesting them to withdraw their patronage at once. It is believed that this will have the desired effect.

F. D. Drake was elected a delegate last night by the Retail Clerks' Union to attend the state labor convention at La Grande on May 4. F. D. Smith was elected alternate delegate. The clerks are entitled to several other representatives and will elect them at a subsequent meeting. Eight new members were initiated last evening.

The Protective Laborers' Union met last evening and took in eight new members. Officers of the organization state that the new wage scale will be granted the first of the month.

The bricklayers are happy. On and after April 1 they will receive \$5.50 per day, an increase of 50 cents over the present rate. The scale was prepared some time ago, and every contractor in the city has conceded to it.

THE MIXOLOGISTS' ANNUAL REPORT

League Has Made Rapid Strides
During Past Year.

The Bartenders' League will be one year old tomorrow. Secretary T. E. Worley has prepared the following annual report of the organization which will be forwarded to national headquarters at Cincinnati:

At the primary meeting, which was called on March 2, 1902, there were 21 bartenders present. A temporary organization was effected with the following officers: Andrew Bowman, president; E. G. Becker, secretary; George Schultz, treasurer. On March 31 permanent officers were elected. They were: George Schultz, president; A. E. Swartz, vice-president; E. G. Becker, recording secretary; L. P. Bagley, financial secretary; Henry Mertloff, treasurer; George Google, inspector; Harry Wilson, chaplain; Phil Nugent, inside guard; Paul Devine, outside guard. At that time the union had 25 members. On June 1 the second election of officers occurred, at which time the membership had swollen to 151. The successful candidates were: William Milow, president; Nick Burback, vice-president; A. E. Swartz, financial secretary; Elmer Quimby, recording secretary; Peter Linder, treasurer; George Google, inspector; Charles Grassman, chaplain; Phil Ruckert, inside guard; Phil Galloway, outside guard.

Grew Rapidly.
From July 1 to October 2 the per capita list shows a gain of nine members, making a total of 160. On the latter date William Milow tendered his resignation as president, which was accepted. Three other officers were declared vacant for non-attendance and a special election was called. Charles Grassman became president; T. E. Worley, recording secretary; Ed Wynkoop, chaplain, and R. Wahlgreen, inspector. The organization was then virtually at a standstill until December 3, when T. E. Worley was appointed business agent. Renewed interest was then taken in the union and by December 20 the membership had grown to 204. On that date a very successful smoker was given, immediately following which was an election of officers. The result was: J. G. Bennett, president; Nick Burback, vice-president; Eugene Harry, recording secretary; T. E. Worley, financial secretary; Ed Wynkoop, treasurer; John Fry, chaplain; Henry Fricker, inspector; John Jackson, inside guard; Charles Price, outside guard. The first five officers named compose the executive board. Central quarters in the heart of the city were procured, and from that time on the organization rapidly grew. In February there were 242 members in good standing, and the per capita sheet for March showed the number to be 262. The union is growing from three to five members every week.

HAS PURCHASED THE BUILDING

Local Firm Stops Controversy Over
Temporary Postoffice Site.

The temporary postoffice site will be at Sixth and Burnside streets, as it has been finally arranged that improvements to the building will be cut to \$10,000 instead of \$15,000, as first required by the estimates made by the postoffice authorities.

The Shell-Heitshu-Woodward building is owned by the San Francisco Savings & Loan Society, of which Hartman, Thompson & Powers of this city are agents. The latter firm has decided to purchase the building and make the

necessary repairs, and rent the entire premises to the government at \$1,800 per month. This fact puts aside any further controversy over the temporary site, and makes it possible for the government to begin alterations for receiving the local postoffice department so soon as expedient.

JUST HAPPENED TO BE THERE

M. Bottier filed suit late yesterday against the city for alleged damages sustained by the collapse of the Marquam Gulch bridge on Second street last November. Mr. Bottier states that he had a right to be on the bridge, as it was a public thoroughfare. He says that he "just happened to be there" when the rotten structure fell in the gulch and he went with it. He asks \$10,000 damages for injuries alleged to have been sustained.

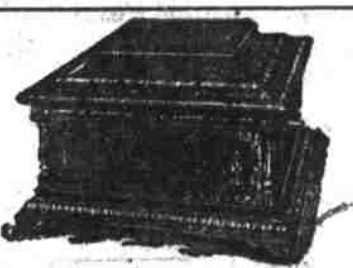
