

WILL ELECT A PRESIDENT

Directors Will Decide on Corbett's Successor.

Important Meeting to Be Held by Lewis and Clark Fair Directors Next Friday.

Who will be the president of the Lewis and Clark Fair? This question is troubling the stockholders of the company, and incidentally is occupying the attention of the directors of the Fair.

Another meeting is to be decided upon at this meeting. It is that of electing another director. The by-laws provide that the Board of Directors of the Fair be composed of 25 members, who are stockholders in the company.

There are 80 men at work now on the Fair grounds. Some are removing stumps, others are grading, while still others are building the fence around the grounds.

J. C. Cooper of McMinnville, one of the directors of the Fair, left this morning for Astoria. It is Mr. Cooper's purpose to counteract the petition for a referendum on the Fair appropriation.
