

INFORMATION FOR THE HOMESEAKER

Signs Will Direct Them Where to Go.

Exhibit of Oregon's Resources at Union Depot Is Rapidly Getting Into Form.

"Soon the weary homeseaker, when he lands at the Union Depot in Portland, will be greeted by signs directing him where to go to find out where potatoes grow best, where wheat ripens earliest and where timber is most plentiful. The signs will tell them just where they can get all the information they want," said Colonel F. V. Drake, in charge of the Bureau of Information recently established in the Union Depot Building. "This is something that has long been needed and it will be appreciated by those who in the past have been compelled to go to the railroad offices in search of knowledge."

Colonel Drake will leave Portland today for Clatsop, where he will work in the interest of the exhibit. He will be absent several days, but the bureau will not be closed, having been placed in charge of a deputy. Considerable decorative work has been done, grain and vegetables being employed as beautifiers. Speaking of the counties that have thus far presented their products for exhibition purposes, Colonel Drake said:

Six Months' Preparation.
"It will be at least six months before our exhibit is in perfect condition. Not a single county has as yet sent us anything we want. The reason for this seeming neglect is that in every instance they will have to wait for the crop of 1902 before they can procure what is needed for this purpose. Some of the counties are rather short on literature as yet, but all seem to be working and I think that within half a year we will have things in shape to do the most good to the greatest number."

"We have had few visitors as yet, because our exhibit has never been in shape to be of real value. However, I am now having signs made and will shortly open the bureau for actual business. We have enough products on hand now to make a creditable showing and there are more coming in constantly."

When asked what counties had made the best showing thus far, Colonel Drake said:

Some Counties Backward.
"That is hard to determine. No one county has as yet done itself proud. The Eugene exhibit has been shipped and will be here either tonight or tomorrow. Linn County also informs me that it will send in its display shortly. Josephine and Jackson Counties have their exhibits well in hand. Washington is yet to come and Umatilla and Wagon Counties are slow. Union County is working hard and I expect to hear from it within a short time."

In addition to sample products of the various counties, the exhibit at the Union Depot will contain descriptive literature, maps, lists of lands and every thing that could be of value to the homeseaker unacquainted with the country and conditions in the Northwest.

MONEY FOR SOLDIERS.

SALEM, April 7.—State Treasurer C. B. Moore is in receipt of \$540.68 from the United States Treasury Department for the Oregon Soldiers' Home. This is a balance due on the quarter ending June 30, 1902, and which was not paid at that time for want of funds.

To Receive Roosevelt.
SALEM, April 7.—The committee appointed by Mayor Bishop to prepare for the reception to be tendered President Roosevelt held a meeting last night and appointed the committees on arrangements and the marshals of the day. It was determined by the committee to invite Hon. F. X. Mathieu of Butteville, the only survivor of the famous 52 who at the "wolf meeting" at Champag voted for American sovereignty in the Oregon territory. This old pioneer is to be present at the reception to the President and will occupy a seat on the platform with the distinguished guests.

School Funds.
SALEM, April 7.—County School Superintendent E. T. Moores yesterday made his semi-annual apportionment of funds to the schools of the county. The sum so distributed being \$14,079. In the county are 9,356 children and the rate per capita of the distribution is \$1.50. The Salem district, under this apportionment, receives \$3,585.

Morrow Takes Office.
SALEM, April 7.—Hon. J. W. Morrow, recently appointed State Land Agent by Governor George H. Chamberlain, came to Salem yesterday and has assumed the duties of his office, succeeding L. B. Geer. It may be decided to merge the State Land Agent's department into the State Land Office, consolidating the two, that matter being now under consideration, but if this is not done, Mr. Morrow will administer the State Land Agent's office during the next four years.

OREGON CITY PAPER WORKERS

Discuss Demand for Increase--News of the City.

OREGON CITY, April 7.—About 125 paper workers and members of the Federal Union met last evening and discussed the proposed demand for higher wages. Action was deferred for one week, when it will be disposed of one way or the other.

Meade Post, No. 2, G. A. R. has appointed a committee, L. W. Ingram, George A. Harding, C. H. Daughy, J. J. Boreman and F. H. Beach, to make arrangements for Decoration Day exercises. This committee will work in conjunction with a like number of ladies from the Woman's Relief Corps. All of the arrangements, as well as the speakers, etc., for Decoration Day and the officers, will be appointed and orders published as soon as the committee gets fairly to work.

A special meeting of the City Council will be held this evening to consider the matters of the Ryan elevator franchise up the bluff and the South End road way. It is essential that both matters be disposed of as soon as possible. The elevator, besides being a great convenience to the citizens of this city, would afford an easy way for travelers to get on top of the bluff and onto a pathway which gives a splendid view of the falls and upper river. It will be the only elevator of its kind west of the Mississippi. The road leading out of the southern part of the town is partly constructed and work will be resumed this spring, but there are yet a few minor matters that must be settled.

POINT GORDA DANGEROUS.

Point Gorda, where the steamer Alliance struck a rock last Sunday, is said to be the most dangerous point on the coast. There are a number of hidden rocks near the place, and many of them are reported to be uncharted. When a northwestern gale is blowing, that part of the coast is made doubly dangerous, owing to the fact that there is a strong current setting in toward the cape. A vessel is very easily carried out of her course and onto the rocks.

Many years ago the steamer Humboldt was lost here, but all hands were saved. The steam schooners Cleone and Ajax were wrecked near the same point about three or four years ago. The Cleone was backed off the reef and driven on the beach, where she was repaired. No lives were lost in either wreck.

SARGENT SAILS SATURDAY.

The American ship C. F. Sargent will be loaded Friday night and Captain Gammans expects to sail Saturday. He has telegraphed to Gray's Harbor for a first mate, his former chief officer having left. The Sargent will carry supplies to the Bristol Bay canneries.

The vessel also takes up 80 white men and 100 Chinese to work in the canneries during the coming season.

Last year the Sargent held the sailing record to the Behring Sea from the Columbia River and the Sound, having made the outward passage in 34 days, which topped the list by many hours; on the homeward trip, steaming time was the order, the ship coming down in 14 days.

JOHN M'CRACKEN TO WORK.

The new Port of Portland tender John M'Cracken commenced active service today. Her first work was to tow fuel barges to the dredge now working down the river. The tender has been changed from a coal to a wood burner. Several other minor changes have also been made.

THE OPPOSITION HELPS HERMANN

It Cannot Be Centralized Against Him.

Therefore It Makes It Almost Certain That He Will Win Congressional Nomination.

In the opinion of Robert L. Riddle, a prominent politician of Douglas County and a member of the recent session of the Oregon Legislature, the only effect the opposition to Blinger Hermann will have is to make him certain of nomination for Congress from the First District. Mr. Riddle is in Portland today on private business and made the following statement to The Journal:

"Hermann seems certain of winning from the viewpoint I take. I do not say this because I am a Hermann supporter, but because it looks very much like it was a sure thing to me. It is admitted by all that Hermann can control more votes than any other single candidate in the field. This would not mean anything if the opposition were organized and solid for any one man, but it is not. Hermann's votes are for him alone, while the votes in opposition to his candidacy are distributed among half a dozen prospective candidates, not one of whom is in a position to win by his own strength. There is an old saying about a house that is divided against itself. I think that adage holds good in this case."

Vawter's Position.
Mr. Riddle was asked about the candidacy of Vawter and said:
"He is the main factor in assuring Hermann of the place he seeks. Vawter has a strong following which has announced that it will vote for him first, last and all the time. That is where the rub comes. Were it possible for Vawter to get in with some one else there might be a chance for them to win out against Hermann, but just as long as it is every fellow for himself the thing can come out but one way. Lack of centralization is the main fault."

He said, "but I don't know as yet. But unless those who are battling against Hermann get together and pool their interests they will be helping him to get the nomination."

WOMEN VOTED AT ELECTION

Dallas Election Results in Favor of Progress.

DALLAS, April 7.—The city election had as its main issue the question of waterworks. Two special ballots had been prepared. One the bond issue, to bond the city for the purpose of raising money to install the system, and the other for the purpose of condemning certain lands along the proposed waterway, which the owners thereof refused to sell for this purpose. Both were carried.

The bond issue, by a majority of 29, and for condemnation proceedings, a majority of 16.

Another unusual feature of the election was the presence of women at the polls. All women owning taxable property were entitled to vote, and a great many availed themselves of this rare chance. The new officers elected are as follows: Mayor, J. C. Hayter; Councilmen at Large, H. B. Cook, J. H. Stouffer, re-elected; Marshal, J. M. Grant, re-elected; Councilmen, First Ward, W. V. Fuller; Second Ward, W. W. Williams; Third Ward, A. B. Muir.

The steamer Prentiss left this morning for Vancouver to load piling for Port Los Angeles.

The French ship Europe is loading cement at Hamburg for this port.

The Italian ship Cressington, with a general cargo for Portland, will soon sail from Astoria.

The Cockermouth is loading at the North Pacific Lumber Mills.

Captain Schoemaker of the Seefahrer stopped at Puyallup last year. He was homebound bound from San Francisco and called to leave a few ships stored.

The Islanders gave him several baskets of fruit, in fact, enough to last the remainder of the passage.

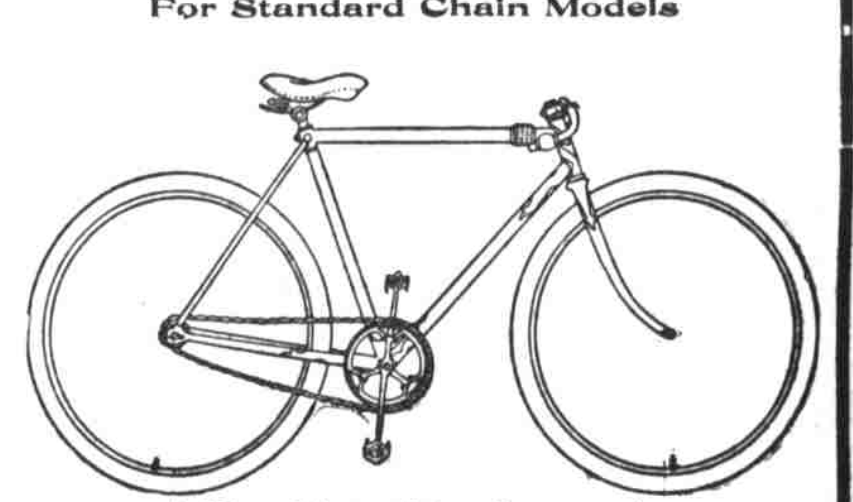

WAR AGAINST DOUBLE HEADERS.
Union Pacific and Santa Fe May Stop Their Use.
