The Browns were within hailing distance of victory a number of times, and several times had games in hand, only to lose them at critical stages. Individually the Browns are as clever as any players on the diamond, and the fact that they have not yet got together as a unit is a cause for regret.

What the Fighting Fraternity Is
Doing in the Northwest.

SPOKANE, April 10.—The Spokane Athletic Club was packed last night when Kid Fredericks and Dick Lewis met in a 20-round contest for gate receipts. Fredericks was given the decision in the 11th round on a foul.

Ed Barry and Bowers appeared in the four-round preliminary. Barry has issued a sweeping deft to all Northwestern heavyweights.

GRANTS PASS, April 10.—A mass meeting will be held in this city Saturday afternoon under the auspices of the Grants Pass Women's Club, for the purpose of exciting enthusiasm and enlisting the interest of women in this section.

The secretary was instructed to notify each member of the police force that the springing tests would be held next Tuesday morning from 9:30 to 12 o'clock. Physical instructor Ringler of the Y. M. C. A. has volunteered to take charge of the running tests on this date. After Tuesday it will cost the applicants \$1 each.

The question as to whether policemen were considered officers, as referred to in the charter, was discussed and referred to the City Attorney. If the City Attorney decides that the police are included in the meaning of this section, it will be necessary for all applicants to have resided in the city for at least three years.

WOOD DEALERS' TRUST SMASHED

Seattle Combine Gets Knock-Out Blow From Member.

SEATTLE, April 10.—A trust of some magnitude, and one that has cost the householders of Seattle a pretty penny during the past few months, was uncovered here a few days ago.
