EIGHT SAILORS CANNOT BE FOUND

Are Missing From Barkentine Amazon.

Disappearance May Bring About War Between the Various Sailor or Boarding House Gangs.

(Journal Special Service.)

ASTORIA, April 17.—Eight sailors who were brought up from San Francisco for the barkentine Amazon, have mysteriously disappeared, and the efforts of Sheriff Linville, to whom the master of the barkentine appealed, to locate the missing men, have proved futile. The San Francisco runners have been "baiting in" of late, but the disappearance of the latest bunch of men to be sent North indicates that the runners of Astoria and Portland will be able to successfully cope with the Bay City masters.

The Amazon has a lumber cargo for the Orient, and when Captain Aas wanted eight men to complete his crew he sent to San Francisco for them. Some time ago all the boarding house masters of the coast agreed that none should interfere with the business operations of another, but civil strife recently broke out in San Francisco between the runners, and since then the agreement has been disregarded. Captain Aas had no difficulty in getting the men, who were signed at the Sailors' Home in San Francisco. They received \$16 advance money and their fare to Astoria was paid, the total for each man being \$32, which was to be refunded by the vessel when the men were placed aboard. They were shipped North on the steamer Robert Dollar.

The Dollar arrived Thursday with the men, but the Amazon was not then down.

FOOT MASHED IN ELEVATOR

Fred Kroll Hurt at the Hotel Perkins This Morning.

Because Fred Kroll was careless and allowed his left foot to project over the edge of the freight elevator at the Hotel Perkins, he is now inmate of the Good Samaritan Hospital and will travel the rest of the journey through life with but one great toe.

Kroll is assistant engineer at the Perkins, and it was while baggage was being taken upon the freight elevator, outside the main building, that the accident occurred. Kroll was on the elevator and allowed his left foot to project beyond the edge. As the movable platform passed through the scaffolding above the shoe was caught as though in the jaws of a trip-hammer and the foot was badly crushed.

Although suffering terrible pain young Kroll bore the accident bravely. Medical aid was summoned, the shoe was cut from the mangled foot and, with blood spouting from the severed arteries, the boy was taken first to a room and later to the Good Samaritan Hospital. Reports from the hospital this afternoon are that the young man's left great toe has been amputated, but the remainder of the foot will be saved.

Kroll is 18 years of age and has been for some time employed at the Hotel Perkins. The accident occurred at 9 o'clock this morning.

It is reliably stated that the loss of the eight men falls entirely on the San Francisco runners who furnished them. DELEGATES ARE READY FOR WORK

Amalgamated Association Meets Tomorrow at Columbus.

(Journal Special Service.)

COLUMBUS, O., April 13.—Delegates are arriving in large numbers for the annual convention of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers, which will begin here tomorrow and will continue for 10 days or two weeks. This organization is one of the largest and most influential labor bodies in America, and there are several things that combine to make the present gathering the most important in its history. The organization has grown with great rapidity during the last year and many new lodges of steel workers are sending their first delegates to this convention.

Some radical changes are proposed in the laws of the organization, such as doing away with annual conventions, redistricting the local lodges in blocks of 50, with district executive committees to make wage scales and business agreements, and these will be submitted for the consideration of the gathering. Another important matter to be considered and acted upon is the proposition of the Republic Iron & Steel Company, which offers to sell stock to the workmen on easy payments. The company also promises to give the workmen holding stock a director, who shall have the same power as any of the other directors. The association will discuss the matter, and if it deems the proposition a good one the workmen of the company who are all members of the association will be advised to take stock.

The discussion of the wage scale and conditions of labor for the ensuing year will, of course, be one of the most important features of the convention. No radical demands are anticipated, however, and it is thought that an amicable agreement with the mill owners will be reached without great difficulty. The election of officers is attracting more attention among the delegates than usual, owing to the opposition that has cropped out against the re-election of President Theodore Shaffer. There is no disguising the fact that President Shaffer's management of the late unsuccessful strike of the steel workers has caused considerable dissatisfaction among the rank and file of the association. Friends of the President, however, express the opinion that he is still the most influential man in the organization and believe he will be re-elected. Louis D. Pittsburg is being boomed for president of the opposition.

BIG MEETING OF PEDAGOGUES.
